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DEATH PENALTY IS VOTED DOWN IN MICHIGAN

DETROIT, April 7 (AP)—A proposal backed by Governor Wilbur M. Bruckner to re-establish the death penalty for murder in Michigan was defeated overwhelmingly in yesterday's spring election.

The death penalty was abolished in the state 84 years ago, with life imprisonment remaining as the most severe punishment for murder. There has not been an execution in the commonwealth for 100 years. Treason is the only offense punishable by death.

The proposal that an electric chair be set up in the state prison at Jackson was defeated by a majority which probably will reach 55,000. With 1,771 precincts out of 3,407 reported, the vote was: For 138,573; against 163,168.

In contests for state office, republican candidates won over their democratic opponents by large majorities.

Former Mayor Charles Bowles, of Detroit, was defeated in an attempt at a political comeback. He ran against Judge John P. Scallen for judge of the recorders' court. Bowles resigned from the bench to run for mayor 18 months ago. He was elected and then was recalled from office after serving six months.

In yesterday's election he sought to regain his place on the bench.

Dennis To Visit Nation's Capital

Mr. and Mrs. Grace Dennis, of The Klamath Herald and News, left San Francisco Monday evening for Washington, D. C., and other eastern points. They will visit Vice President Charles Curtis, with whom they were associated in Kansas years ago, and other friends in the capital.

In New York they will attend the annual meeting of the Associated Press, of which the Herald and News are members, and will also be present at the National Newspaper Publishers' association annual meeting. Before returning home they expect to spend a few days in Boston. In Chicago and Kansas City they will spend several days with relatives and friends. Their early life was spent in eastern Kansas and in Kansas City.

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Trapeze Man Carries Out Circus Tradition

LOS ANGELES, April 7 (AP)—True to circus tradition, Alex Acevo, carried on with his aerial act last night, while his wife, Aurora, lay near death from a plunge to earth a few hours before.

Acevo, aided by others, pulled his wife to the top of the Al G. Barnes tent. She and three others, suspended only by rubber mouthpieces clamped between their teeth, began to spin rapidly in the "butterfly" act. Suddenly, as hundreds gasped in horror, Mrs. Acevo dropped. Her husband ran forward in an attempt to break her fall with his body but she crashed limp at his feet.

Time for the night performance came and Acevo walked across a slack wire high above the ground in perfect balance, smiling to hide the grimness of his face from the crowd. Mrs. Acevo, 30, was still unconscious at the Hollywood Police Emergency hospital early today. Apparently had been fractured. It had not been determined whether she lost her grip or a swivel broke.

Wizards Who Made Human Sacrifice of Boy Are Sentenced

PATNA, India, April 7 (AP)—Two local wizards today were sentenced to death for having made a living sacrifice of a young boy in the practice of their black magic.

Evidence showed that the sorcerers first kidnaped the boy, an unusually handsome fellow, and then murdered him on Shastri night, which is considered auspicious for sacrifices.

The head of the boy was severed with one stroke of the knife, as is the cast in a goat sacrifice. The remaining part of the body was then thrown in a well.

Portland Man Is Beaten By Thugs

PORTLAND, April 7 (AP)—Severely beaten by two men, he had driven to a lonely spot near Milwaukie, Emmet Coleman, cab driver, sought the aid of police today in solving the mystery of the slugging.

Coleman at first believed he had been robbed, as after the two men had beaten him and thrown him from the cab, he missed his wallet containing \$28. Later, however, the abandoned cab was found some distance from the scene of the assault. The wallet with money intact, was in the seat.
