

ROAD PROBLEM ON TULE LAKE IS MEET TOPIC

Called together ostensibly to discuss road, highway and bridge problems of the Tule Lake basin, supervisors of northern California counties and members of the chamber of commerce of southern Oregon districts met in joint session with the Tule Lake chamber Saturday evening. About 100 attended the meeting, including many members of the Tule Lake chamber of commerce.

Attending were Senator James Allen of Yreka, Calif., representing the Yreka chamber of commerce and the Lions club; James Rohrer, chairman of the Skiskiyou county board of supervisors and a member of the Yreka chamber; J. C. Jarman, chamber of commerce president, Mitchell Tolson, representing the Modoc county development board, Mr. Road, publisher of the Modoc Times, Dr. Auble, director of the Modoc Development board and director of the chamber of commerce and J. H. Mahan, district agent of the Southern Pacific office, all of Alturas.

Merrill was represented by Roy Tabor, president H. O. Cox, Chester Haskins and W. F. Fruits, of the Merrill chamber of commerce; Klamath Falls by D. W. Ferguson, the largest potato shipper of the Tule Lake area, and L. L. Graham, district freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific.

William Lee, member of the Board of Supervisors of Skiskiyou county, Dunsmuir; Mr. Martin of the McCloud Lumber company and a representative of the Shasta Cascade Wonderland association of southern Oregon and northern California and also a representative of the Lions club and the chamber of commerce of McCloud, Calif; and directors and members of the Tule Lake chamber of commerce, attended.

No decision on the highway which Tule Lake residents have petitioned for was made. Several factions, including Malin and Tule Lake, are divided on the location of the road, which would be, in reality, a continuation of the Dalles-California highway. This question will be left entirely to the forestry officials, according to Fred Taylor of the Taylor Lumber company, Tule Lake, who gave a report of the meeting.

At the present time there is no through highway in the great Tule Lake area, one of the richest agricultural basins of the northwest, and only market roads are in use.

A report on the Lost River bridge, for which Tule Lake residents have petitioned, will be given by the Board of Supervisors of Skiskiyou county some time next month. It was reported at the meeting. About 125 families who live on the west side of

Demand for Lake Photographs On Increase, Report

Chief Ranger Dave Canfield and Ranger E. H. Roedel, in charge of publicity, of Crater Lake National park, headquarters in Medford, stopped in Klamath Monday after spending the past three days at the park taking pictures of the lake and scenery.

There has been a large demand for pictures of Crater Lake, with a snow background, from national magazines, newspapers in the East and from London, England, and Budapest, Hungary, press services, papers and magazines.

The rangers will return to Medford today.

The lake are asking that two temporary wooden bridges, to cost approximately \$1,000 each, be built across the two channels of Lost river, just west of Tule Lake. The farmers in that district are now forced to travel a distance of 12 miles to the state line, and if the bridges are constructed the distance will be reduced to three or four miles.

It is the belief of farmers of that district that congress will eventually appropriate funds for construction of a \$15,000 or \$20,000 bridge across the river channel, to be built by the reclamation service, and for that reason they are asking that only temporary bridges be built at the present time.

Visitors at the meeting were favorably impressed with the Tule Lake basin and the products shipped from that district.

MEMBERSHIP DRIVE IS OPENED BY VETS

The opening gun of an intensive membership drive was fired last week at a meeting of Veterans of Foreign Wars of the U. S., held at the county court house.

Plans have been laid to add at least a hundred new members to the present roster. Commander W. A. Wamsley is in charge of the campaign.

All overseas veterans of various wars, including the Spanish-American war, and all those who served with the A. E. F. in France and other countries during 1917 and 1918 are eligible to join.

Wamsley issued the following statement with regard to the campaign: "Every overseas ex-service man owes it to himself and his dependents to become affiliated with the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States. We can point with pride to the achievements of our organization in the past with assurances that this good work will continue."

This so-called bonus is a just debt, acknowledged by congress and approved by the public, and we believe it should be paid to the veteran in cash today while his need is acute."

PEIPING, China, Nov. 30, (AP)—Marshal Chang Hueshliang, deposed governor of Manchuria, issued a statement tonight denying he had reached an agreement with Japanese Charge d'Affaires Yano, providing for a neutral zone along the Peiping-Mukden railroad.

"In view of the misrepresentation concerning the interview M. Yano sought with me Saturday night it is necessary definitely to clarify the situation," he said. "M. Yano informally asked my opinion regarding a proposed neutral zone along the Peiping-Mukden railroad. It is entirely contrary to fact to say there was any negotiation or any agreement signed or even any understanding arrived at."

SOUTHERN PACIFIC REPORTS CUT RATE

Plans for another experiment in railroad passenger business, based on modern merchandising methods involving bulk sales, were announced Saturday by the Southern Pacific.

The innovation is a pro-Christian offering of transportation with round trips provided at the cost of the usual one-way fares. It was revealed here by L. L. Graham, district agent.

Effective from December 4 to 12, over the railroad's lines from San Francisco to Ogden and from Portland to El Paso, the special excursion fares have been authorized between all points where the one-way travel cost is \$11 or less, according to the announcement. A return limit of 10 days is specified. A special fare of \$10.70 to Portland has also been announced as a holiday feature. Stopovers will be permitted at all points within the travel limit.
