

TAKE BODIES OF FIVE MEN FROM TUNNEL

QUINCY, Cal., March 19. (A. P.)—The bodies of all five of the workers killed by the collapse of a railroad tunnel near here yesterday had been recovered today. The body of Gus Lund was taken out shortly after midnight and those of Hugo Johnson and John Hagenson were recovered during the afternoon.

The bodies of Arvid Falk and Aaron Edmondson were taken out yesterday. Through a misunderstanding by officials of the timekeeping records it was announced yesterday that Olan Anderson was one of the victims. It was found that Hagenson instead of Anderson was in the tunnel. Anderson was found safe at the railroad camp.

QUINCY, Cal., March 19. (A. P.)—A new cave-in early today interrupted the work of rescue crews after they had recovered the bodies of three of the five men buried alive early yesterday in a landslide in the Western Pacific tunnel under construction near Keddie, Cal.

The body of Gus Lund of Quincy was brought out shortly after midnight. The new cave-in prevented rescuers from resuming their work at once. Earlier the body of Arvid Falk of Portland, Ore., and an unidentified corpse were taken from the debris.

Because of its mangled condition, the other body could not be identified. Swan Hedin, Quincy, suffered a fractured ankle. He escaped from near the tunnel entrance.

The collapse occurred two hundred feet from the north end of a tunnel the railroad is constructing as a part of the right of way to connect with the Great Northern railroad between Keddie and Klamath Falls, Ore. Contractors blamed heavy rains.

TWO PLANES MISSING IN PHILIPPINES

MANILA, March 19. (AP)—Glenn Brophy, who left Macao, near Canton, at 8:50 a. m. today on the last leg of a projected flight from Shanghai to Manila, failed to arrive here on scheduled time today. His whereabouts were unreported here late tonight.

Brophy was expected to reach Nichols field, the army airport just outside of Manila, about 2 p. m. Mrs. Brophy waited for him there until 7 o'clock this evening and then returned to her hotel. Points in northern Luzon were queried as to reports from Brophy.

Brophy is not the only missing flier in this region, however. Search has been under way a week for a hydroplane in which R. A. Diekhoff of San Francisco and William Scott, a resident of the Philippines, were believed to have plunged into the sea off the eastern coast of Mindanao Island March 9.

Diekhoff, foreign sales manager for a saw and steel company and Scott, lumber company manager, left Surigao harbor, northernmost point of Mindanao, for Davao, on the southeastern coast of the island March 9 and never reached their destination.

One pontoon of their ship was found by a constabulary patrol about the half way point of their journey, which should have been completed in two hours. Discovery of the pontoon gave rise to the hope that they had survived, but failure to hear from them later led to the belief they had perished.

BUSINESS MAN LEAPS 14 STORES TO DEATH

SAN FRANCISCO, March 19. (AP)—Blaine W. Sheldon, 36, secretary-treasurer of the Pacific Can Co., died today of injuries suffered when he plunged 14 stories from his room in a San Francisco hotel yesterday.

Police expressed the belief he leaped from the window because he feared a nervous breakdown he suffered six weeks ago would result in a mental illness.

Irregular, Curved Brims Distinguish Spring Hats

Hats with brims are in again and you should look at them with a personal eye, for there is nothing so flattering as the right brimmed hat.

Moreover, whether it happens to be the perfect brimmed hat or not, many is the day when you will welcome that bit of protection from the sun's glare, the world's stare and your own knowledge that there happen to be fatigue rings under your eyes.

It is going to look funny this spring to see brimmed hats with suits. We are so accustomed to seeing the chic, small hat atop a suited figure that the brimmed hat will at first look out of balance. But it is going to keep on appearing until we get used to it, and I will wager that before summer is here many of us will feel that there is nothing quite like the proper brimmed hat with

the tailored suit.

Sailors are in again, but modified a lot, thank goodness. The brimmed hats that are more likely to be universal in their becomingness and their appeal are those that have somewhat irregular brims, somewhat curving brims that do this or that to lift them into the individuality class.

There are small brimmed hats and the larger or what you might call the medium picture hat. These latter are not for suit wear and should be worn only with dresses that are semi-formal, for parties, for teas, for dressing up on warm afternoons.

Three brimmed hats illustrate the new modes adequately. There is a white baki hat, first of all, that has a fairly medium brim on the left side and a flat, soft, squashy bow of green velvet ribbon on the right side, with the back pleated baki. This would look lovely with one of the green and white suits, green with white accessories and blouse.

In the center is the perfect brimmed suit hat, a black novelty straw, cut almost a straight brim, but the front foreshortened and the entire hat given an original poke accent by the trimming of multi-colored plaid silk ribbon. With a black suit with plush accessories, this is a knockout.

For the dressy occasion, a black baki hat is cut on generous lines, with the brim and the crown enriched by seaming by hand. One of the new rose tones is used for the pink velvet ribbon that swatches the crown from the right side front across the back to the left side, where it is shirred many times, to simulate the effect of a flat buckle.

The bullet passed through Horn's hand and struck Dupuis in the groin. An operation last night was futile.

INQUIRY INTO LUMBER COST IS UNDER WAY

WASHINGTON, March 19. (AP)—An inquiry into the production costs of soft wood lumber in the United States and Canada, ordered by the senate, was opened today by the tariff commission.

J. D. McCormack, representing the Canadian Western Lumber company in British Columbia, testified there was little or no difference in production costs in Western Canada and the Pacific northwest. He made a general statement covering the industry in British Columbia, including transportation and market conditions.

Colonel W. B. Greeley, secretary-manager of the West Coast Lumbermen's association, urged a maximum increase in the present duty of \$1 per thousand feet under the flexible provisions on finished fir, spruce, pine, hemlock and large lumber.

He contended production costs were lower in British Columbia and that producers there held an additional advantage over United States producers in being able to ship in foreign bottoms.

American lumbermen shipping to American markets, he pointed out, were prohibited from shipping in foreign vessels and transportation costs were higher in American ships.

Wages were higher in United States mills than in British Columbia, he added.

The study has been urged by the West Coast Lumbermen's association, the Southern Pine association, and the Shovel, Carpenter and Clark Lumber interests in Minneapolis.

Sabo New Manager Development Co.

The Klamath Development company, one of the oldest established real estate firms in Klamath Falls, has named Stephen Sabo of this city as their new manager.

Mr. Sabo has been with the company for a number of years as salesman, and has resided in this city for 20 years. He announced today that the Klamath Development company will maintain its same liberal policies as in the past.

The second call came from C. F. Mills, 112 High street at 4:05 Wednesday afternoon. The conflagration proved to be only a chimney fire, and no damage was done.
