

LIONS OUTLINE PLANS FOR 1932 STATE MEETING

Preliminary plans for the annual state convention of Lions clubs of Oregon to be held in Klamath Falls were discussed at a meeting of directors and the convention committee of the Lions club held in the chamber of commerce last evening. Fred Walker of Springfield, Ore., district governor of the Lions clubs of the state, attended the meeting over which T. R. Gillenwaters, president, presided.

A round table discussion of convention plans was held. The exact dates for the convention which is to take place here in July, 1932, will be set at a forthcoming meeting.

Walker expressed the opinion that the convention will be one of the most successful ever held in Oregon. He also stated that 100 delegates of Lions clubs of the nation enroute to the international convention in Los Angeles, will stop over in Klamath Falls long enough to attend the state meeting.

In addition to that group, 750 Oregon delegates will attend the Klamath meeting. Each club in the state, of which there are 52, will be allowed two voting delegates, and many others will attend.

Attending the meeting were T. R. Gillenwaters, president, Leon Crawford, vice president, Jack Glover, secretary, Randall Bargett, Charles O. Moore, W. E. Clifton, Webb Kennett, Charles House and Jim Baker, directors, and Perry DeLap, J. Johnson and H. Conrad, members of the convention committee.

Walker has been invited to attend the chamber of commerce directors meeting this noon.
