Copco Will Shut Off Power Lines To Make Changes

The California Oregon Power company announced today that power would be shut off in the districts of Merrill, Malin and Bonanza, Saturday, April 11 from 2 to 5 a.m. This move is necessary to give employees of the company opportunity to increase the power load from 34,000 to 66,000 volts along the lines serving those and adjacent communities.

This will increase the capacity of the lines almost twice the previous power and will result in much better service to the towns affected.

Power will be shut off for three hours and farmers are asked to take particular notice of the announcement in order that they may make arrangements to heat incubators, etc., by some other method.

Towns affected will include Merrill, Malin, Tule Lake, Mount Laki, Olney, Dairy, Bonanza, Sprague River, Bly, Beatty and Langell Valley.

The changing of all sub-station transformers and other work necessary to increase the power loads of these lines will cost the California Oregon Power company in the neighborhood of \$30,000.
