

COLEMAN WILL BE PRESENT AT RAIL CEREMONY

Dr. Norman C. Coleman, president of Reed College, will officiate at the ceremony at the Great Northern-Pacific Railroad spike-driving at Bieber, Calif., according to word received here. He will be accompanied by a group of other Portland men who will leave over the coast route at 8:30 a. m. Sunday. At Wishram the Portland car will be attached to a special train carrying railroad executives, bankers and newspaper men from the East. Coaches from Spokane, Seattle and Tacoma will be lined up at Wishram for the journey to Bieber via Bend and Klamath Falls. CUT ORDERED IN SALARIES OF TEACHERS

(Continued from Page One) cipal and interest payments on bonds issued to construct six of the city's seven grammar schools. Another \$4,000 is a compulsory legal levy for the purchase of textbooks.

The reduction in salaries was the first to be made by any city in the state in the 1931-32 school year although it is contemplated or may possibly be done by other cities. Astoria and Hillsboro were the only two cities to reduce their teachers' salaries in 1931-32.

The emergency fund was the only one to be raised for the budget for the coming year. It was increased \$10,000. The emergency fund was increased, according to school directors and Superintendent Wells, to care for the possible emergencies that may arise from the reduction of other funds.

The budget was carefully considered by members of the school board who are C. A. Underwood, chairman, Leslie Rogers, G. A. Massey, Charles W. Thomas, Mrs. J. B. Chambers and Mrs. Ida M. O'Brien, clerk, and the budget committee consisting of E. M. Chilcote, Dr. E. D. Lamb, Mrs. Burt E. Hawkins and E. H. Baisiger.

This makes a 20 per cent cut in the personal service item over the 1931-32 budget, according to the clerk. The item was reduced approximately \$27,000, a previous cut being made at the last meeting.

The lineup now is 47 republicans, 46 democrats, one farmer-laborite, and two vacancies.

Although news of Senator Caraway's death was followed by expectation in the capital that a democratic successor would be appointed immediately, Senator Robinson, the democratic leader, upset the calculation.

At his home in Arkansas, Robinson said a special election would be necessary within not less than 60 days nor more than 120 days.

Had Caraway lived two more days the seat could have been filled by a governor's appointment. Where vacancies occur more than one year before the general election a special election is necessary.

Meanwhile, the house of representatives situation was clarified further yesterday by the death of Representative Harry M. Wurzbach of Texas. Control of this branch, which has shifted to and fro since the November, 1930, elections has finally settled almost solidly upon the democrats.

The republicans with 214 seats to 217 for their opponents face being the minority for the first time since 1918. Three vacancies exist, with the democrats confident of winning at least one of these seats.

Uses English Well

His teeth flashed in a smile when some one congratulated him on his facility in the use of English. It is a very important language nowadays, he said, and when his son, Franco, is fourteen he is going to send him to school in the United States. The boy is only six years old now.

Signora Grandi, making her first trip across the Atlantic, was radiant at the prospect. She wore a dark coat with a dark suit, close-fitting hat and carried a great bouquet of orchids. Her English is not so good as her husband's, but her French is excellent and she has a charm which solves many language difficulties.

The official staff of five men and a battery of secretaries was chosen not only for a knowledge of the matters which are to be discussed, but also for familiarity with the United States and command of English.

Signor Grandi is due at Washington Nov. 16 and will remain in America a week.

This writer, who may be wrong, but doesn't think so, believes that if all the rest of the world were as happy and as prosperous as we are in normal times WE should be even happier and more prosperous than we are at present.

It is a statement you may have heard made—possibly by some old-fashioned thinker: "Woman's place is in the home. Man's place is in business."

Such statements have been made.

CRATER PARK ROAD PLANS PUSH AHEAD

5.9 miles of road, leading around the rim northwest of the lodge, the contract held by the P. L. Crooks Construction company of Portland, is approximately 75 per cent completed. The heavy construction has been finished, with the exception of one deep rock cut near "The Watchman," first high point on the north rim. Up to this point, the contractor did considerable cutting of rock banks, consuming thousands of pounds of powder.

Two seasons were allotted for this heavy work, but during the early part of the summer, the contractor believed the work could be completed in one season. He bought four steam shovels, 11 five-yard trucks, five air compressors, 14 air hammers and other equipment. To encourage rapid progress, he employed over 150 men, working in two eight-hour shifts.

However, due to the heavy construction, traffic around the rim and October snowfall, such plans were forced to be abandoned, but the progress on the project is far in advance of the two-season schedule. When activities are resumed next year, the contract is expected to be completed in a comparatively short time. A contract is then to be let for surfacing, and in due course of time will be followed by use for oiling.

On the average of 1500 gallons of gasoline were used daily on the Crooks contract, and over 150,000 pounds of powder are to be used by the time it is completed.

This six mile unit, the first of a new 34-mile road, entirely around Crater Lake, is one mile shorter than the present corresponding unit, and is just as scenic. In its construction, the natural beauty was preserved as much as possible. A minimum number of trees were cut down in co-operation with the wishes of the landscape and educational divisions of the national park service.

The ruling grade does not exceed 6 per cent, and curves are not over 10 per cent, providing motorists with a regular scenic boulevard.

Beginning activities during October, the A. Guthrie company, contracting road construction from the Diamond Lake junction of the rim road to the park boundary, a distance of eight miles, has made a good start, and expects to complete the work early next summer. This road does not entail heavy building, but follows a different route than the one traveled for sometime past. Up

Probation Officer for County Asked

(Continued from Page One) the most important branch of which is the neglected and delinquent child. The League of Women Voters is sponsoring a campaign to secure a probation officer for Klamath county.

In speaking of the proposed venture, Circuit Judge W. M. Duncan said Saturday, "I believe this is one of the most urgent needs of the community, and that it has been for more than 20 years. The county is badly in need of some one fitted to look after young delinquents. I believe that such an officer should be a broad-minded, sympathetic woman, trained in social service work. Not only in Klamath county, but all over the world, the problem of the delinquent child is becoming more and more acute."

District Attorney T. H. Gillenwaters favors the movement, and is quoted as saying: "It is in favor of a probation officer for Klamath county, for the reason that such an office is a valuable supplement to the work of the juvenile court, and gives an opportunity to investigate homes more carefully and arrive at the real reason of child delinquency. Also in considering adult cases cases that in many instances are borderline in their nature, and where an unrestricted parole is of no value, a probation officer could be of great value."
