

175 SHRINERS TO LEAVE FOR RENO TONIGHT

About 175 Shriners will leave Klamath Falls at 9 o'clock this evening for Reno on a Southern Pacific special train, where the Hillah temple and the Korak temple of Reno will hold a joint ceremonial Saturday and Sunday.

About 50 Shriners from Klamath Falls will be joined by members from the Rogue river valley cities. The Hillah temple drum corps of Klamath, the band from Ashland and the patrol from Medford and Grants Pass will be on the special train.

The Shriners will arrive in Reno at 7 a. m. Saturday and in the afternoon will attend the homecoming football game of Nevada University and Fresno State college.

Saturday evening the joint ceremonial will be held. Sunday the visitors will be taken on sight seeing tours of Reno and on auto trips Sunday evening.

At 9 o'clock the Southern Pacific special will leave Reno, arriving in Klamath Falls at 7 a. m. Monday.

A dinner will accompany the special train from Reno, and a buffet supper and breakfast may be secured on the diner. A special round trip fare of \$10 was made for the excursion by the railroad company.

FERN MORLEY, FREED HERE AS KILLER, VICTIM

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was informed of the death of her son, Fern Morley, in Reno.

The mother, Mrs. J. L. Pigg, said her son was a rodeo performer, using her maiden name, which she said he had adopted legally.

His wife is living in Yellow Pine, Idaho, with their two year old daughter, Mrs. Pigg said they had been separated for a "long time" although not divorced.

Mrs. Joyce Conrad, also shot to death by her husband along with Morley, visited Mrs. Pigg here several months ago, the mother said, but she declined to say whether her son had accompanied her.

Morley was on trial once in Klamath Falls, Ore., she said, and was acquitted. She did not recall the occasion.

He has four brothers and a sister. His father is working in the hills above Bole and was expected back tonight. He had not been told of his son's death.

Morley was acquitted in Klamath county of charges of first degree murder in connection with the death of November 29, 1928 of James H. Randall back of the Bly hotel.

The men fought with clubs and knives following a celebration marking the opening of the Bly hotel. They had been drinking some. It was brought out at the trial. Randall died of the injuries he received. Morley pleaded self defense and was acquitted. An old grudge and differences over money was the cause of the fight.

It was admitted during the trial that Morley had been living with Rose English for a time and that they were unmarried.

Following his acquittal Morley left this section of the country.

Winnie Ruth Judd, hunted murder suspect, police today awaited the outcome of the coroner's inquest into the slaying of Mrs. Agnes Le Roi and Miss Hedvig Samuelson before questioning McKinnell.

At least a dozen witnesses were summoned by Coroner Frank Nance to testify at the inquest into the killings of Miss Samuelson and Mrs. Le Roi, both of Phoenix, Arizona, whose bodies were discovered in two trunks here.

Mrs. Judd is sought in connection with the deaths.

Student's Story Studied

L. J. Andrews, Phoenix county attorney, and Inspector David Davidson said they believed McKinnell had not told them all he knew of the whereabouts of Mrs. Judd who disappeared from his automobile on a downtown street soon after they called at a railroad station for the trunks.

Mrs. Judd fled after a station agent saw blood seeping from one of the trunks and questioned her.

They said they learned from Russell B. Howe, brother student of McKinnell, that a few hours after he and his sister had called at the railroad station to claim the trunks, McKinnell approached Howe with a plea for money.

"If you ever wanted to help me," Howe said McKinnell told him, "help me now. My sister has become involved in a terrible tragedy, a horrible crime and you must help me. I need money, anything, five dollars. I have none and she has practically none."

Is Contradictory

The alleged conversation occurred on the University campus and is in direct contradiction of McKinnell's declarations that he did not know where Mrs. Judd was after she left her in the downtown corner.

McKinnell was among witnesses summoned for the inquest. Others were Dr. W. C. Judd, the missing woman's husband; A. V. Anderson, the station agent who questioned Mrs. Judd, several policemen from Los Angeles and Phoenix and two maids from a railroad station who discovered a hat box containing portions of Mrs. Le Roi's body.

Value of Farm Products Shows Notable Advance

NEW YORK, Oct. 23, (AP)—More cheerful news for the farmer is found in a tabulation showing that the value of leading farm products—wheat, cotton and corn, has increased some \$170,000,000 in the past two weeks by the upward swing in the futures markets.

Figures based on current quoted prices indicate an increase since Oct. 2, in the value of wheat of \$1,000,000, of cotton \$151,694,000 and of corn \$114,377,000.

Consideration is given to the government's latest estimate of the current crop, in estimating the increased valuation of cotton, also in the carryover from last season. Wheat estimates also include the current crop and carryover. The entire estimated crop, including the present harvest, is figured in the valuation increase.

Lindsay Is Near Seattle On Trip To Face Charges

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 23, (AP)—Frank Everett Lindsay, being returned from San Francisco to Seattle to face charges of wife slaying, passed through Portland today in custody of deputies William Bears and William Coffey of Seattle. The party traveled by train after having abandoned an air trip at Corning because of bad weather.

