

DEMOCRATS HAPPY OVER 1932 HOPES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14 (UP)— Jubilant at the outlook for the 1932 presidential campaign, Democratic leaders today announced a drive for a \$1,500,000 "victory fund."

John H. Fisher, newspaper publisher of Worcester, Mass., has been made executive chairman of the victory fund committee. He will have with him 538 leading Democrats, including all Democratic national committee members and Democratic state chairmen.

Such leaders work and presidential possibilities as Franklin Roosevelt, Newton D. Baker, Albert C. Ritchie, Owen Young, James A. Hoad, Alfred E. Smith, James M. Cox, Joseph T. Robinson and John N. Garner are working in the interests of the fund.

John W. Davis, presidential candidate in 1924, and John J. Raskob, chairman of the Democratic national committee, joined Fisher in announcing the fund. Davis' statement was particularly optimistic, and reflected the feeling of many Democrats that they are going to return to power after 12 years.

"The victory fund is about to be instituted at a time when the political position of the party is almost impregnable," said Davis. "Its prospects of victory were never brighter."

"Justifying the party's optimism are the elections in and since 1920, decisive proof of the growing change for administrative sentiment and an indication of the success of our efforts for victory next year."

Shouse pointed out that the committee of 538, in addition to preparing the party financially to "meet the pre-convention needs for victory" would provide a valuable nucleus "by building up further the militant strength of the party organization itself."

Indian Chief Will Die in Chair for Murder of Infant

HUNTSVILLE, Tex., Oct. 14 (UP)—Chief Red Wing, scion of a long line of Cherokee Indian chiefs, must die in the electric chair here November 19 for killing two-year-old Evangeline Cavazos.

The Indian, who spends his last days fashioning trinkets of beads, signed a confession that he stole the child from a house where her parents were staying last October, in New Braunfels, killed her and hid her body behind a signboard near the railroad tracks. He said "fire-water" was to blame. The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry C. Cavazos, and Chief Red Wing were all trouper in a carnival playing at New Braunfels at the time.

SPAIN RESCINDS STATE RELIGION

MADRID, Oct. 14 (UP)—The centuries old influence of the Catholic church on the government of Spain was formally ended Tuesday when the constitutional assembly, laying the framework of the new republic, declared that "there is no state religion."

Breaking away from the monarchical practice of the past, the republican leaders rejected Catholicism as the official state religion and hinted that the outcome of their policy would be the immediate dissolution of Jesuit and other church organizations and the nationalization of their property. The Catholic orders are accused of threatening the security of the state.

Lost Longhorn Herd Enriches Texas Man

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Oct. 14 (UP)—Remains of a lost herd of longhorn cattle, famous in the history of the Texas range, have been found by L. D. Bertillon of Minocola, Tex., and their horns have made him rich.

In 1812 Jacob Don Loner's entire herd of several thousand longhorns stampeded in a storm near Terlingua Creek. They were never found. That is, not until Bertillon trailed a nearby canyon to a cave opening and found a great heap of bones and horns. Bertillon has since sold more than \$50,000 worth of horns, and is now negotiating for a sale to the Prince of Wales.
