

L. A. FINANCIER FILES BANKRUPTCY

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 12. (U.P.) An involuntary petition in bankruptcy against L. A. Helman, Los Angeles banker and financier, was filed in federal court here today.

The petition was filed by Fred S. Albertson, the Alameda National bank and Frank Nathan, and claims totaled almost \$250,000.

Attorneys for the petitioners announced that the action was taken "to secure an equitable division of assets among all creditors," and was required "by reason of attachments heretofore levied which would result in preference to a few creditors."

The Helman brothers, Marco and Irving, two years ago merged their two banks here, the Helman bank and the Merchants National bank, with the Bank of America Trust and Savings association. The Helmans took into this merger \$122,000,000 in deposits and assets or resources of \$133,000,000.

They received no money in the transaction, but instead took stock of the Transamerica corporation, then quoted at 62.

Relief Committee Postpones Meeting

No regular meeting of the county relief committee was held Thursday morning due to the fact that the county court is in Portland attending a meeting of the state highway commission. The court will ask the highway commission for increased appropriations for the secondary highway system in this county. The secondary highway system will replace the market road system on January 1, 1932.

The court will not only ask more money from the forestry funds, and for the secondary highway system, but will ask additional emergency relief funds, to aid in relieving unemployment in this section.

SCHOOL GIRL DIES IN BUS ACCIDENT

AMMON, Idaho, Nov. 12. (U.P.)—One girl was killed, six others were seriously injured and 10 other school children were shaken up when a dumping device on a bus truck used as a school bus suddenly operated, throwing the children to the road.

The truck, used in the daytime to haul sugar beets and in the morning and evening to carry children to and from school was traveling along the road when the dumping apparatus, in a manner not yet determined, suddenly operated.

Mamie Purcell, 14, died almost instantly from a broken neck. Melvina Moosen, Margaret Willman, Mary Henderson, Juanita Crow, Helen Hansen and Wanda King were injured. All were taken to a hospital at Idaho Falls. The extent of their injuries was not immediately determined.

GERMAN INSURANCE CLAIMS DISMISSED

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 12. (U.P.)—Twenty-two insurance cases involving approximately \$1,000,000, which were brought by residents of Germany against the New York Life and Guardian Life insurance companies of this country, were dismissed in Federal Judge McNary's court here late today by stipulation.

A ruling by the late Federal Judge Bean to the effect that jurisdiction on one of the cases was a matter of discretion with the court, but that it should properly be tried either in New York or Germany, was abided by when the cases were dismissed in Judge McNary's court. The circuit court of appeals last May upheld Judge Bean's ruling.

Similar actions also are being dismissed in New York because of Judge Bean's decision, it was said.
