OREGON WILL
RECEIVE FUNDS
FROM FORESTS

SALEM, Ore., (UP)—Oregon is included among the 23 states and territories receiving funds from receipts from national forests during the 1931 fiscal year, State Forester Cronmiller said.

Apportionment of 25 per cent of net receipts gives Oregon \$123,557.51. A 10 per cent apportionment of Oregon's share for national forest roads and trails will also become available from 1931 receipts.

Receipts for the entire country total \$1,240,000, and will be spent for roads and schools throughout the United States.

Funds are allowed in proportion to the receipts realized from the national forest within each state and represent a federal payment in lieu of taxes on the national forest land, a federal bulletin explained.

"On account of decreased returns from national forest timber sales this year's payment to the state, show a decline from 1930. Net receipts for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1931, amounted to a little less than \$4,000,000, as compared with \$6,751,500 for the preceding fiscal period."

The 10 per cent fund amounting to \$496,243 is in addition to regular appropriations by congress for road and trail construction which last year amounted to more than \$16,000,000. The 25 per cent distribution of net receipts is required by law. This year it was less than \$5,000,000. Last year's total aggregated \$6,751,500.

"Louisiana and Wisconsin as result of recent acquisition of national forest land within their boundaries, this year will share for the first time in allotment of funds from the national forest receipts. Arizona will receive \$30,355 and New Mexico \$525 for school funds."

STATE'S PLANS
FOR TESTING
UNINTERRUPTED

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 13. (UP)—The recent "war" in Cedar county, Iowa, where soldiers enforced tuberculosis testing of cattle was but an incident in a huge program.

Approximately a million cattle a month are tested in the United States, said Dr. W. H. Lytle, chief of the state division of animal industry. The work has saved millions of dollars to the meat industry and farmers, and has saved innumerable lives, he pointed out.

"The recent fracas was nothing unprecedented and will not prove serious to the national program," Lytle believed. "There were minor disturbances before in many localities where farmers objected to the tests. However, in Oregon or nowhere else except in Iowa has it been necessary to call out militia to initiate the testing."

"Up to this month 1,348 counties of the 3,072 in the United States have been placed in the 'modified accredited area' as sections in which less than one-half of one per cent of the cattle were infected with tuberculosis."

"Oregon counties included on the list are Washington, Hood River, Tillamook, Yamhill, Polk, Josephine, Coos, Curry and Clatsop. Eight or nine others probably will soon be on the accredited list, testing work now indicated. To date, failure to test beef cattle in many communities has prevented a larger number of Oregon counties qualifying as accredited areas."

"Final determination of counties of this state that shall be included in the tuberculosis free classifications depends upon Dr. S. B. Foster, head of the federal inspection office, at Portland. Actual testing is done by county agents, under cooperation of the state, part of the expense being

paid by county and remainder by owners of cattle.

"Concrete benefits of the testing programs are evident. Farmers' herds do better when freed of infection, number of cattle rejected because of tuberculosis on inspection at packing houses has reduced rapidly and milk from tested cows is permitted for sale in cities, nearly all of which prohibit the more doubtful untested product."
