

TAXPAYERS PUT QUESTIONNAIRE BEFORE BOARD

A questionnaire composed of 31 questions all pertaining to the duties, qualifications and salaries of the superintendent, teachers and other employees of the Klamath Falls School District, Number One, was presented by the taxpayers to the school board members at a meeting held in the Fremont school Monday afternoon with a request that a written reply be made.

The questionnaire was turned over to the clerk of the district, Mrs. Ida M. O'Neil, who will prepare the answers and make a formal reply as soon as possible.

Questions Unknown
Because the questions have not been officially brought up before the school board, which holds its next regular meeting on December 2, the questionnaire was not released for publication.

No discussion on the school budget was held, and no suggestions for changes in the recently formulated budget were made.

The meeting was called primarily to give the taxpayers of the school district an opportunity to meet with board members and discuss the budget.

evacuation by Japanese troops was generally considered tantamount to acceptance of the situation, but it was not certain that the Japanese government would be satisfied without any provisions for activities against bandits.

A Japanese spokesman said this afternoon that the matter of the anti-bandit measures still was under discussion, and that the council's proposals had not yet been agreed to by Japan. At that time Kenichiro Yoshikawa, chief of the Japanese delegation, was talking to Aristide Briand at the latter's office.

U. S. AMBASSADOR MOSCOW, Dec. 1. (AP)—The newspaper Pravda launched another editorial attack on "American imperialism" today, asserting the United States has not yet given up hope of striking a blow at Soviet Russia and weakening Japan in the Pacific by encouraging war in Manchuria.

The point of this policy, said Pravda, quoting information from a communist paper in New York, is that American capitalists profit from orders placed by Japan for war material.

U. S. PRESSURE ALLEGED TOKYO, Dec. 1. (AP)—The belief of fervent Japanese patriots that the United States government was partially responsible for the withdrawal of Japanese troops from Manchuria was discredited by the war office today.

Reports of "any American pressure or interference in connection with military orders are absolutely without foundation," a statement said.

The withdrawal orders were issued upon the receipt of official reports that Marshal Chang Hsueh-Liang was inclined to take a more conciliatory attitude regarding the evacuation of China, it was pointed out, and this was prior to representations from Washington.

MAH PLANS OFFENSIVE TOKYO, Dec. 1. (AP)—Japanese sources said today that intercepted radio messages between General Mah Chan-Shan in Manchuria and Chinese headquarters at Peiping seemed to indicate that the General Mah contemplates an offensive against Tientsin in the belief that the United States is inclined to support China.

government has no intention of "forcing responsibilities upon those who are not prepared to assume it."

"You must come to an agreement among yourselves," he said, "on problems of the representation of minorities. I beg of you to go ahead."

Plans With Mahatma
The prime minister pleaded with Mahatma Gandhi not to depart from the ways of conciliation.

"My dear Mahatma," he said, "let us go the way of friendship. It is the best way, and you may find it is the only way. It is certainly a way which will enable both of us to take great pride in our work."

To all the delegates he emphasized the importance of standing by the government to the end that "with good luck and good will we may solve the problems which now confront us."

Last night's session of the conference did not end until 3 a. m. today.

To Renew Campaign
The Mahatma, from whose lips no word fell during a long day and night, in which nearly a half million words of oratory flowed through the conference rooms in St. James' palace, began his speech as historic Big Ben, high in the parliament building tower, rang out 1 a. m.

He will renew his civil disobedience campaign, he said, with "joy and consolation." It Great Britain fails to grant India what he demands as "real freedom."

Then, he added, India's "half-starved millions" would have the satisfaction of knowing they were "not taking, but giving," lives.

schools where there are Indian pupils in one of the most unique and best manners of any county in the United States.

Spokesman Williams expressed the sentiment of 14 states in which there are counties with non-taxable Indian reservation lands. He expressed the feeling that the federal government should more fully meet its obligations and that every dollar expended in behalf of Indians should be by the government and not by the counties where the Indians had been placed by the government by treaties and congressional acts.

Indian officials present appeared more sympathetic to the plan of Klamath county and the other 257 counties interested after Williams had completed his testimony and cross-examination under Senator Stewer, chairman of the sub-committee.

