

Tributes Extended Schissler

Orange Coach Fine
Character Builder, But
Not So Fine When It
Comes to Developing
Winning Teams, Say
Students

There's first a rumble, then a roar, and finally a gigantic crash.
Bill Hayward, athletic trainer and track coach at the University of Oregon, has been one of the few coaches to survive a tribute. Several years ago a smiling committee from the Associated Students presented Bill with a dented-up sports roadster and a sweater covered with service stripes. Bill grunted, smiled, accepted and then continued to go on just as he had in the past. Hayward, who is now bent on getting the sons of his first track stars at Oregon, still is the most active and appreciated man on the Webfoot athletic staff. That's nothing short of a miracle, for tributes are pretty dangerous things and disaster often follows.

In 1925 the late Knoch Bagshaw coached the Washington Huskies to the football championship of the Pacific coast conference. A grateful school enthusiastically patted his back and donated an automobile. Bagshaw, unlike Hayward, looked upon the smiles and hand claps seriously, and took them as a pledge of permanency. But by 1927 rumblings began to break. They were heard all through the 1928 season, and the crash came in 1929. Bagshaw walked the Washington plank, and the smiles and hand claps went to his successor, James Phelan from Purdue, in 1930.

Nils Price, the builder of perpetual basketball champions at the University of California, was hoisted to the job of head football coach after the death of Andy Smith. Nils failed badly in the wake of his illustrious predecessor, and soon his basketball triumphs were submerged in his gridiron failures. Nils was first cheered and then kicked out in favor of Bill Ingram from the naval academy.

Paul J. Schissler, one of the most ancient coaches on the coast in terms of service, has received his tribute. Place your ear to the ground and hear the distant rumblings. Wait for the crash.

"Schissler is a remarkable character builder. We should release him from his football duties and make him director of athletics," thus come the tributes to P. J.

This incomparable praise for the Oregon State coach was passed onto the Medford Daily News by Orange students returning home for the Thanksgiving day vacations.

The Medford report was as follows:

"Students returning from Corvallis for the Thanksgiving holidays report the general campus feeling at Oregon State is the best it has been expressed in this paper. That Coach Paul Schissler should be made head of the department of athletics, but that a new football coach should be selected. This, we believe, is the sanest for the club all there, because Schissler is a well qualified man for the position of director of athletics, but there are men available who can turn out a football team with a winning punch. As further proof of what we have contended here, the report also comes that the football team on the Corvallis campus is behind Schissler to a man. We have said here before that Schissler builds character, and that the men who swear by him. His character building influence could still be used to fullest advantage with him as head of the department, and the fire of a football coach like Frank Calton could also be used to advantage."

The tribute is paid, the ax sharpened, and the head of Paul J. Schissler, the maker of potentially great football teams, may drop into the sawdust-filled basket.

For years Schissler has vindicated his unfortunate conference showing with magnificent comebacks in post season intercollegiate games. A tie with powerful Carnegie Tech, a sweeping victory over New York, wins from Detroit and West Virginia have in the past reestablished Schissler's star.

Right now there is a feeling that even a victory over Utah at Portland next Saturday will not be sufficient to brighten up the wilted blooms of Oregon State's football hopes.

When Captain John J. McEwan left Oregon for Holy Cross, the Beavers were happy in their satisfaction with Schissler. They immediately extended his unexpired contract. Maybe it won't be difficult to transfer that contract to the directorship of athletics where Schissler can go on building characters and someone else can build football teams.

The university is fond of Paul J. Schissler. It probably would rather have him on the football field than in the athletic offices. Oregon might find the Orange more difficult with another coach.

Football Retreats Before Opening of Hoop Season

KLAMATH FALLS COURT PLAYERS OPEN TRAINING

Football simmered into the backfield last night at Klamath Falls high school when Dwight French, basketball coach, staged his first hoop rally of the season. Sixty men reported for the initial workout, and the squad was immediately reduced to workable proportions with 20 men withstanding the eliminations.

French will have but three lettermen to form the center of his team this year. The regulars from last year's team who will probably take their places in the starting lineup will be Howard Burrell, forward, Ray Allen, pass grabbing end from the football team, center, and Jack Knight, another gridiron wingman, guard.

A promising group of reserves from last year's second team has given French some optimism in fortifying the positions left vacant from the 1933-34 quintet which finished second in the conference.

French already has singled out Bend as the team to defeat to gain the championship of this district. The Lava Bears, strong with the return of six veterans, appear the most outstanding team in district 5 at the start of the practice grid.

PRINCETON'S GRID STAFF UNDER FIRE

PRINCETON, N. J., Dec. 1. (AP)—Princeton's disastrous football season—a win over Amherst and then seven straight defeats—has led to a demand by the Daily Princetonian, undergraduate newspaper, for a sweeping revision of the coaching system.

In an editorial, the paper blamed the Princeton board of athletic control and the alumni football committee primarily for "Princeton's ridiculous showing."

"Coach (Al) Wittmer merely accepted the post offered and strove to overcome handicaps," the paper said. "But he is said to have been given autonomy in the choice of assistants and is therefore to blame for some of the 'dead wood' at present serving on the staff."

"Speaking frankly, it seems inevitable and wise that the present out-moded coaching system be sweepingly reorganized with a general revision of personnel."

WEST BADEN, Ind., Dec. 1. (AP)—So far there has been plenty of sparring but no knockouts in the big Major-Minor league skirmish at West Baden to land better players or more desirable playing combinations for the 1935 baseball campaigns.

All the major league clubs had their camps pitched today. The Chicago Cubs, here with a big bag of William Wrigley's sold to tempt such clubs as the Boston Braves, the Phillies and the championship St. Louis Cardinals, intimated they were making good progress and almost ready to break the monotony with an announcement. Many rumors involved their huddles and one of the included Burleigh Grimes, star pitcher of the Cardinals, who may wear a Cub uniform next season. It was learned from a fairly reliable source that Grimes was for sale at the price.

Sox Want Trades

Ed Brandt, star hurler for the Braves, and White Klein, home run producer for the Phillies, also are mentioned as probable Cubs for 1935. President William L. Veeck of the Cubs answered queries by promising an important announcement for either today or tomorrow.

The White Sox caused some what of a mild surprise yesterday by announcing a spring training schedule without a major league exhibition and were "hot" after a few trades.

ALBIE BOOTH WILL GO TO SANATORIUM

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Dec. 1. (AP)—Albie Booth, dramatic and versatile Yale football leader, is going to a sanatorium for a period of rest with his brilliant career as one of Yale's greatest all-around athletes unfinished. Making its first official announcement on the condition of the little three-sport star since he was taken to the college infirmary last week, the university's health department today described Booth's illness as "pleurisy with effusion."
