

RAILROAD SUES FOR RIGHT OF WAY PRIVILEGE

The Great Northern railway filed nine suits for condemnation of property for right-of-way purposes in its extension south from this city, in circuit court Thursday. Suits were filed by Fletcher Rockwood, G. N. attorney, and all were on property south of the city limits. In each case the property which the railroad wishes to acquire was described.

Through Rich Area
The suits were the first to be filed by the line in its extension south of Klamath into California to join the Western Pacific which is building north from Keddies, Calif., to connect with the Great Northern at Bieber, Calif.

It was the first intimation that the railroad had been having serious trouble in securing a right-of-way for the line which traverses the rich farming area, much of which is under irrigation. The line goes through the city limits of Merrill and within a short distance of Malin before turning due south to meet the Western Pacific.

Portland Voting On Bond Issue To Aid Unemployed

PORTLAND, April 10. (AP)—Two \$1,000,000 bond issues for the relief of unemployment were in the hands of voters of Portland and Multnomah county today.

Every registered voter in the city and county was eligible to cast his ballot.

City officials, in urging approval of the bond issues, declared 20,000 persons in Multnomah county are unemployed, and that 40,000 dependents brought the total of destitute to 60,000.

The bonds, if approved, will provide funds for city and county improvements requiring a large amount of hand labor. Funds for machine work, engineering, condemnation proceedings and overhead will not come out of the bond issue.

Potato Acreage of Nation Increases

Present planting intentions, just released from the United States bureau of agricultural economics, indicate an increase in acreage of potatoes in the United States of about 5 per cent over the acreage planted last year.

Allowing for natural loss and normal production, this will mean a yield of around 440,000,000 bushels, or 80,000,000 bushels more than the season of 1930. With general economic conditions but little improved over 1930, it is reasonable to suppose that the year 1931 will compete favorably with that of 1928.

It is interesting to note that practically all Western states show an increasing acreage this year. The increase being as follows: Idaho, 14,000 acres; Colorado, 15,000 acres; Wyoming, 10,000 acres; Montana, 6,000 acres; Utah, Oregon and California 4,000 acres each; Washington, 1,000 acres, or a total increase in Western states of 55,000 acres.
