

STRENGTH ABROAD IN WOOL IS NOTED

PORTLAND, Oct. 17. (AP)—While wool prices continue practically unchanged in this country and even dullness is reflected in spots in the Atlantic coast sections, strength is generally indicated abroad with some advances in prices, the Journal says today. A late advice from South Africa says that Merino wool prices were mostly 5 per cent higher than last week at the sales held at Capetown. Competition at the sales was keen and bidding was reported active with the finer grades in best request. Consumption of wool has been greatly increased in practically all world's markets during the last six months, due in a measure to the extreme low price of woolen goods. The gain in the United States has been unusually heavy, which is expected to create more than passing interest soon in new clip contracts. However there is a disposition at this time to believe that contracting by private firms will be limited for a while at least.

HUGE FIRE RAGES NEAR HILDEBRAND

A forest fire, raging through five or six miles of valuable timbered land about 15 miles above Hildebrand, defied efforts of over 100 fire fighters Friday, according to reports from the Big Lakes camp, located close to the blazing area.

A. J. Vora of the Big Lakes Box company returned late last night from Hildebrand, and reported that the fire was destroying some merchantable timber, but had not reached the heaviest stands yet. He reported that all men from the camp, although exhausted from fighting the flames, were doing their utmost to get the blaze under control. Winds whipped the flames into fury, and the fire was spreading rapidly.

The fire started in lumber slashings but leaped bounds late Thursday. Fifty men were dispatched from the camp, and an additional crew of over 50 sent out Friday.

TRAFFIC TIPS

The provisions of this act applicable to drivers upon the highways shall apply to the drivers of all vehicles owned or operated by the United States, this state or any county, city, town, district or any other political subdivision of the state, subject to such specific exceptions as are set forth in this act with reference to authorized emergency vehicles. The provisions of this act shall not apply to persons, teams, motor vehicles and other equipment while actually engaged in work upon the surface of a highway, but shall apply to such persons and vehicles when traveling to or from work.

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IF YOU read the dailies news in the papers, along with the sprightly stories, such as the doings of colorful characters like Scarface Al Capone, you have noted that since the beginning of its fiscal year—which means money year—on July 1, the government of the United States has gone into the red to the extent of a half billion dollars.

This is partly due to the fact that its income has fallen off and ALSO due to the fact that it has spent too much. Governments, you see, are just like private individuals.

LAST year, the government of this great country ran behind in its accounts a little less than a billion dollars. In the first three and a half months of the present fiscal year, it has run up a debt of approximately a half billion.

So far, this isn't serious, because in this great and rich and STILL GROWING country the addition of a billion and a half dollars to the public debt isn't anything to worry about.

But the process WILL BE SERIOUS if it isn't checked.

ALL the serious financial difficulties of Europe, and they have been numerous, as everyone knows, started with the spending by governments of more money than these governments were taking in.

That is exactly what we are doing in this country, and if we KEEP IT UP long enough even we will get into serious trouble, great and rich as we are.

ONE reassuring thing about us is that down at the bottom, under all the fluff and the feathers, we are pretty apt to have a layer of good, solid horse sense.

The American Federation of

Labor, meeting at Vancouver, B. C., displayed this inherent horse sense the other day when it voted down a resolution calling for public unemployment insurance in the United States.

It would be FINE, of course, if we could prevent unemployment, and the very best minds we have must be devoted to seeing to it that in the future jobs are provided for as many workers as possible.

That is essential to permanent prosperity.

BUT the moment the government of the United States says to all its people: "You no longer have to worry about getting and HOLDING a job, because in the future the government will take care of you, no matter what happens," the efficiency of this country will be GONE, and in the future we will slide down hill instead of climbing on and on to new heights of achievement.

Ex-Baseball Head Dies in Chicago

CHICAGO, Oct. 17. (AP)—Charles Webb Murphy, owner of the Chicago Cubs baseball team from 1906 to 1914, died at his home Friday after a lingering illness. He was 63 years old.

Under Murphy's ownership, the Cubs won four National league championships and two world series and developed the Tinker to Everson Chance combination. He was forced out of his position in 1914 when he became involved in federal league war.

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
