

BOLD ROBBER STARTS PANIC IN BIG STORE

CHICAGO, April 8, (AP)—One man was shot to death, two were wounded, perhaps fatally, and several hundred customers in Marshall Field & Co. were thrown into a panic yesterday afternoon, when a lone, middle-aged robber attempted to escape after holding up and robbing a restaurant manager.

The robber, whose name is Fred Smith, 47, a jobless machinist, was booked today on charges of murder and robbery.

The man slain was Casimir Krazinski, 37, the proprietor of a flower stand on the landing of the elevated station at Randolph street and Wabash avenue. He was hit by five bullets as he stood near his stand.

The shooting started in front of Krazinski's stand. Smith, confronted John Galla, manager of a restaurant, and Miss Dorothy Woodburn, cashier of the restaurant, who were on their way to deposit the morning's receipts of \$1,067 in the bank. After taking the cash, Smith turned to the money from Galla at the point of a pistol, Smith started away, when James Dewey, a bystander, suddenly drew a revolver and began firing at Smith.

Krazinski was caught by bullets from both pistols. Dewey was likewise shot twice.

Unscathed, Smith darted over the ramp leading into Field's where the crowd following in full cry. "Get that man," one woman cried. "He's a killer, but his gun's unloaded. Grab him!"

Hearing her, Paul Townsend, 19, one of the store's bill adjusters, leaped onto the robber's shoulder. The gunman shot and wounded Townsend, and resumed his flight.

As Hugo Buck, another clerk, started to leap on Smith, the gunman pulled the trigger of his pistol, but it was empty. He fled down a circular stairway to the basement, where he encountered Mrs. Sarah Heathers, a bargain counter clerk, who promptly grabbed him by the wrist. The gunman as promptly hit her over the head with his empty revolver. She fell unconscious.

But, by this time, Buck and Henry Miller, another clerk, had leaped upon him, and he was buried beneath a mob of clerks and customers.

Attributes Life Of Crime To The Use Of Narcotics

PORTLAND, April 8, (AP)—Ahen-faced, trembling, blaming his life of crime on the narcotic habit, a thin wispy man was sentenced to ten years and six months in prison as he stood in circuit court here yesterday.

Jimmie Mallahan, 41, whose revelations to police cleared up robberies aggregating more than \$70,000 in Portland, pleaded for leniency. Ten years, he believed, would be enough.

Mallahan was indicted for a drug store holdup here and was arrested in Seattle. Many large robberies here, he said, were committed by him and "me buddy" Smith, who was killed by police in Oakland, Calif., last year.

Mallahan was sentenced to a reformatory when he was 10 years old. He has spent most of the succeeding years in prison, citing out a precarious living by crime between sentences, he revealed.

Finnish Women Are Asking Immediate Repeal of Dry Law

HELSINGFORS, Finland, April 8, (AP)—A petition signed by over 100,000 women of Finland, asking speedy repeal of the country's prohibition law, is to be presented to the president of the republic during the next few days.

Declaring themselves to be "advocates of true temperance," the women in their petition express anxiety over the fate of future generations because of what they alleged to be a continuous spread of drunkenness under the present dry statute.

"We feel ourselves powerless," the women declare in the petition, "while prohibition, with its destructive moral consequences exists, instead of a sensible law for controlling consumption of alcohol, to begin truly effective temperance work."

GNATS KILL LIVESTOCK

CLARKSDALE, Miss., April 8, (AP)—A plague of buffalo gnats today wrought havoc in the Mississippi river lowlands of this state. Arkansas and Louisiana, killing livestock and menacing the lives of people.

Harris Barnes, Coahoma county farm agent, said he had received reports of the death of 125 mules in the county within 48 hours from the pest. More than 10 mules have been reported killed in Arkansas and many head of livestock in Louisiana.

Authorities issued a warning to people to avoid the gnats, and livestock men are using every means to protect their cattle. The gnats arrive in swarms like clouds and settle on deserted houses in outlying sections as well as on barns and herds of cattle.

Veterinarians throughout this area are now administering to stricken stock.

Will Seek Names For Vote On Old Age Pension Law

SALEM, April 8, (AP)—The names of 17,938 voters will be sought on the initiative petition for an old age pension law, the campaign to be conducted under the title given by Frank E. Davis of Salem and 19 others.

The signature of this number will place the initiative upon the ballot in 1932. The petitioners have until about July 1, 1932, to get the eight percent of the vote case for the supreme court judges at the last election for this initiative.

Preliminary papers for the initiative were filed with the secretary of state late yesterday. It now goes to the Attorney General for a ballot title. Davis said petitions would be circulated at once.

BRITISH KING IS IMPROVING

WINDSOR, Eng., April 8, (AP)—The British public, which had been awaiting not without certain anxiety news from the sickroom of their monarch, was heartened this forenoon by an official statement that there was a slight improvement in condition of King George.

His Majesty had been suffering since last Sunday from a chest cold, which yesterday was described in an official bulletin as an attack of sub-acute bronchitis.

In view of yesterday's announcement that his progress, while satisfactory had been slow, today's statement from his castle residence that there had been an improvement was regarded as a favorable sign.

Authorities pointed out, however, that a condition like that of the King must take some time to clear up, at least several days.

Queen Mary, whose unremitting care in the critical days of two years ago played so great a part in the King's recovery, again is helping to keep his majesty cheerful.

Editor of Virgin Island Criticizes President Hoover

ST. THOMAS, Virgin Island, April 8, (AP)—The newspaper, St. Thomas Mail, in an editorial captioned "An Ill-Mannered Visitor," declares that the islands were "no poorhouse" when they were acquired by the United States, but that individual he the "stupid and unattractive federal laws" made them so.

"These American," the editorial continues, "who insultingly allude to the Virgin Islands today as a poorhouse, can only be devoid of decency, even though that individual be the President of the United States. He should have known better than to wound the susceptibilities of a loyal people."

Inspection Of Mail Delivery Now Underway

The semi-annual inspection of all carrier and parcel post routes is now being carried on under the supervision of Charles Whitmore, superintendent of mails at the Klamath Falls postoffice, according to a statement made this morning by John McCall.

Inspection of eleven city delivery routes and two parcel post routes, is being made. All mail is being counted, weighed and route and office time computed. The superintendent will recommend any adjustments which he finds necessary.

Postal carriers in the city cover 140 miles daily and parcel post deliverers cover 40 miles daily and deliver an average of 499 parcels, Mr. McCall stated.

Miss Madison, out to crack every world's mark for women, now holds 13 out of a possible 16 records.

STATE EXECUTIONER RESIGNS HIS POST

OKLAHOMA CITY, April 8, (AP)—After sending 13 men to death in the electric chair W. M. Treadwell has resigned as executioner at the state prison at McAlester.

"I've flipped the switch the last time," he said today. "I don't believe capital punishment is a crime deterrent. It should be abolished."

SOUTHERN PACIFIC MAKES TRAIL CHANGE

PORTLAND, April 8, (AP)—Effective April 26, the Southern Pacific train Oregonian, will operate only between Ashland and Portland, James A. Ormandy, passenger traffic manager, said today. The train now runs between Gerber, Calif., and Portland.

AT THE PELICAN The screen at the Pelican last night was a kaleidoscope of wide-eyed, now by always absorbing hues. Now it was filled with the vivid eyes of robust, exciting action, now with deep colors of the interplay of intimate human emotions, often with sweeping canvases of spectacular natural beauty.
