PORTLAND KILLERS PLEAD NOT GUILTY

PORTLAND, Nov. 7. (AP)—Raymond Harvey and Ernest Newell pleaded not guilty in Circuit Judge Ekwall's court here today to charges of first degree murder in connection with the death of Walter Leashardt on September 28. The indictment charges Harvey and Newell with the crime jointly and separately. Newell was shot to death when he stopped to investigate a machine which he recognized as one which had been stolen from a friend of his. Harvey assertedly did the actual shooting, while Newell was about a half a block away.

One Flier Will Attempt Sea Hop

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 6. (AP)—One of five aviators who sailed from here on the liner President Coolidge today will attempt to return from the Hawaiian Islands in an airplane. A six-place Stinson-Detroit monoplane, with a 210-horsepower Wright J5 motor, was in the hold of the vessel. The pilot of the plane will be the aviator who wins the highest rating in navigation tests to be held in Honolulu. It was announced, and the other four fliers will come back to the mainland by boat.

RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 7. (AP)—Virginia voters cast 2730 votes for a dead man in the recent election for the county jail. George W. BOURBON SENATOR PASSES SUDDENLY

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Nov. 6. (AP)—Senator Thaddeus H. Caraway, Democrat from Arkansas, died suddenly here tonight in the St. Vincent's hospital where he was undergoing treatment. The veteran statesman, champion of drought relief for his state in the last session of congress, died shortly after 8 o'clock.

Senator Caraway entered the hospital last week. He was operated upon a week ago Thursday for the removal of kidney stones. The operation was pronounced successful by attending physicians. Yesterday, the senator's condition became so improved that doctors allowed a few close friends to visit him.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6. (AP)—The death of Senator Thaddeus H. Caraway removes from the senate one of the most colorful figures in that body, a man quick witted in the rough-and-tumble conflict of debate. He is remembered here best for his sharp questioning of lobbyists during the senate lobby committee investigation of 1930.

When some of the biggest financial figures of the country were brought before his committee, Caraway questioned them in the same acrid manner he adopted toward unknowns.

LINDBERGH GETS NEW APPOINTMENT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7. (AP)—President Hoover today announced appointment of Charles A. Lindbergh to the national advisory committee for aeronautics. The committee was created by congress in 1915 to supervise and direct scientific study of aviation problems. Two army officers, two naval officers, one representative each of the water bureau, the bureau of standards and the Smithsonian institution, and eight citizens not connected with the government compose the committee.

False Statement Brings Arrest Of William D. Comer

SEATTLE, Nov. 7. (AP)—William D. Comer tonight had joined the group of former officials of the defunct Puget Sound Savings and Loan association who have been convicted on charges resulting from the association's failure. Comer was found guilty of publishing a false statement in connection with the affairs of the institution. He faces a maximum sentence of 10 years in prison or a \$5,000 fine on the conviction.

Flames Destroy Chiloquin Home

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Davis in Chiloquin was totally destroyed by fire Wednesday night while the Davises were in Klamath Falls. The fire is thought to have started from an overheated furnace pipe. Most of Davis' furniture was lost in the fire. The Chiloquin fire department, under Chief Peppard, saved surrounding buildings. Tax Levy Voted For Chiloquin

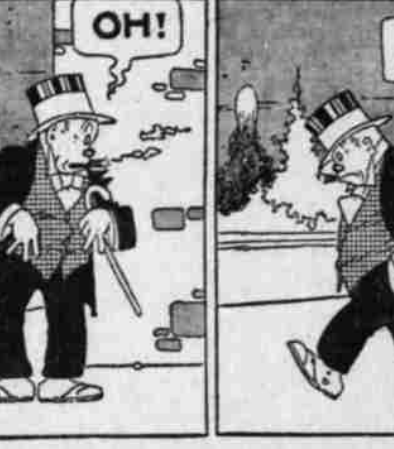

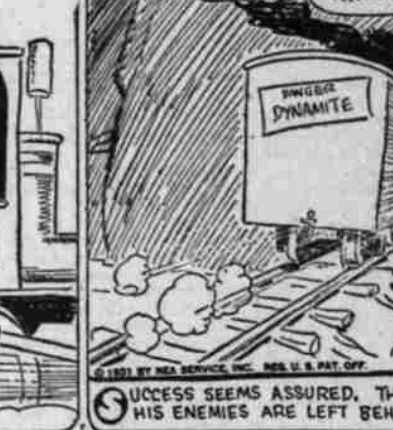
Lumber Business Shows Increase

SEATTLE, Nov. 7. (AP)—An increase of 21 per cent over the previous week's total business was reported for the week ending October 31 by 22 mills reporting to the West Coast Lumberman's association. The 21 per cent increase represented 15,900,000 board feet more lumber than was handled by the mills during the preceding week. The increase was by far the largest of any during recent months.
