

HOTELMEN MET SATURDAY EVE

Senator Edward W. Miller, of Grants Pass, was speaker of the evening at a meeting of the Southern Oregon Hotelmen's association, which was held at Hotel Willard Saturday evening. Albert Austin, president of the association, presided as host to about 50 members of the association.

The senator stressed the need of cooperation among hotelmen and the need of calling attention of southern Oregon and northern California to the traveling public. Using the words of the speaker, "Southern Oregon is the Pacific coast to the south and the Pacific coast to the north is a magnitude of scenic attractions."

He stated that he regretted very much that the Oregon legislature had done nothing to promote these attractions, but that the legislature, did, however, pass an enabling act giving power to the counties to do more in this line. Senator Miller stressed the importance of the Olympic games next year when hotel men must assist in bringing the scenic attractions of the mid-Pacific coast to the attention of the hordes of visitors who will travel westward for this event.

Pete Benson, proprietor of the Travelers hotel at Dunsmuir, Calif., invited the southern Oregon hotelmen to attend a meeting of the Northern California Hotelmen's association to be held in Dunsmuir in April.

Earl C. Reynolds, executive secretary of the southern Oregon chamber of commerce, gave the address of welcome, stating that the coming of the hotelmen to Klamath Falls is greeted as the spring arrival of the pelicans.

George Smith, of Roseburg, president of the southern Oregon hotelmen's association, presided at last night's meeting.

Battery D, 249 Coast Artillery Is Given Prize

"For the third successive year Battery D, 249th Coast Artillery, Klamath Falls, has won the national trophy for excellence in marksmanship. The trophy is awarded annually by the war department to the unit attaining the highest figure of merit in record practice with the rifle. The figure of merit is computed as follows: multiplying the number of expert riflemen by 100, sharpshooters by 55, marksmen by 75 and dividing the total by the actual strength of the unit. Battery D's figure of merit was 82.2.

"Captain Abber, the battery commander, announced several years ago that every time a trophy came into possession of the Klamath Falls unit a permanent space for such trophy would be provided as it was their intention to retain permanently all trophies once won. Captain Abber's assurance appears to be well founded as, in addition to this trophy, the unit has been in possession of the highest average drill attendance."—The Oregon Guardsman.

Fire Takes Life Of Young Detroit Girl

DETROIT, March 23. (AP)—A 10-year-old girl was burned to death and four persons were injured in a fire which swept a six family flat on Alger Avenue at 4 a. m. today. More than 50 persons were forced out of the building, some fleeing down a rear stairway and others dropping from windows.

The girl killed was Harriet Malach, daughter of Isaac Malach, tenant on the third floor. Malach and his wife picked up three younger children and made their way down the rear stairs, fleeing to Harriet to follow. Firemen later found her body in the hall outside the door of the Malach apartment.
