

Sometimes An Official Goes Astray

Incident in Klamath-Medford Game Recalls A Few Questionable Decisions

Referee, umpire and all the miscellaneous officials of sport, bless 'em, sometimes change the progress of a game. The men who rule football with the whistle usually are right, but when they are wrong—and they do make occasional and unpurposeful mistakes—they often are found wrong.

Last Thanksgiving Day the University of Oregon team, in the melancholy dumps after losing to Oregon State in the annual civil war conflict at Corvallis, went south expecting nothing more than an overwhelming defeat from St. Mary's.

The Gaels won by a surprisingly low score, 7 to 6, but nearly everyone but Referee Tom Louttit of Portland alleged the contest should have gone to the Webfoots either 14 or 15 to 7. The disputed touchdown followed a pass over the goal line from Johnny Kitzmiller to Steve Fletcher. Fletcher completed the pass—or at least held the ball long enough—and then dropped it. Louttit ruled the score out, and Oregon lost one of its greatest under-dog fights in history.

A week ago Saturday an almost unexplainable play occurred in the Washington State-California game which brought victory to the Golden Bears, 13 to 7. A pair of Cougar defenders brought down a Bear ball carrier and then, thinking the play complete, released him. The referee, who was the same Mr. Tom Louttit, failed to blow his whistle, and the Californian galloped off to score.

In 1929 Commerce High and Washington High met in a play-off for the championship of the city of Portland. Commerce took the ball on Washington's 1-yard line with four downs to punch over the winning score. On the first play a Stenog back clawed his way over the line, but was forced back again by the Washington linemen. The referee barred what has been always maintained a legitimate touchdown. There has been no attempt in this column to criticize decisions of a single referee, but it is just coincidental that Louttit again was the blunderer.

Last Friday night in the wrestling matches at American Legion hall another referee slipped-up. Ray Anderson and Jack Wallace came back for the third fall all squares. Anderson pinned the Australian in a few minutes, and received the "pat" from the official. Wallace wriggled out of the hold and started the match all-over again while the referee said nothing. Anderson had to go out and earn a fourth fall before he was awarded the bout for keeps.

Bringing the discussion of officials nearer home, recall the Medford-Klamath game Saturday—the 6 to 0 defeat turning the Pelican tide march into a retreat.

In the first period, Bob Laurensen, little Pelican ball carrier who all season has perfectly executed one of Leslie Avritt's pet reverses, advanced the Pelicans to the 20-yard line. The following play, a successful pass from Mayhew to Laurensen, ended on the 1-foot line. And there rises the controversy.

R. H. Cook, photographer, has a clear snap of the action. The picture shows Laurensen tackled and falling over the goal line with a Medford player hanging to his heels. The force of the tackle apparently carried Laurensen over for a touchdown, but the Medford defender pulled him back before Fred Lick, umpire, who ruled the play out of bounds when it unquestionably was several yards inside, arrived on the scene.

Laurensen himself insisted that he had been over the goal line. It was a fine point for the official to decide, and whether or not he called it right is something never to be satisfactorily explained either way.

This, however, has not been offered as an alibi for Klamath's defeat. The Pelicans, with the ball on the 1-foot line, and four downs to carry it across had their one golden opportunity to win.

Schissler Awaits W. S. C.; Webfoots in N. Y.

REVENGE FOR 3 DEFEATS IS ORANGE HOPE

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Oct. 27.—No secrecy about the fact that Paul John Schissler, head football mentor at Oregon State, has been pointing his team for Washington State college since November 1, last year. On that day the Cougars from Washington State defeated the Orangemen on Multnomah field in Portland by the score of Paul Schissler 14 to 7, making it three straight wins in as many years.

The Orangemen and Cougars came together again in Portland Saturday afternoon, and this is the day Coach Schissler hopes for sweet revenge on Babe Hollingbery and his husky Cougars. The Orangemen freely admit three defeats in a row by Washington State is more than enough, and have vowed there will not be another.

Indications are the game this year will be another thriller. Every meeting of Schissler and Hollingbery has been a scrap from the opening whistle. There never has been more than a touchdown difference in the final scores.

Washington State boasts its greatest forward passing team in history. The Orangemen, under Coach Schissler, always have had a great reputation of being a forward passing team. Everything points to a wide open game Saturday afternoon. This is the final conference game of the season for Portland.

PARIS, Oct. 27 (AP)—Young Perez, French flyweight, scored a surprising two-round knock-out over Frankie Genaro of New York at the Sports palace tonight to win a claim to the world's flyweight championship.

Perez, rated as a 5 to 3 underdog against the champion, took the play from Genaro at the opening of the scheduled 15-round contest. He chased the New Yorker about the ring during the first and gaining confidence, went out to slug his way to victory in the second.

CARDS UNINJURED

PALO ALTO, CALIF., Oct. 27 (UP)—The Stanford university football team returned here today from its scoreless tie with University of Washington at Seattle and reported only one injury. Phil Moffatt, star halfback, wrenched his back but will be able to play against University of Southern California, Nov. 7. The Indians meet University of California at Los Angeles here Saturday.

