

SOVIET POLICY DEPENDENT ON JAP SINCERITY

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MOSCOW, Nov. 6, (UP)—Russia's policy regarding the Japanese occupation of Manchuria will depend upon the sincerity of Japan's desire to maintain friendly relations with the Soviet government, the Soviet press today said.

Voroshilov told the United Press in an exclusive interview today, "We have no doubt that the Soviet Union will never adopt such a policy."

There is nothing like a movement of troops in the vicinity of Manchuria. The Soviets believe that so-called assistance is tantamount to intervention and that it would result in the suppression of Chinese independence.

Peace Urged

The decisive point in the peaceful policy of the Soviets, which respect the sovereignty of China.

The war commissar accused the Japanese of raising a "red menace" in the Far East to impress European and American public opinion.

"The Soviet future policy depends," he said, "entirely upon the sincerity of Japan in her repeated expressed desire to maintain good neighborly relations with us. Although the United States is not interested in the entrenchment of Japan's position on the Asiatic mainland, the American stand in the conflict is vague and equivocal."

Amicable Relations

"So far as the Soviets are concerned, we favor and will continue the maintenance of amicable relations with Japan."

"We approach the coming arms conference of 1932 with a spirit of seriousness and loyalty. If the least possibility arises to limit arms, we are ready to do so, but if the conference becomes a mere platform for empty phrases, our delegate as usual will expose them mercilessly."

"We stand by our previous declarations in favor of universal and complete disarmament."

Eunice Pringle Finishes Testimony

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 5, (UP)—Tired and worn after two days of testimony and intensive questioning, Eunice Pringle, 19, late today finished the story by which she hopes to convict Alexander Pantakas, millionaire theater man, on a charge of criminally assaulting her.

Her long seizure in the witness chair today was featured by her emphatic denial of all insinuations that she attended wild parties two years ago, about the time she assertedly was attacked by Pantakas.

Frenchman Predicts Fide Hour Crossings

PARIS, Nov. 6, (UP)—Jacques Dumessnil, French air minister, today revealed to the United Press the most important development in aviation of the year—a new motor which will drive a combat plane at a speed of 217 miles an hour.

"And I predict that within 10 years, hermetically sealed airplanes will cross the Atlantic at a height of from 10 to 12 miles, in five hours of flying time," Dumessnil said.

Jury Completed In Cin Case

LONG ISLAND CITY, N. Y. (UP)—Nov. 6, (UP)—The jury that will try Mrs. Amy Conlin, 37, and James De Pew, 19, for the murder of Mrs. Conlin's husband, was completed late today.

The prosecution will begin presentation of its case tomorrow—a case that in many instances parallels the famous Snyder-Gray murder case.

Huge Storm Takes Toll at Honduras

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras, Nov. 6, (UP)—Wind of hurricane intensity accompanied by heavy rains, swept over the banana zone of Honduras today, creating great property damage and destroying plantations and bridges.

Fifteen persons were reported drowned, and all communication by telegraph or telephone through the northern section was interrupted.

MEIER'S ILLNESS DELAYS HEARING

SALEM, Nov. 6, (UP)—Another hearing on the appeal of David Lee Myers, Rutherford school principal, has been postponed indefinitely due to the illness of Governor Meier.

Myers' teaching certificate was revoked in an order handed down by A. C. Howard, state superintendent of public instruction, several weeks ago.

The hearing on Myers' appeal was scheduled for tomorrow, but Governor Meier is a member of the state board of education and, as it was necessary for all members to be present, his absence caused the postponement.

Myers was charged with being overly friendly to women teachers at the Rutherford schools.

Four of the teachers appeared at a recent hearing and testified against the principal. Charges were filed by Mrs. Edith Ackert, school superintendent of Douglas county.
