

REVALUATION FUND OPPOSED BY DAIRYMAN

Members of the county budget committee in session Wednesday afternoon received the budgets of the county auditor, the district attorney and the county agent's office.

Charles E. Drew, prominent Klamath dairyman, appeared before the board and protested against any money being included in the budget this year for revaluation and reclassification of property in Klamath county. Assessor W. T. Lee, in his requested budget, had included \$5,000 to start the work of re-assessments by men working under the supervision of the state tax commission.

The Pomona Grange committee and the committee from the Taxpayers' Protective league did not appear Wednesday.

The budget committee will not meet again until Monday morning when the actual work of compiling the budget will be started.

So far the committee, of which Richard H. Avery is chairman and Andrew Collier is secretary has heard petitions for requested appropriations and received the individual estimates of department heads.

County court members, who are members of the budget committee, are out of the city until Sunday, attending a meeting of the state highway commission and sessions of the convention of county commissioners and judges.

S. P. ANNOUNCES BARGAIN RATES

Family reunions throughout Oregon and other parts of the West on Thanksgiving Day are expected to be multiplied manifold as a result of re-established rates of cents-mile roundtrip transportation fare on Southern Pacific Lines for that holiday.

Plans for renewal of the bargain fares were announced yesterday by L. L. Graham, local district freight and passenger agent for the railroad.

Timed so as to just precede and include Thanksgiving Day, dates on which trips may be started under the plan will be Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, November 24, 25 and 26, Graham stated, with return limit of December 2. Length of return limit is expected to provide ample time for trips "back home" to distant points on the railroad's lines, he said.

It was pointed out that the cent-a-mile fares will be of particular interest to football fans contemplating the trip to San Francisco for the Thanksgiving Day battle between "Doc" Speare, Oregon conquerer of New York University and "Silky" Madigan's Gallopers Gals of St. Mary's college.

Territory involved in the special offer reaches from Portland to El Paso and from San Francisco to Ogden, Salt Lake City included, Graham said. Round-trip tickets will be sold on the three-fifths cost of the usual one-way fare, he added, with tickets good on either coach or Pullman trains. Record travel for the holiday is anticipated.

Dr. Frederick Bergius is widely known for his experiments in the conversion of wood into food-stuff and the production of liquid fuel.
