Orsua, who was charged with larceny of a drum and cymbals, was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary, while Helms, charged with forgery, received a penitentiary sentence of two years.

**INDIANS TO MEET MONDAY AT AGENCY**

The business committee of the Klamath Indians met Tuesday afternoon at Klamath Agency to discuss policies for their delegates to follow out when they go to Washington, D. C., in the interests of the tribe this fall.

Wade Crawford, president of the business committee, and Levi Walker, are the elected delegates to the national capital.

Speaking before the business committee of the tribe, Levi Walker suggested a round table discussion of the problems of the tribe at the Agency next Monday. He asked that leading members of the tribe as well as the committee composed of Wade Crawford, chairman, Elmer Hill, Ida Crawford, Joe Kirk, Seldon Kirk and Tommy Lang attend.

He asked that differences between members of the tribe be forgotten and that all work in an attempt to formulate a program for the delegates to go by in Washington.

Klamath Agency and Chiloquin sources discounted a report Wednesday that Wade Crawford had stated that he would not go to the capital with Levi Walker, who has been politically opposed to Crawford.
