SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 21 (AP)—Caught in a blazing inferno created by three gasoline explosions aboard the Standard Oil tanker Charlie Watson, three men were burned to death yesterday, and a fourth, who fell from a piling at the dock where the tanker was moored, was so seriously injured he died.

Nine other men were injured in the explosion, which resulted from a leaking pump line through which the tanker was discharging gasoline. Unestimated damage was done to the tanker, although the owners said they believed the hull was uninjured.
