

VIGILANT BAND KIDNAPS 'REDS' SYMPATHIZERS

PONTIAC, Mich., Nov. 13. (UP)—Hands of vigilantes, working in automobiles, kidnaped eight so-called "red" sympathizers here last night.

One of the kidnaped men was found shortly after midnight in a dazed condition, suffering effects of a severe horse-whipping.

"They took me to an open field," the man, Leo Fortin, 33, said, "after they had dragged me out of my home and put a sack over my head."

Sovereign Lashed

"They bared my back and lashed me with all their might. I heard someone else screaming further down the road."

"Then they took off the sack and I saw the men, about four, were all hooded. One man told me to 'keep your mouth shut from now on.' Then they left."

The others who were missing were:

Clarence Sherman, 35; Walter Harding, 33; Vessel Maba, 32; David Holder, 33, and a negro named Shelby.

One Released

Mike Stuykoff was kidnaped and taken to a golf course but continued the kidnapers then he was not the man they were after. He was released without being whipped.

All of the men who were seized had taken part in a "hunger parade" here several weeks ago. Police broke up the parade and arrested several of the men. Several, including the alleged leader, William Reynolds, communist organizer, are to be tried.

RED SCHEMES FOILED, EIGHT FACE SENTENCE

TORONTO, Nov. 13. (AP)—The red coat of a royal Canadian mounted policeman was an ironic symbol to eight followers of the red flag who faced sentence today as members of an unlawful association and parties to a seditious conspiracy.

They were convicted yesterday largely upon the testimony of Sergeant John Leopold who doffed his red coat seven years ago to sit in the councils of Canadian communists and rise to an official in the organization as "Comrade E. W. Esselwain."

The men convicted are: Tim Buick, Tom Ewan, John Buick, Amos T. Hill, Malcolm L. Bruce, Samuel Cohen, Matthew Popovitch and Thomas Cacia.

The crown counsel said he would ask for confinement of their property and for the deportation of any of them who can be compelled to leave the dominion under the immigration laws.

Sergeant Leopold was the Crown's principal witness against the communists. Chafed again in the uniform of his outfit, he told from the witness stand how he had followed the best tradition of the mounties for patient, unrelenting pursuit of their quarry, by gathering first hand evidence of communist activities in Canada for seven years. He said he had served as secretary of the Regina branch of party and at one time had been arrested in Toronto for taking part in a communist demonstration.

Supplementing Leopold's testimony the Crown offered a mass of documents seized in raids on communist headquarters last August. In this evidence the prosecution maintained was proof that the Canadian communists were financed by money from Moscow and that the organization had as its object overthrow of the government by force and violence.

The conviction of Buick and his comrades was the climax of a ten year campaign by the Canadian government to bring about a test of the legality of the communist party in the dominion. The trial was described as the first definite action launched against the communist party as an organization on the American continent. The comparable action was that of the Japanese government against the party there.

Mike Gollinski who was brought to trial with the others was discharged for lack of evidence connecting him with the party.

DISEASES CAUSED BY OVERWEIGHT

SALEM, Ore., (UP)—It's mighty interesting to eat a hearty meal, but listen to this:

"Here twice as many overweight persons die of heart disease, nephritis, arterial disease, cerebral hemorrhage and diabetes as do underweight persons."

The great trouble with many of us is that we live to eat instead of eating to live. We allow our appetites to tempt us to eat more than we really need. Organs of the human body will stand a remarkable amount of abuse, particularly during the years of early life, but if continually called on they will eventually break down," experts of the state board of health warned.

"Although capacity enters no doubt derive enjoyment from satisfying their appetites to the limit, satisfaction is a relative matter. Many who are now over-eating would soon be content with a reasonable intake after the first few weeks of a sensible diet. The stomach muscles contract, muscle tone improves and general well being is much increased."

ATLAS OF U. S. STILL UNFINISHED

SALEM, Ore., (UP)—An atlas of the United States is still about 50 years from completion after 50 years of constant labor.

"This country has less than half of its area recorded on topographic maps," state engineer Charles E. Stricklin commented.

"In Oregon due to scarcity of funds the work has been going rather more slowly than usual this year, only a few scattered areas in the eastern part of the state being mapped."

"At present about 45 per cent of the country as a whole has been surveyed, representing between 3,600 and 3,700 quadrangle maps. A quadrangle, an area bounded by parallels and meridians, costs between \$5,000 and \$12,000 to map. States and federal governments divide the cost equally."

Dempsey had no comment to make on his failure to stop Hearst Wright last night at Omaha.

BOSTON, Nov. 13. (UP)—Jack Dempsey has been offered \$100,000 to meet Ernie Schaaf, Boston heavyweight, in an outdoor bout here next June. Matchmaker Billy Ames of the Boston Garden announced today.

Ames said he would discuss the proposition with the former champion at New York in two weeks. Dempsey, he said, appeared "interested" when the offer was made by long distance telephone to Omaha, Neb., last night.

Pro Team May Play Olympic

NEW YORK, Nov. 13. (UP)—Completion of negotiations for charity football games between the New York professional Giants

and the Olympic club of San Francisco depended tonight upon the decision of the Olympic club board of governors.

The games, one to be played at New York on December 13 and a second on the coast later in the month, were suggested today by Mayor Walker's committee on unemployment relief.

The Giants agreed to the proposal but Olympic club authorities announced that a vote of the club's board of governors, waiving regulations against playing with professional teams, would be necessary before the offer could be accepted.

Loughran Meets Paulino Uzcudun

NEW YORK, Nov. 13. (UP)—Tommy Loughran, who can box but can't hit, and Paulino Uzcudun, who can hit but can't box, are paired in Jimmy Johnston's initial show at Madison Square Garden, which will make the formal opening of the winter boxing season tonight.

To Johnston's credit it must be admitted that this obvious mismatch is in the nature of a "hold over" from a previous administration rather than Jimmy's own idea of a worthy offering for his debut at the Garden's boxing impresario. Jimmy and his publicity department, however, must take the blame for "ballyhooing" the match and convincing at least a share of the fans that they will see an evenly contested bout.

Turkey May Be Only 26 Weeks Old
