

# Seals Looms As Contenders For Second Half Honors

## ANGELS, S. F. TIED FOR LEAD IN COAST RACE

San Francisco loomed more distinctly on the coast baseball horizon today as a contender for second half honors through a double victory over Los Angeles yesterday, which showed the Seals back into a first place tie with the Angels.

The Seals ran wild in the second inning of the first game to score six runs. They took the game 10 to 1. The Angels appeared winners in the second game until the ninth, when San Francisco scored three runs to boost its total to six, and defeat Los Angeles 6 to 5. San Francisco took the series five games to two.

Seattle and Portland split the day's activities, the Beavers blanking Seattle 8 to 0 in the first game, and Seattle returning to capture the second game 4 to 2. The Indians were allowed seven scattered hits by Orwoll in the first game, and Keating held Portland to five in the second. Two Portland errors aided the Indians in the closing tilt. Seattle took the series four games to three.

Sacramento won its series from Oakland by splitting yesterday's double-header, and gave the Acorns a bad jolt as far as second half aspirations went. Oakland took the first game 4 to 2, and the Senators won the second 10 to 2. With the last yesterday afternoon went the series and much of the ground gained in the pennant race for Oakland.

The Mission Reds divided a double-header with Hollywood, but took the series four games to three. The Reds won the initial tilt 2 to 1, and Hollywood took the next one 4 to 0. Hafey and Diviveros got homers for the Missions in the first game. Yde, Hollywood pitcher, struck out eleven Reds in the second game and allowed but two singles.

## Klamath Team, Home After Win Of 20-0 Over Alturas, Ready To Practice For Weed Battle

Back home after the first game and the first victory of the season, Klamath Union high school's football team was ready to get back to practice work Monday. The Pelicans defeated Alturas, 20 to 0, Saturday afternoon, and will take on Weed in another practice game next Saturday in the first home game. Coach Avritt is expected to do some shifting and re-vamping as a result of the Alturas game, which gave him his first opportunity to watch the Klamath team in action. Klamath was ragged in the first quarter at Alturas, the lighter Modoc team holding Avritt's men almost powerless. But in the second canto the Pelicans woke up, and slithered through for three touchdowns by the time the final whistle sounded. ## YANKS' RUSH FOR SECOND IS FEATURE

With the end of the major league season a week away and the two pennants firmly in the grasp of the Philadelphia Athletics and St. Louis Cardinals, there still are several places in the major league standings to be decided in the last seven days.

The National League is in a fairly settled condition with the first three places clinched, but only three of the American League clubs can be sure of where they will finish. The Yank's belated rush in one of the season's best winning streaks put New York ahead of Washington for second place on Saturday, and kept the McCarthymen there yesterday when each club won a double-header.

Two second inning rallies, bringing five runs apiece, gave New York a pair of victories over the Cleveland Indians, 7 to 1 and 10 to 4, and enabled Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig to continue their race for home run honors. Gehrig hit his 44th homer in the first rally and Ruth clouted his 44th in the second game burst. Henry Johnson and Gordon Rhodes turned in a pair of good mound performances.

Pat Caraway of the Chicago White Sox was the victim of Washington's double victory. He pitched the final inning of the opener, and was nipped for the run that gave the Senators a 4 to 3 victory, then relieved Garland for the last four frames of the second game and granted two runs in the seventh that cost him the game 6 to 4.

After clinching second place in the National League Saturday the New York Giants turned around and dropped both games of a double header to Chicago, allowing the Cubs to make sure of finishing no worse than third. Brooklyn took a 4 to 1 decision from the Cardinals, but the best the Robins can do now is to tie Chicago.

Heavy hitting and loose playing marked the Cub-Giant twin bill. Chicago hammered four pitchers for 20 hits in the opener to win 14 to 6, although Pat Malone allowed 14 safeties. In the second game Warnske and Parmelee each had one bad inning, the second, in which the Cubs almost too many years ago to mention that margin to the finish, winning 7 to 6.

An old familiar name appeared in yesterday's box scores. Keeping things moving for the one really doubtful National League position, the Cincinnati Reds sent the Boston Braves into seventh, behind the idle Phillies, by winning two games. Larry Benton allowed the Braves six hits to win the opener 5 to 2, while an eight-run rally in the seventh decided the second clash 14 to 5.

## Stocky People As Strong as Tall Statistics Show

SALEM, Ore. (UP)—Stocky Oregonians needn't feel small in company of tall men of the same weight. Reports on the strength of men between 20 and 24 years showed that on an average the men were superior in pulling, pushing, hand-ripping and lung powers to taller men of the same weight.

Slender men were usually better at lifting, however, and in many cases eclipsed stocky men in hand grip. In related experiments, health officials found that greatest strength is attained by the average man at 30 years. Lung force also increases to 30 years, but declines more slowly than strength, lung fatigue showing little relation to age up to 30 years.

The greatest lifting and pulling power of all the men studied was demonstrated by the shortest men in the 160 to 169 pounds. These lifted 234 kilos on an average.
