that ever since. If they had just turned their heads a little they would have seen what was going on," Johnson replied. The boys then went on to say that after they left the car they "hit the brush."

"We played poker with Slim's cards with a \$100 limit on each card," Johnson said. He said that they divided the loot evenly before starting to play cards. "I think they must have been marked," he went on, "because he got a lot of our money."

He said that after dark they walked to the "jangles" in Klamath Falls where they played about 10 or 15 minutes. Then they walked down the Great Northern railroad tracks to a shack on the outskirts of Merrill.

Ride to Bieber

"There was a lot of snow and I had a big hole in my shoe. I was nearly all in when we got there," Wilson said.

That morning the trio got some groceries at a store in Merrill and bought some whiskey. That night they caught the 65th car on a Great Northern train, arriving in Bieber the next morning where they had breakfast.

each bought a pint of moonshine and climbed back on the same train which made a half-hour stop.

They arrived at about 10th or 11th street in Sacramento at about 5 o'clock Monday afternoon and went to a hotel, they said. They visited a second hand store where they purchased shoes, pants and other things and ate again.

Both Wilson and Johnson said that they were asked for money to get something to eat by men and that they gave them bills when asked. "We gave a lot of it away," they said when asked what became of the money. They had only \$200 when arrested and \$250 was missing from the bank.

Tuesday afternoon they rented a flat for a week.

Buy a Radio

"We asked a guy on the street where we could get a second hand radio and he said he had one he would sell for \$10. Move it over," they told him," Johnson related.

"Slim" left Wilson and Johnson that day because he didn't want to go on a party. "He wasn't very strong for drinking," Johnson explained.

Wilson and Johnson bought groceries which they took to their flat.

"We jewed a bootlegger down from \$4 to \$3.50 for a gallon of moonshine and then paid him with a \$20 bill," Johnson said.

The pair proceeded to start drinking and cooking.

"It was that hot stove where I was cooking bacon and eggs that made me goofy," Johnson said.

United and Associated Press stories related how they talked loud in the thin-walled apartment house and spoke of robbing a bank and were reported to police by a woman in the next apartment. The police arrived and took them to jail.

"I didn't know I was arrested or in jail until I looked out through the bars," Johnson admitted.

"We were broke and hungry," Wilson said.

Which Name?

They were fingerprinted and photographed in Sacramento. They returned on the train with Sheriff Low and John Horn and today were again photographed and fingerprinted.

"Sign your name here," Rex McMillan, deputy sheriff in charge of the identification bureau, said. "Which name shall I sign?" Johnson asked. He was told to sign Horace Nordstrom. "You'd never know anything but Fred Johnson if they hadn't found something on me to tell them different," he said.

They were taken back to cell five on the lower floor of the jail, Nordstrom with No. 1255 on his picture and Wilson with 1254.

Officers are searching up and down the coast for "Slim," blonde, height six feet and two inches, with about \$2500 with him.

When Wilson and Johnson were booked Thursday night Sheriff Low found a steel saw in one of their shoes.
