Allan R. Stover Dies Saturday in Klamath Falls

Allan R. Stover, 39, store manager for the Forest Lumber company at Pine Ridge for the last two years, died in Klamath Falls Saturday afternoon following a brief illness.

Funeral services will be held at the Earl Whitlock funeral home Monday at 2:30 p. m. and interment will be made in Linkville cemetery.

Stover was born in Fordyce, Ark., on December 13, 1881, and at the time of his death was aged 49 years, 9 months and 6 days. He is survived by his wife, Almeta Stover, and a son, Glenn Stover, both of Pine Ridge.

STANDARD OIL TO MANAGE GAS PLANT

The Standard Oil company of California has taken over the sales management of the Natural Gas Corporation of Oregon, entirely relieving the gas company of this duty, according to an announcement made Saturday by S. J. Coull, local manager for Standard Oil.

At the present time, S. R. Sharpton will be retained in charge of the operating end and properties, under the management of the Standard Oil company.

Officials of the oil company have been in the city for the past several days, completing plans for this change.

Property of the Natural Gas Corporation here amounts to half a million dollars, which investment, it is felt, has been welcomed by the city. Coull who also manages all Klamath valley stations for the company will be directly in charge of the sales management of the gas corporation. Since the change, the organization has been doubled, adding several new families to the community.

Coull stated that the organization naturally expects to give the city of Klamath Falls the best of service, as it has one of the most modern gas plants in existence. Offices will be retained at 721 Klamath avenue. The Natural Gas Corporation of Washington has been taken over by Standard Oil as well as that of Oregon, it was learned.

Miniature Mill To Be Sent To Salem

The miniature sawmill, property of the Klamath chamber of commerce, will be sent to Salem Monday, to be exhibited at the Oregon State fair, it was learned Saturday.

The request for the loan of the little mill was made by George Pearson, general chairman of Employees Wood Promotion, a committee of the Pacific Northwest Lumber employees.

Directors Of District After McCormick Site

The board of directors of the Klamath Irrigation district Saturday instructed Secretary A. L. Crawford to request United States Senators Charles McNary and Frederick Steiwer and Congressman Robert H. Butler, of the second district, to start preliminary work for the introduction of a bill into congress as soon as it convenes to secure the McCormick power site on the Klamath river for the district.

Near the close of the board meeting, Director Sam Dehlinger brought the matter up. Chairman E. M. Hammond called for a motion which was made by Director J. L. Jacob and seconded by Dehlinger. It was stated by Dehlinger that the district wants to get the matter before congress as early as possible to prevent its being killed in committee as happened last year.

Want McCormick Site The district wishes to secure the power site at the appraisal value of \$12,500 set by the department of the interior, and have the title transferred to the district.

The board went on record as opposing a suggestion of the local reclamation service that dredging in Poe valley and drainage work be postponed until the spring of 1932. The board stated that they wished the work to be done as soon as possible.

H. J. Tichnor, prominent Langell valley rancher, appearing before the board, in the presence of D. E. Hayden, superintendent of the Klamath Project of the U. S. Reclamation service, to ask that the board go on record as opposing the leasing of the Tule Lake sump lands this fall unless a stipulation is made

in the leases that the land will be used only for pasture. Tichnor stated that he plans to present his protest at the meeting of the Pomona grange next Saturday at Henley. The Klamath Irrigation board took no action on the protest.

Says Price Forced Down Tichnor stated that the lessees of the sump lands get the lands at from 12 1/2 cents an acre per year up, and that they get irrigation water at a low rate. Then products raised on the land, such as hay and grain, are marketed in competition with products raised on the farms in the Klamath district and the Klamath Empire.

He contends that with the government reducing the acreage of crops they should start on their own land. Lessees of the sump land can sell their products for less than can other farmers and in that manner force the price down, Tichnor states.

Wants Equal Water Tax Director Dehlinger stated that he believed that the Tule Lake lessees should pay the same for water that the farmers in the Klamath district pay. He thought it unfair that the district should maintain the ditches from the Klamath Lake reservoir through the entire district and then have the Tule Lake lessees get their water for less than those in the Klamath district. Tichnor also mentioned that the lessees, besides getting the land for a low rental, getting their water for less than those in the other projects, pay no taxes on their leased federal lands.

October 9 Sure Date for Modoc Field Ceremony

October 9 is definitely set as the date for the Ashland-Klamath Falls football game, and the dedication of the Modoc athletic field. It was announced last night by Principal Paul Jackson of Klamath Union high school. Jackson received word from Ashland that the date for the game would be satisfactory. Percy Murray, head of the program committee for the dedication, is awaiting word from Sam Dolan, noted football official, who has been asked to officiate at the game and to make the outside address at the dedication. E. B. Hall will make the local talk.

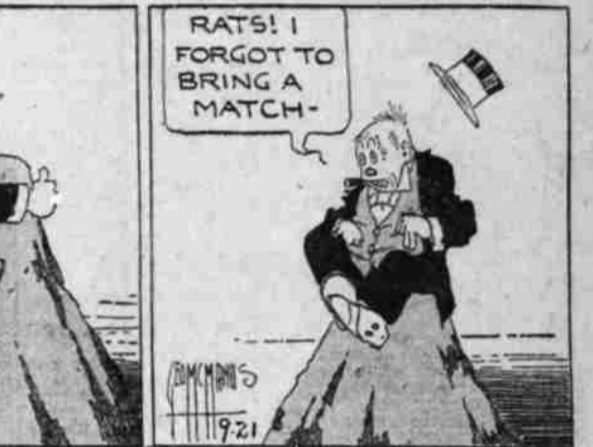