ILLINI MAKE AWARDS

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Oct. 27 (UP)—Instead of the usual light Monday workout Illini were given one of the stiffest drills of the season today. Zuppke's squad is anxious to make amends for its bad showing against Michigan and promises a tough battle for Northwestern Saturday. Illini suffered no serious injuries Saturday.

LOS ANGELES.—Coach Bill Spaulding's U. C. L. A. Bruins are in excellent physical condition for the Stanford game. The Bruins are scrimmaging against Stanford plays and generally polishing off their offense.

BERKELEY—George Watkins, California halfback whose quick punts are a feature of the U. S. C. game, is expected to be back in the job for the Stanford game Nov. 21. A bone in his right foot was broken in the Trojan clash.

OAKLAND—Unless St. Mary's is invited to represent the west at Pasadena New Year's Day, no post season games will be played. Coach Howard P. (Skip) Madigan said yesterday. The statement was made in spiking a rumor the Gaels might invite Notre Dame to play a benefit game in San Francisco Christmas day.

HUNTER FOUND IN MOUNTAINS

George Herman, lost more than 24 hours on Sugar Pine mountains, was found early Monday by officers of the state police. Herman had been hunting, and became lost in the driving snow.

Blinded and bewildered by the snow, Herman wandered all night over the mountains, finally settling down in a sheltered spot, and building a fire for warmth. The sound of the police siren early Monday morning gave him the first sign that help was near. Herman was nearly exhausted when reached by officers, who had to carry him more than a mile to waiting automobiles.

Mrs. Marvie Holmes of Klamath Falls was lost more than 12 hours Sunday when she became separated from her hunting party in the Garhart mountain district near Bly. She was found at 8 o'clock Sunday morning by her husband. Mrs. Holmes had wandered into a nearby farm house. State police and the district attorney were instituting a searching party.

Reports of lost hunters were turned in Monday from all sections, due to the heavy snow-fall Sunday afternoon. All were found, and no serious results were reported.

Even "Shorty" Foster, stalwart state trooper, admitted that he lost his bearings Sunday, and that he wandered in the snow for several hours before orienting himself.

WORLD MARKS SET IN JAPAN AT TRACK MEET

TOKYO, Oct. 27. (AP)—A new world's record for the running broad jump of 26 feet 2½ inches, was established today by Chuhei Nambu, native Japanese jumper, in the national athletic meet, and a new universal standard of 51 feet 1¼ inches for the running hop, step and jump, was set by Mikio Oda, the 1928 Olympic champion.

Nambu's new mark displaces by 2 inches the world mark by S. Canoe of Hawaii, set in Paris in 1925, after the Olympics of that year. Oda broke the record of 50 feet 11¼ inches, set by A. W. Winter, an Australian, at Paris, in 1924.

The American records for the two events are 25 feet 11¼ inches for the running broad jump, set by Ed Haun, in the Olympic tryouts at Cambridge, Mass., in 1925, and for the running hop, step and jump, 50 feet 11 inches, set at New York by Daniel F. Ahern in 1911.

OREGON UNDERDOG FOR N. Y. U. GAME

NEW YORK, Oct. 26. (UP)—Six intercollegiate teams, four of which involve undefeated major eleven, feature the nation's football schedule for the coming week-end.

The four teams with perfect records—Notre Dame, N. Y. U., Syracuse and Harvard—all are favored to win. Notre Dame, with one of the finest machines ever turned out of the South Bend factory, is expected to have little or no trouble in trouncing the Skiboos of Carnegie Tech. The same thing goes for N. Y. U.'s powerful force against Oregon. The far westerners are conceded little chance.

Harvard's Johnnies, who have bowled over Army and Texas in the last two weeks, could use everybody but the dean and still come home in front of a weak Virginia outfit. Syracuse, the fourth undefeated major team to take on an intercollegiate foe, is a slight favorite over Michigan State, but there is an elegant chance that "Sleepy Jim" Crowley's charges will upset the ex-oh boys, if you please.

Frankie Genaro Kayoes in Bout With Young Perez

PARIS, Oct. 27 (AP)—Frankie Genaro, New York veteran who for years has been recognized by the American National Boxing association as flyweight champion, has been shorn of his crown by a new comer from Tunis, Young Perez.

Perez knocked out the American veteran in the second round of a 15-round title bout here last night and, having complications now unforeseen, will be recognized by the N. B. A. as champion. The N. B. A., although organized and operated in the United States, has working agreements with most of the organizations controlling boxing in Europe.

After a slow first round, Perez tore into the American in the second round and ended the match in 30 seconds of the second round with a terrific right to the chin.

FRED FLOCK TO COACH ALL-STARS

NEW YORK, Oct. 27 (UP)—Benny Friedman, former University of Michigan all-American quarterback who resigned the captaincy of the New York Giants' professional football team to become assistant backfield coach at Yale, today signed to play with the Giants during the balance of the season. Friedman will make his first appearance with the Giants Sunday.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Oct. 27 (UP)—Benny Friedman's decision to play professional football will not affect his position at Yale. John S. Cates, graduate manager of athletics said tonight.

"Yale has no statement to make," Cates told the United Press. "Friedman is not a full time coach and we have no control over his outside activities."
