

SNOW FALLING AS NEW WEST IS COUNTING LOSS

KANSAS CITY, March 30 (AP)—The middle-west, digging out from a snowstorm which took a known toll of 16 lives last week, found its efforts mocked by a fresh fall today.

Snow began falling in the Rocky mountain states of Colorado, Wyoming and Montana yesterday and late last night was falling in Nebraska, Kansas and western Missouri. Temperatures were moderate, however, and there was no wind. Forecasts were for precipitation in Oklahoma and northern Texas today.

Meanwhile the sections which felt the fury of last week's blizzard, accompanied by zero temperatures, took stock of the loss in lives and damage to early crops and fruit.

The known death list reached 16 yesterday when the body of Boyd Edwards, 7-year-old Max, Neb., school boy was recovered in a snow-filled canyon, mid-way between his farm home and the school house which he left Thursday. Finding of the boy's body culminated a three-day hunt. Fifteen of the 20 school children who survived the cold in a stalled school bus near Tower, Colo., were in a Lamar hospital.

Other deaths attributed to the storm included those of three sheep-herders, one in Wyoming and two in New Mexico. The body of Charles Beach, 50-year-old Wyoming herdsman, was found half a mile from his camp wagon. His 4-year-old son and a dog were safe at the camp.

Unofficial reports indicated widespread damage to fruit trees. Oats in southwestern Oklahoma were reported frozen. Transportation agencies, with the exception of bus lines in some sections, were returning to normal schedules.

Health Unit Treats Many At Hospital

Many patients have been treated at the City and County isolation hospital during the month, according to the monthly report prepared by the County Health Unit. Due to economic conditions a number of investigations of poverty have been made by unit nurses, and county physician G. S. Newsom. Many patients have been cared for in their homes, while most of those treated in the county hospital, according to the report, have been transients.

The Klamath County Unit has been cooperating to the fullest extent in the past weeks with the Indian Service in the suppression of a small-pox epidemic which has broken out on the reservation in the Sprague River district. During the past month 10 cases of small-pox have been reported. Other contagious diseases during the month were reported as follows:

tuberculosis, 1; scarlet fever, 4; pneumonia, 11; influenza, 69; German measles, 1; chicken-pox, 9; mumps, 3; erysipelas, 1; Vincent's angina, 1; gonorrhea, 6; syphilis, 1.

Samples of water from the West Klamath water plant have been submitted by the Klamath unit to state laboratories for analysis, and toxin anti-toxin inoculations against diphtheria have been administered by unit nurses. Klamath county health nurses attended meetings of the State Tuberculosis Association and the State Nurses Association meet during the past month, the report states.

The Pelican Rifle and Revolver club is continuing its practice shoots at the National Guard range on the Keno road every Sunday. Some remarkably high scores have been made.

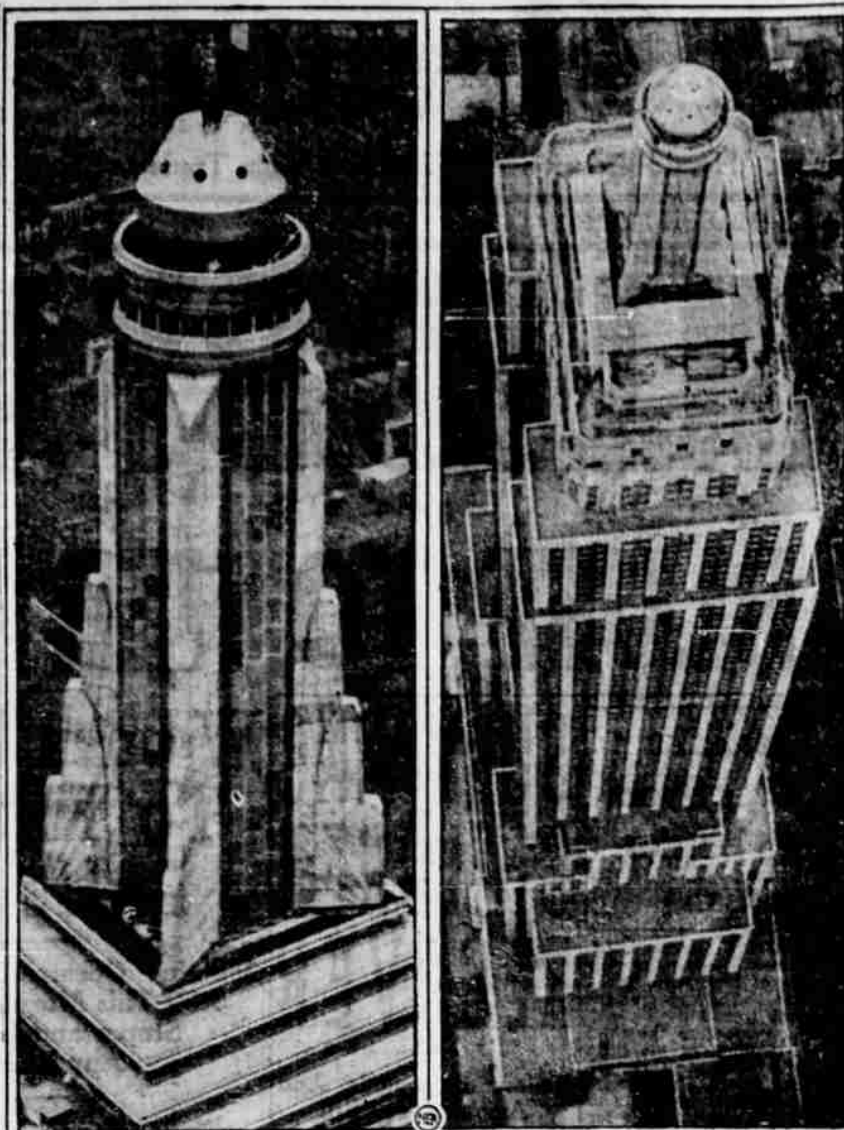

World's Tallest Building Gets Its Easter Hat!



