NO EXTENSION FOR MAKING TAX RETURNS

SALEM, April 1. (AP)—The state tax commission today announced that no extension for filing corporation tax returns has been made or contemplated. Corporation excise tax returns must be filed April 1, the same as last year. The extension to June 15 granted to individual income taxpayers, applies to individuals only and not to corporations. This extension was granted pending enactment of the intangibles act passed by the legislature.

The tax commission estimated that approximately 2000 corporation excise returns had already been received and it was estimated around 2000 would be received in the final rush today and tomorrow. The excise tax rate was raised by the legislature from five per cent to eight per cent.

Despite a 30 per cent slump in federal income tax collections in Oregon, state corporation excise tax collections so far are running a little ahead of last year, the commission announced. Final figures will not be available until all of the returns are in, the last of this week.

KLAMATH LAKE UP 1.06 FEET

Plenty of water is assured Klamath irrigators for the coming season, according to official statistics compiled by the reclamation bureau, which has recorded a rise of 1.06 feet of water in Upper Klamath lake during the month of March. This rise is still somewhat below normal, but is enough to assure an abundant supply. The lake is still rising, and will continue to do so until all snow has melted in the mountains, and as long as spring showers continue.

Precipitation for the month of March registered 94 per cent of the normal amount, with 1.1 inches recorded. The mean temperature for the month was 41.9, while the maximum temperature was recorded at 66 degrees, and the minimum at 18 degrees above zero.

FLOODS GAVE EXTRA WORK ON HIGHWAYS

SALEM, Ore., April 1. (AP)—Every available man on the state highway department crews are busy coping with flood conditions over the state, the highway office announced here today. It is expected additional men are being employed by field supervisors, but the extent of relief to unemployment resulting from the storm was unknown.

The toll in the rain storm during the night permitted much of the water to run off the highways, department men stated, as well as permit many of the coast streams to subside. However, the Columbia River highway is blocked in several places, some serious slides being reported around Tillamook, and the Eastside Pacific highway is blocked by high water at Jefferson, south of here.

Roy Klein, state highway engineer, and C. B. McCulloch, bridge engineer, are at Jefferson today before leaving they announced the West Side highway was open between Portland and Eugene, and the highway north from Salem open. Detailed reports of damage have not been received. Conditions generally are improved over last night.

CONSOLIDATE STATE BOARDS

SALEM, April 1. (AP)—The work of the board of Child Labor inspection and the Industrial Welfare Commission, two departments which the legislature consolidated under the Bureau of Labor, effective June 6, was taken over by the labor department today. C. H. Gram, labor commissioner, announced. The legislature did not provide funds for the operation of the two groups until the consolidation was effective, but the Labor Bureau voluntarily offered to take charge at once.

The major portion of the work will be handled through the Salem office, but the Child Labor Bureau work will have a branch office in the Multnomah county court house in Portland, in connection with the labor department branch there, in charge of Carl Stoll, Gram announced. Stoll is a deputy in the labor department. Mrs. Millie Trumbull has been secretary of the two groups, with headquarters in the Oregon building in Portland. The Labor Bureau is sending out questionnaires to all manufacturers, office heads and operative firms to ascertain the fluctuation of labor supply and demand, as a basis to judge the labor situation in the state. The questionnaires cover the first two months of 1931 as compared to the same period in 1930.
