CAREFUL DRIVERS AVOID HOSPITALS

SALEM, Ore. (AP)—The safe automobile driver rarely finds himself in the police court or the hospital, said Charles P. Pray, superintendent of state police.

Some of the typical accidents the safe driver has no trouble avoiding and the reasons why he doesn't were listed by Pray as follows:

Crashing into the car ahead, because he keeps back at a safe distance, with his car under perfect control.

Rear end collisions, because he uses his rear-view mirror and signals promptly and intelligently.

Side-swiping, because when he passes the car ahead he always announces his intention, makes sure the road is clear and then passes in a wide curve that allows plenty of room.

Being side-swiped, because when the fellow behind passes him, he is watchful of any emergency that might arise.

Hill or curve accidents, because he takes no chances whatever when he can't see the road ahead clearly.

Grade crossing accidents, because he will under no circumstances cross a railroad track until certain he is safe.

"Or to sum it all up," concluded Pray, "he just lets common sense control his conduct and steering wheel."

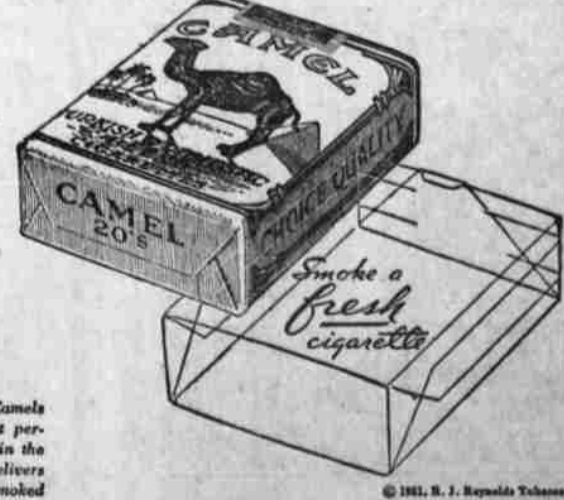
