

Northern Hopes Gone For Season

Doc Spears Sees Little Chance For This Sector in South Next Year Either

L. H. Gregory, sporting editor of The Oregonian, responded with Dr. Clarence W. Spears Wednesday night just before the Oregon team entrained for the east to play North Dakota at Grand Forks today and New York University at Poughkeepsie next Saturday, and learned that Southern California really cannot be beaten. The Trojans, of course, already have lost to St. Mary's this season, but the way things have been going on for the last three Saturdays—wallpapers for Oregon State, Washington and the University of Oregon—that first game with the Gaels apparently belongs to a dead and buried and practically forgotten past.

But here are a few gleams from Mr. Gregory's talk with the doctor:

"It will have to be a team with a great line to beat Southern California. Notre Dame has a better line than last year, although her backs are not quite as good, so draw your own conclusions."

This is one of Dr. Spears' most significant remarks:

"The eleven men on the Trojan first team are better than the best eleven football team in the country, who have ever attended Oregon since football began here. Or who ever went to Oregon State, for that matter."

That was a large order all bound up in one statement, and, whether or not it was true, there will be any number of patriotic Beavers and Webfoots who will try to tear it to pieces.

Dr. Spears told Gregory that a team with big ends, such as Washington State had last year, could pile up the U. S. C. backfield and smash the interference. But to quote Mr. Gregory again:

"Doc said that no northern eleven can hope to beat the Trojans this year. Washington being the one team left with a chance to try, and he isn't sure that any northern team will have a much better chance next year."

"But after that—it's very evident the good Dr. Spears has hopes."

"Doc downhearted after losing 53 to 0? Not so you'd notice it. All that is in the far past so far as his football team is concerned. Doc isn't even worrying about the New York game. He figures it enough to worry over just now to figure a way to keep North Dakota from beating the Webfoots at Grand Forks."

Jonathan Butler, the commissioner for the Pacific coast football conference, has grown about as popular in the northwest as a Southern California football team. After raising all the dust and having Joe Lillard, Oregon's star back, roused out of the football fields for good, Butler has been given an uncompromising title. He is now recognized as the \$5,000 stool-pigeon.

Impromptu holidays after a major football triumph have been pretty scarce. A few of the youngsters remember a day off following the only lonely win from Medford in



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Anderson Beats Wallace. Frisbie, Sandehl Draw

NORWEGIAN TO GET CHANCE AT SONNENBERG

Roy Anderson, a preacher of the gospel, with an abundance of cleverness and strength in the wrestling ring, thoroughly overpowered Jack Wallace, light heavyweight champion of all Australia, in the main event of the wrestling card at the Legion hall last night.

Wallace took the first fall in 12 minutes with a wristlock, but the Norwegian came back after the rest period to send the man from the antipodes to the mat with a vicious Sonnenberg tackle. The final fall was over in six minutes when the ex-preacher, feigning a groggy condition against the ropes, rushed out and floored his opponent in a head-on smash to the chest.

Anderson's impressive victory has given him first call to meet Gus Sonnenberg, former world champion, here next month. The Norwegian already has accepted the bout, and Bill Elliott, promoter, will schedule it for the Legion hall in about two weeks.

Ray Frisbie, young tiger from Medford, and Bill Sandahl, wild-man from the desolate Dorris region, went primitive in a grudge fight which ended in a double knockout. With nothing barred Frisbie and Sandahl went after each other like young animals on the hunt. Sandahl had the Medford man pounding the mat in nine minutes with a toe hold. Frisbie took the second with a pin-fall, which was enforced with a right punch to the jaw. Both men came back for the final round with almost unprecedented fierceness. The period hardly had started when Frisbie hurled himself at his opponent. Their heads met with a crack, and neither had sufficient sense nor power to rise.

They will be re-matched in a winner-take-all bout.

In the preliminaries Big Boy Ritter, Gold Hill, and Ed Demmer, Medford, wrestled to a draw. Big Boy won the first fall in 12 minutes with a press hold, and Demmer, who also fights under the name of MacDougal, slipped on a crab hold to take the second fall in eight minutes. Both were wrestling at the end of the 30-minute time period.

Jack Renow of Salt Lake and Ted Williams of Texas-Kansas wrestled to a draw in a 15-minute preliminary.

In a mixed bout Romeo O'Hagen, ancient and battler, fell from a long ago glorious ring career, was put down for two falls by Jack Beal.

