WINTER ENDS;
SNOW COVERS
A WIDE AREA

KANSAS CITY, March 28. (AP)—Old Man Winter, who returned for his second visit this month to the western fringe of prairie states, bowed his farewell today, but left his snowy mantle and an icy breath.

His departure was marked by a cessation of snow fall in the Dakotas, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, North Texas and the Rocky Mountain states. Snow flurries, however, were reported on the highways, both on railroads and highways, clearing transportation paths which had been blocked by huge drifts.

All but one of several persons previously reported missing in Nebraska had been accounted for. A search continued for Boyd Edwards, 7 years old, who had not returned from school to his home near Max.

Fruit growers and cattle men were apprehensive over the effects of the storm. While cattle losses in the Panhandle section of Texas were not as heavy as at first reported, unofficial reports indicated severe damage to budding trees.

Indications in Colorado and Montana that the storm had reached its peak. Skies were clearing in Colorado and temperatures appeared to be moderating. In Western Kansas many persons reported missing were found safe.

Trains into Kansas City from the West and Southwest were from five to twelve hours late. Snow plows were bucking drifts from Phillipsburg, Kas., westward in an effort to clear the Rock Island line between here and Denver. Airplanes were grounded.

"Conditions at present are not as bad as we are led to believe," was H. N. Moe's statement, when he returned last night from a "two weeks' visit in New York. Mr. Moe, local merchant, was subpoenaed to appear before the United States supreme court in New York as a witness in a defraud case.

Hundreds of merchants from all over the United States were called to appear on the same case, and many enlightening discussions and pointers on present business conditions were heard by Mr. Moe.

"Prices in all lines are as low now as they can be. Development taking place in the East are reflecting through the West in a smaller way."

"I feel more satisfied than before that there is no surplus of manufactured goods on the market today, and that everything is made to order. More men are being put to work daily. Merchants who have depleted their stocks are replenishing them and building up their business," Mr. Moe concluded.

WORLD WHEAT
POOL MAY BE
THE RESULT

ROME, March 28 (AP)—An international wheat export pool, embracing Australia, Canada, Argentina, South Africa and India, and possibly the United States, may be an unexpected result of the world's wheat conference now being held here.

There was much confusion in the conference today as delegates from 45 countries presented practically 45 different views about the solution of the problem of the world wheat surplus. Views about the solution of the problem of the world wheat surplus.

Non-European nations, however, began holding private meetings today in an effort to hit upon some plan whereby they might oppose the aggressive demands of European nations for a system of preferential tariffs which would mean a virtual boycott by Europe against foreign wheat.

They discussed the plan for

the setting up of export boards in each country to manage the sale of surplus wheat abroad, while wheat producers would be asked to turn their surplus over to the boards to be marketed without guarantees.

These national boards, according to the plan discussed, would co-operate with each other to promote the export trade. Participation in the plan was said to be very doubtful at the present time since that government does not officially recognize the conference. The two Americans who are here, C. W. Croes, of Aberdeen, South Dakota, representing the American Wheat Growers association, and John A. Simpson, of Oklahoma City, president of the National Farmers union, are unofficial delegates.

Baron Georges De Pronay, delegate from Hungary, suggested that the non-European countries should agree to export no more than 15 per cent of their total wheat production.
