

UNDERTONE IN WOOL MARKET IS STRONGER

BOSTON, Nov. 13. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"There is rather more business being done in the wool market at the week-end and the undertone is stronger. Prices, while not notably higher as a rule, are firmer, and the market is against the buyer."

"Firm foreign markets, coupled with the end of the strike at Lawrence and gradual resumption of the mills there, have been decidedly helpful to the wool market. Along with these factors, there has been an acceptance generally of the belief that wool stocks are reasonably small, and that wool should rise in sympathy with other commodities. The sentimental and practical value of the celebration of National Wool Week also is accorded a place in most calculations, although there is no present snap to the goods markets."

"Some further buying of fall wools in Texas is reported at prices ranging from 6 to 10 cents, according to the wool."

"Mohair continues rather slow, adult hair being quoted at 20¢ to 25¢, according to the lot, in the original bales, and kid hair at 40¢ to 45¢ on a similar basis."

Wheat Breaks On Chicago Markets

CHICAGO, Nov. 13. (AP)—Stop loss selling which broke out near the end of trading caused a lively set-back in wheat prices today, the market tumbling 3 cents under its recent high point. New decreases in France rightly controlling breadstuff imports were more or less responsible, fears being expressed that a way had been opened to create import quotas according to countries. An increase of 37,000,000 bushels in Canadian crop estimates was also a bearish factor. Fresh export business in North American wheat was meager, only 400,000 bushels. Wheat closed nervous at the day's bottom level, 1 1/2¢ to 2¢ lower than yesterday's closing. Corn 1 1/2¢ to 1 3/4¢ off; oats, 1/2¢ to 3/4¢ down, and provisions at 2¢ to 10¢ decline.

Sales for the day totaled 12,000 bushels May.

STOCKS SLUMP IN LATE TRADE TODAY

NEW YORK, Nov. 13. (AP)—The stock market slumped under active selling in the last hour of trading today, principal shares closed about 1 to 5 points lower. Rails were dumped in considerable volume, and the general market closed with a weak tone. Sales approximated one and a half million shares.

The market oscillated uncertainly until it turned emphatically downward in late trading. Speculative quarters had looked for further bullish endeavors in the wheat market, and the fact that wheat closed off about 2 cents, at the lowest of the day, presumably contributed to the late selling of shares.

POULTRY INDUSTRY OUTLOOK BRIGHT

SALEM, Ore. (UP)—Outlook of the poultry industry is brighter than for some time past, Max Gehlhar, state director of agriculture believed.

"With development of stricter

grading methods, foreign markets for Oregon eggs should be much improved," Gehlhar said. "An encouraging element, showing its effect throughout the entire country is the low price of wheat. Heavy culling of farm flocks during the past spring has increased demand at many points. Laying hens in the United States were reduced by about 20,000,000. Fewer chicks were hatched last spring than is usual.

"Prospects are now best for those who produce eggs and high quality poultry for market, for hatchermen who sell high quality chicks and for farmer and commercial poultrymen who give their flocks the best management and who practice efficient culling."

SUPERS SEVERE INJURIES

SPUD GRADING PLANS SHAPED AT MEETING

Plans for uniform potato inspections in the Klamath Basin and Tule Lake, were being discussed today in special conferences of officials from the state departments of agriculture of Oregon and California, meeting with Klamath county officials and representatives from adjoining counties including Modoc and Siskiyou counties.

Present at this conference were S. S. Rogers, chief of the bureau of plant industry for California; Charles A. Cole, holding the same position in Oregon; W. L. Close, federal grade inspector for the northwest; Tom Briles, horticultural commissioner of Modoc county; R. L. Gwyn, horticultural commissioner for Siskiyou county; Ross Aubrey, local potato inspector and C. A. Henderson, Klamath county agent.

Plans for the day include an inspection tour over the Klamath project and Tule Lake army engineer corps to obtain additional information for use in the forthcoming report to congress on the proposed canalization of the river.

Four survey parties have left Portland to work between Springfield and Salem. One crew under E. L. Davis will cover the 15-mile stretch from Springfield to Junction City. Another under G. M. Rands, will work from Junction City to Peoria. The third party, under E. C. White, will survey the 35-mile Peoria-Albany stretch will be covered by a crew under W. H. Rucker, will survey the river from Albany to Salem, 34 miles.

The survey which will include studies of the river with reference to irrigation, navigation, and waterpower possibilities, will take into consideration the river channel, condition of banks, the flow, topography of adjacent country and other pertinent features.

The Journal said "inability of the local wholesale trade to secure sufficient turkeys to take care of immediate orders is a reflection not only of the extreme low prices that has been ruling both here and at the source, but to the previous instructions of some handlers to hold supplies for awhile."

Previous offers of top quality toms and hens at 35¢ a pound found plenty of orders from handlers.

EGG PRODUCTION INCREASE NORMAL