The officers will take Lindsay from the train at Tacoma at 1 p. m. and continue the trip to Seattle by automobile to avoid the large crowd expected at the Seattle station.

Lindsay appeared haggard and worn, although at times he smiled freely when someone sought to joke with him.

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GASOLINE RATE ARGUMENTS TO BE ON MONDAY

SALEM, Oct. 23, (AP)—Final arguments in one of the most important cases to come before the public utilities commissioner is today—the controversy between rail carriers and trucks regarding lower tariff schedules on gasoline, will be heard here Monday.

Commissioner Charles M. Thomas announced today. He considers the case a forerunner of others of similar nature in the contest between these two carrier types for business.

Ruling on the question, Thomas said, was to be made immediately after the arguments of attorneys were presented. Hearings on the tariff schedule as filed jointly by rail carriers in the state covered a period of two weeks, testimony was presented both at Salem and Portland.

Truck Companies Protest

Rail carriers in Oregon had filed a tariff schedule on gasoline and other petroleum products, reducing rates on an average of 25 per cent, as of July 1 and which tariff carried an expiration date.

The tariff was suspended by Thomas on complaint of the Asbury Transportation company and other truck companies.

At the hearing it was brought out that the commissioner gave three reasons for ordering the suspension and the subsequent investigation.

Three Reasons

That the expiration date of the tariff destroyed the regulatory control over rates in rates which might later be made was given as the first of these. The others included desire for evidence as to whether the public would be benefited, and whether the proposed reduction would be compensatory, and if not where the loss would be placed.

In the brief filed by the Asbury Transportation company, a witness for the rail carriers was quoted as saying the purpose and objective of lower rates were so the railroads could retain all the traffic they still had and to recapture the traffic lost. It still further charges the witness with saying further reductions were anticipated until the purpose had been accomplished. This, it was extended, would be done at the expense of competing companies, and would eventually put the trucks out of business. Such action, it claimed, would be contrary to law.

Hawaiian Governor Enters Hospital

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 23, (AP)—Governor Lawrence Judd of the Hawaiian Islands entered Stanford hospital here today after symptoms of a mild form of grippe had developed.

Dr. W. W. Boardman, who is attending Governor Judd, said tonight the executive was in need of a rest, but probably would not be confined to the hospital more than three or four days.

BRITISH TROOPS QUELL UPRISING

NICOSIA, Island of Cyprus, Oct. 22 (AP)—British troops arrived here and at Larnaca, an important city of the island, today for duty in case of further demonstrations against the government.

One demonstrator was killed and 11 wounded in disorders which began here Wednesday. Many police were wounded in the government house in which an estimated 5,000 participated.

Most of the mob were students who shouted demands for a union of Cyprus with the Greek government. They were incited by priests. It is believed they burned automobiles belonging to the governor, the colonial secretary and the police, smashed windows and doors, and finally set fire to the government house, which burned to the ground.

Police finally dispersed the mob. The troops reaching here today came from Mount Roodos. Troops arrived at Larnaca from Paphos and Famagusta garrisons.

P. T. A. ANNUAL CONFERENCE IS CLOSED TODAY

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 23, (AP)—The 25th annual conference of the Oregon congress of the Parent-Teacher association closed here today without selecting the 1932 meeting place. Salem invited the conference to meet there next year, but the decision will be made later by the board.

The conference adopted a resolution suggesting some form of school taxation be developed to relieve a portion of the property tax.

Ashland was awarded a trophy cup for the largest membership, according to the enrollment. Salem won a cup for the greatest membership increase outside of Portland, with a gain of 155 2-3 per cent.

Taxation Resolution

The resolution on school taxation passed by the conference was:

"Whereas, During periods of financial stringency the school curriculum through the budgets always is in jeopardy; and

"Whereas, Real property is carrying the entire cost of education and this percentage of taxation on real property will appear

HOME HOSPITALS FOR VETS SOUGHT

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 23, (AP)—A proposal to support local hospitals rather than national government institutions was before the legislative session of the Oregon Medical Society here today.

The proposal urged that United States war veterans receive disability insurance from the government enabling them to receive hospitalization in their own communities from their own doctor, rather than be obliged to leave their own cities and go to a distant institution.

The suggestion was made by Dr. M. B. McDaniel, chairman of the committee on public policy in a report to the convention this morning.

"The medical profession is very much in favor of government aid to veterans," he said.

"But why should thousands of beds in local hospitals remain empty while veterans are asked to travel perhaps hundreds of miles to seek aid in another city? The best interests of the public, the government, and the medical profession would seem to indicate that such needs would best be served through local agencies."

Dr. Karl H. Martzloff, chairman of the committee on medical education, presented a plan for study of all Oregon hospitals to be made next year with a view toward standardization.

Membership of W.C.T.U. Increases

ALBANY, Ore., Oct. 23, (AP)—An increase in membership in the Women's Christian Temperance Union has been shown in 19 of the 138 unions in Oregon, it was revealed here today at the 45th annual state convention of the organization. The total increase in membership was 317.

Multnomah county was presented with the banner for attaining the 100 per cent efficiency standard.

Officers will be elected Saturday. In the afternoon next year's meeting place will be selected and the program "The Crusade Program" will be given.
