### Professor Sykes Will Give Organ Concert in City

Klamath society is looking forward with anticipation to the concert of Professor Laurin B. Sykes who will present an organ recital here November 22. Two of the city's outstanding musicians, who were among the many who heard Sykes perform here last year, have written the following appreciation of his work:

Mrs. Don J. Zumwalt—"It is gratifying to learn that Laurin B. Sykes is to give us a return pipe organ recital here on November 22 in the Presbyterian church. The pipe organ, with its wide scope of tone color perhaps appeals to most of us more strongly than does the piano, and Mr. Sykes last March proved himself able to reach his listeners, whatever their musical tastes. His technique is brilliant, and to those numbers which demanded it, he brought a clarity and sparkle thoroughly delightful; while those selections of a quieter mood were given sympathetic and artistic interpretation. His program was varied, and well arranged. Sykes possesses musicianship of a high order, and to all who love to hear good music excellently and enjoyably interpreted, I would say, do not miss hearing this. We are fortunate in having such an artist come to Klamath Falls."

Lillian E. Darby, music supervisor of the Klamath Falls public schools, speaks highly of the coming concert:

"As a fitting prologue to the concert season which was successfully launched in our city this year, will be the organ recital presented by Mr. Laurin B. Sykes of Portland, Oregon, November 22. For those who heard Mr. Sykes in his last recital here, there is no need to extol his work. All who heard him then are most eager to again have this privilege. In keeping with the music appreciation work in the public schools, Mr. Sykes lectures to his audience regarding the numbers he is playing. This adds greatly to the interest and attention of his listeners, thereby increasing the value of the concert."

Dr. C. B. Cassel, baritone, and Lawrence Davis, flutist, will assist Sykes in rendition of his program.
