

Sectional Titles Hang In Balance On Gridirons

DARTMOUTH, STANFORD PLAY AT CAMBRIDGE

NEW YORK, Nov. 28. (AP)—Sectional titles in the midwest, south and southwest hung in the balance today as football fans prepared for the last big charge of the season.

In the south, Tulane was a "hot" favorite to turn back Louisiana State, capture the southern conference crown outright and perhaps earn the right to meet Southern California in the Rose Bowl game New Year's day.

Northwestern, like Tulane unbeaten, marched out to confront Purdue in the feature battle of the Big Ten's charity slate. The Wildcats were favored to whip Purdue and clinch the Big Ten championship but a closely contested duel was in prospect.

Texas Christian was late last hurdle Southern Methodist, expected to vault to capture the Southwest conference title and the consensus was the Mustangs would clear it.

Amy vs. Notre Dame There were the only three games that had a direct bearing on sectional title hopes but there were many others of as much, if not more, general interest.

In the east, Army and Notre Dame were matched in their annual clash at the Yankee Stadium, New York, in an intersectional test that matched even the renewal of so ancient a rivalry as that between Princeton and Yale at New Haven.

Stanford's Indians squared off against Dartmouth at Cambridge; Detroit played Georgetown; West Virginia met Washington and Jefferson; and Lehigh and Penn State were paired in a charity game.

Navy, preparing for Penn and Army in December, tuned up its game against Wooster of Ohio, and Western Maryland and Muhlenberg for its rival.

Georgia Tech and Georgia came together in perhaps the feature contest. The only other southern conference test sent Duke against Washington and Lee.

Marchmont Schwartz of Notre Dame and Ernie Pinckert and John Baker of Southern California, are repeaters, having been named on last year's eleven. Schwartz is called again "the outstanding back" and Clarence Munn of Minnesota is classed as the lineman of the year.

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DEMPSEY WILL TRAIN SEVERAL MONTHS MORE

Before the fight an elderly, bearded man climbed into the ring to shake hands with Dempsey. He was Mike Duffy from Glen Head who had helped Dempsey train years ago. Duffy had walked the 84 miles to greet his hero. Dempsey gave a cordial greeting to the man.

Princeton Strengthened Princeton, pitifully weak all year, has been strengthened by return to the squad of James, a running halfback many consider almost as good as Booth. James has been unable to play all year because of a foot injury.

But Yale remains a strong favorite among the bettors. There is plenty of Yale money offered at four to one odds on the Ella. Booth and James notwithstanding, the odds appear justified by the past records of both teams.

YALE FOUR TO ONE FAVORITE OVER RIVALS

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 28. (AP)—Yale without Captain Albie Booth was a four to one favorite today to defeat Princeton with Jack James in the fifty-fifth renewal of a time-honored gridiron rivalry in the Bowl.

The Bull Dogs have lost the services of the tiny Booth, who lies in New Haven hospital stricken with pneumonia—his brilliant college football career ended by carelessness in his hour of glory after the defeat of Harvard last Saturday.

Instead of running for the showers after the game Albie dashed around congratulating his team mates and receiving congratulations of others. Then he drove home to New Haven in the cool night air with the windows of his small sedan open. Wednesday he developed a severe cold and was sent to the hospital. Today doctors said he had pleurisy and took X-ray pictures repeatedly to guard against development of pneumonia.

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CARNERO WINS OVER CAMPOLO AT NEW YORK

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Nov. 28. (AP)—Primo Carnera knocked out Victorio Campolo last night after one minute and 27 seconds of fighting in the second round of their scheduled 15 round bout for the New York Athletic commission's newly created "dreadnaught" championship of the world.

Campolo won the first round with ease. But in the second Carnera floored him for a count of nine and then a right uppercut to the jaw dropped the Argentine to the floor for a second time and he was counted out.

The "battle of dinosaurs," although disappointingly short, furnished far more action and excitement than the entire scheduled 15 rounds had been expected to develop.

Campolo, lanky 224 pound Gaucha, went out to make a fight of it and the two short rounds of action were crammed with fighting of the street brawl type. The two giants slugged like the roughest kind of "ham and beans" and, what was more to the liking of the fans, they were landing their punches.

Campolo forced the action and chased Primo about the ring in the first round but he tired badly toward the finish of the session and was winded before the second round opened. He attempted to rush Primo again but after being knocked down by a hard left to the body and a right to the chin he appeared to lose all interest in the affair.

Primo, gaining confidence, was after him with a rush, clubbing awkwardly at the head and body. Campolo went down again—more from a rush than from the effect of any single blow—and it was apparent that he had no intention of getting up. Victorio didn't exactly quit—he was badly winded and had little prospect of victory, but it did appear that he could rise rather than take the easy way out.

The victory was the most impressive of Carnera's career and enabled him to rewin considerable of the prestige which he lost in his defeat by Jack Sharkey. Primo displayed real punching power.

The bout featured a benefit card for the Federation of Jewish Charities, but high prices and the poor records of the two contestants held the crowd to a disappointing 13,000 with estimated receipts of \$50,000.