Farther from the ground than anything else ever built by man, the monument-like tower at the peak of New York's mammoth new Empire State Building is shown in these airplane photos as it appeared after the removal of scaffolding which surrounded it. Note in the striking picture at the left, the tiny figures of two men at the top of the tower, where facilities for mooring dirigibles and discharging passengers in the heart of Manhattan soon will be provided. There are observation towers at the top and just beneath the base of the mast. It's 145 feet from the tip of the building to famous Fifth Avenue below, and the view at the right gives a vivid impression of the height and architectural lines of the world's tallest skyscraper.

PRIEST VICTIM OF COMMUNIST BAND IN CHINA

SHANGHAI, March 30. (AP)—Word has been received here by the St. Columban's Mission of the death March 5 of Father Superior Tierney of the Kiencheng Mission while a captive of Chinese communists. While details of his death were not learned, the bandits frequently had said they would kill him if ransom money of \$40,000 (silver) were not immediately forthcoming.

In a letter which he contrived to smuggle through his captors some weeks ago, he wrote that he was failing and that he was "quite resigned to die."

Father Tierney, superior of St. Columban's Mission at Kiencheng, a small interior city located southeast of Nanchang in the South China province of Kiangsi, was captured last Nov. 17. British authorities made strong representations to the Chinese government in an effort to obtain his release, but with the bandits hidden in the wild mountain regions of Kiangsi, all attempts of soldier detachments to reach them failed.

Details of Father Tierney's capture, received at his Shanghai headquarters, indicated that he was subjected to brutal treatment from the day he fell into bandit hands.

Father Tierney was a native of County Monaghan, Ireland. He was 55 years old, and had

POLICE RAID ALLEGED COUNTERFEITING PLANT

PORTLAND, Ore., March 30. (AP)—An alleged counterfeit plant was put out of business yesterday when secret service agents and police detectives arrested George Bradenburg, ex-foundryman, as co-author of spurious dimes, quarters and dollars that have appeared of late in Portland cash registers.

Bradenburg's partner, police said, was a man known to them as Curly Young, who was arrested March 19. Molds used in casting the coins were destroyed prior to the raid.

ROBBERS PULL A CLEVER JOB

CHICAGO, March 30. (AP)—Taking possession of the Weiboldt Department South Side store for almost eight hours, seven gunmen, equipped with elaborate burglar tools, yesterday robbed the store's safe of \$35,000 in cash and \$15,000 in checks and escaped.

The men, who had apparently spent the night in some secluded room, stalked in on Christ Swanson, the engineer, at 6 a. m., yesterday. They tied him to a chair. Then they located Henry McIver, the watchman.

"You're going to pull the alarm boxes as usual," they told him. "If you pull 'em wrong and the police come, we'll know you're the cause. The first bullet will be for you."

With that, a part of the gang went off to the office of the store. While some guarded the store, others planted nitroglycerine in the vault doors, and still others obtained expensive rugs to muffle the explosion.

It was the second Wieboldt store to be robbed since the first of the year. On January 26 five bandits obtained \$19,200, engaged in a pistol duel with police-men, and escaped at another Wieboldt store on the Northwest side.

QUERIES SHOW ROOSEVELT IS PARTY CHOICE

NEW YORK, March 30.—Governor Roosevelt of New York today appeared to be the presidential choice of a majority of delegates and alternates to the 1924 democratic national convention who answered queries sent out by Jesse L. Straus, New York merchant.

Mr. Straus queried approximately 2,000 men and women; 942 replied; 98 expressed no preference; 478 favored Governor Roosevelt; 125 former Governor Alfred E. Smith; 73 Owen D. Young; 33 Governor Albert C. Ritchie of Maryland; 23 Senator Joe Robinson of Arkansas; 35 former Secretary of War Newton D. Baker of Ohio; 15 former Senator James A. Reed of Missouri; 41 were scattered.

Mr. Straus believed the number of replies "astounding" and said "they clearly indicate the sentiment in the ranks of democracy at this time."

New York was not canvassed. Oregon, Wisconsin and Wyoming sent no replies. Two answered from California, one from Virginia. Mr. Straus said the other states were well represented. Massachusetts favored Smith. Arkansas was for Robinson. Maryland for Ritchie. Connecticut was tied between Smith and Roosevelt.

Straus was assistant treasurer of the democratic national committee in the last presidential campaign.

ROCHESTER MAN KILLS TWO AND ENDS OWN LIFE

ROCHESTER, N. Y., March 30 (AP)—His hopes of a "come-back" in the stock market apparently abandoned and faced with growing despair at the loss of his home, Fred O. Morse, 65, shot and killed his wife and brother-in-law, and then turned the revolver on himself, according to police reconstruction of the triple tragedy today.

The bodies of Mrs. May Morse, 61, her brother Loren G. Cushman, 53, and her husband were found yesterday, more than four hours after the shootings. Police said positions of the bodies and a revolver near Morse indicated he had slain his wife and her brother and then killed himself.

Morse, formerly of Cheyenne, Wyo., always affected the garb of a western rancher and was a familiar sight in brokerage houses with his wide sombrero, high boots and frack coat.

Police investigation revealed the Moreses had been in straightened circumstance and that Cushman had been providing for them. Cushman, police said, recently had announced his intention of giving up the apartment in which the trio lived.