Klamath county has presented a claim for \$4,640,275.14 in a bill by Senator Stewer for taxes lost and money expended for highway construction, education and law enforcement on the Klamath Indian reservation for the years 1915 to 1929 inclusive. The money would be due from the treasury of the government and not from Indian tribal funds under the bill.

twice by following Hawks back to Agua Caliente, Mexico, from here before night fall.

Hawks Has Hope
spurred by this competition Hawks, holder of about 29 American and European city-to-city records, hoped to put Wedell's record trip flight in the shade by setting the fastest time on the way.

So he might be able to maintain a speed of at least 215 miles per hour with lighter gas loads, Hawks intended to refuel at Portland and Oakland on his way to Agua Caliente.

Weather reports were favorable for a 13 mile south wind above 2,000 feet, which will blow up the flier. Captain Hawks planned to fly between 5,000 and 10,000 feet above ground. He expected to clear customs in record time at Portland.

HAWKS AT PORTLAND PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 1. (AP)—Flying only six minutes on Swan Island airport here to refuel, Captain Frank Hawks, speed flier, continued on his Vancouver-Agua Caliente flight at 10:25:54 a. m. today. He left Vancouver, B. C., at 9 a. m., and reached Portland at 10:23:58 a. m.

Hawks is attempting a new speed record between the two points. He swept into the airport here, landing at a speed of 70 miles an hour. He took 47 gallons of gasoline and 1 1/2 gallons of oil.

Hawks looked cold. He wore a parachute. Under it was his old blue sweater, and over his street clothes he wore his famous pair of blue overalls. He remained in the plane while it was being refueled.

Customs service men checked his plane to comply with federal laws. Hawks had not stopped after leaving the field at Vancouver.

Wind Not Good
He complained that he was not making fast time and feared he would not lower the present mark for the distance as the wind is against him.

"This wind will be fine for Jimmy, though," he added, speaking of James H. Wedell, New Orleans flier, who is attempting to set a mark of 10 hours for the roundtrip from Agua Caliente to Vancouver, and who then was on the northern lap.

WEDDELL ZOOMS OFF AGUA CALIENTE, Lower California, Mexico, Dec. 1. (AP)—J. R. Wedell, New Orleans speed flier, zoomed out of the sky at 6:17:45 a. m. today, touched his wheels at the airport here and raced away toward Vancouver, B. C., on a round trip, three flag record flight with a flying start estimated at 130 miles per hour.

Wedell actually began his flight at San Diego, Cal., where he fueled and took off shortly after 6 a. m. He did not stop at the field here to avoid being forced to stop in San Diego for customs inspection.

The low-winged monoplane, painted a bright red, was lost from sight within two minutes after it touched Mexican soil, headed toward Reno, Nev., to refuel.

quota of relief work appropriations. The director suggested that \$10,000 be added to the county budget for 1932 to aid in the relief work this winter. He pointed out that the millage rate has been reduced four per cent on the lowered valuations. The amount to be raised by taxation is lowered to \$240,279.45, and that the additional \$10,000 for relief which must be given would not materially increase the taxes and that a \$250,279.45 reduction in amount to be raised would remain.

County employees donated 10 per cent of their salaries for a number of months and this amount could be transferred to the emergency fund for relief as it has already been paid in taxes and is a gift to the county from its employees, Bradbury said.

The amount is not to be subtracted from the tax base on December 31, Bradbury pointed out. Conferences are being held with the city park board, city officials and all others to find as much relief work as possible. Some relief work is being provided by the county in cooperation with the county engineer for a limited number of men who will be paid with food credit slips.

J. M. Devens, attorney for the Governor's state highway commission, has written to the Governor's group here saying that the county and city and all others will have to provide relief work in addition to that which the state is giving.

Devens wrote that public projects, particularly those carried on and that individuals and concerns must be encouraged to provide additional employment.

The director of relief here pointed out that the building of an armory with county and city funds which are already accumulated and on hand, without state aid, would be one way of relieving the unemployment condition.

The canal covering or improvement plan would also be of great assistance, he said. Representatives of the ways and means committee of the house of representatives, in an interview promised his help in securing the canal improvement.

Development of the Grant project on the Klamath River by the California Oregon Power company would employ hundreds of men, it is pointed out, if the company could and would follow out their former plan. The state and the public have shown no interest in the development by the public and to utilize surplus water, developing it into power, the assistance of all citizens of the county is needed if such development by the power company is authorized and secured, Bradbury pointed out.