The entire card was a popular one with the packed house at the Legion hall. The borderline brutality of the Frisbie-Sandahl go unmasked the spectators and turned them into yelling maniacs. The cleverness of Roy Anderson in combating the roughness of the Australian Wallace was cheered. Wallace, one of the best light heavies in America today, staked everything on this bout with the hope of getting the match with Sonnenberg.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 24. (AP)—Two knockdowns helped Tony Poloni, 170, of Reno, to win a decision over Jimmy Hannah, 174, of Pocatello, Idaho, here last night.

Hannah was only a little short of victory in the eighth round. Early in that frame Poloni landed a hard right to the jaw and Hannah dropped for no count. Immediately after rising, Hannah sent a right to Poloni's chin and the latter went down. The Idaho boxer tried to follow up his advantage but was too tired to make much headway. Poloni also scored a knockdown in the first round.

Six rounds were taken by Poloni, three by Hannah and one was even.

WILLAMETTE WINS OVER IDAHO TEAM

SALEM, Oct. 24. (AP)—The Willamette University football eleven opened its Northwest conference schedule here last night with a 29 to 0 victory over the College of Idaho. The Bearcats scrimmaged their way to victory against a hard fighting team from Caldwell, which for a time looked dangerous with its passing attack.

Walter Erickson, the star player of the season so far for Coach "Spec" Keene, made four touchdowns during the game, but only two of them counted. Penalties brought the other two back. During the first quarter the College of Idaho took the ball from a Willamette punt and started marching up the field to the ten-yard line. Here they lost the ball when a fourth down pass over the goal line was broken up.

Willamette was held scoreless in the first and last quarters, while two touchdowns were scored in the second and another in the third. During the first period the College of Idaho threatened the scoring goal twice, but at all times proved dangerous with their overhead offensive. Quarterback McCulloch for Idaho succeeded in slipping through for several long runs for his team, each time outrunning his interference.

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BROUILLARD WINS WELTER CHAMPIONSHIP

BOSTON, Oct. 24. (AP)—Lou Brouillard, 20-year-old French Canadian youth from Worcester, today occupied the welterweight throne.

The rugged youngster beat Jack Thompson, who had gained the title from Jackie Fields two years ago. A furious barrage of left hooks dropped the negro champion twice during last night's 15-round battle in the Boston Garden and the title passed by unanimous decision.

The championship bout, the first held in this state in 11 years and the first such welterweight contest since Honey Melody, Boston, defeated Joe Walcott, drew a capacity attendance of 15,500. Boston Garden officials estimated the gate receipts at \$35,000. Thompson's contract called for 50 per cent of this amount and Brouillard received 10 per cent in addition to the championship.

Thompson allowed himself to be chased about the ring during 12 of the 15 sessions. Brouillard pounded his head and body with lefts as he gracefully dodged but few of the many straight rights aimed at him. The negro was beaten to the canvas in the 10th and 13th, staying down for nine in both rounds.

Thompson tried to claim a foul in the sixth, when Brouillard landed a dubious hook that was described as a foul by several observers who had an excellent view of the blow. Referee Johnny Brassil refused to allow it.

Drinking Party Ends in Fight

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 24. (AP)—Glenn Gilbert, 27, alias Glenn England, was in "fair" condition today after an operation had been performed to remove bullets from his body. He was shot during a gun fight in an apartment here early today. He may recover.

The former Prescott, Ariz., man was shot twice in the chest and twice in the stomach. Meanwhile, police continued hunting for a man known to them as Bobby La Salle, who was alleged to have fired the shots that hit Gilbert and Jack De Vore, 21. De Vore was wounded in the arm.

The fight occurred during a drinking party.

Seven Killed As Result of Clash

LIMA, Peru, Oct. 24. (AP)—Seven persons, including two women, were killed today when police clashed with the populace of the village of Parimamarca. At least 25 others were wounded. The populace had held a mass meeting protesting against alleged arbitrary actions by certain sub-prefects of the district. Police clashed with the demonstrators in an effort to end the protests.

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Lincoln, Grant In Scoreless Tie

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 24. (AP)—Lincoln and Grant played a scoreless football game here last night in the Portland interscholastic league. Lincoln had a chance to score in the second period but lost the ball on a fumble on the 4-yard mark.

Jefferson and Washington continued to lead the league in the percentage column with Benson and Lincoln tied for second honors.
