

IX LEAGUE SENDS QUIZ TO K. U. H. S.

The list of 27 questions, prepared by the Klamath Taxpayers' League to directors of the Klamath Union high school district No. 2, was released Friday Wilson Wiley, clerk of the board. The taxpayers requested an early reply to the questions which is being prepared by Wiley.

A similar questionnaire is being prepared on the city budget and will be presented to the city council before the budget comes for final approval. It will be followed by a fourth, to be presented to the county court. The last will be preceded by a series of meetings in outlying districts to discuss budget problems.

The high school questionnaire, prepared by A. G. Morrison, state secretary, follows:

1.—Give statement of expenditures of Modoc field and from that source did this money come?

2.—Who renders the "personal service" wherein there is an estimated expenditure of \$1,050?

3.—Can this service be reduced or entirely eliminated?

4.—Of what does your legal service consist and who is your legal advisor?

5.—What was the attorney's fee paid and to whom paid for examining the titles of the property bought by your board?

6.—Who furnishes the supplies such as chalk, paper, ink, etc.?

7.—Are these supplies bought from competitive bidders and if not why not?

8.—Are the competitive bids or various supplies entered on the minutes records of your district and if not why not?

9.—Will your principal take a 10 per cent cut in salary on January 1?

10.—Is the principal married and is his wife teaching and are they taxpayers in Klamath county?

11.—How many married teachers are you employing now and how many of them are taxpayers in Klamath county?

12.—How many of these married women teachers hold "master's degrees"?

13.—What is the combined salary of the principal and his wife as teachers in your district per year?

14.—Will the teachers in your district take a 10 per cent cut in salary, voluntarily, commencing January 1, 1932?

15.—How many of your teachers assist in the principal's office as stenographers or office assistants?

16.—How many office assistants has the principal?

17.—How much of the principal's time is spent in the interest of educational matters out of Klamath county?

18.—Does the principal do any actual teaching or is his time taken up as a manager of the school?

19.—Does your board feel that this district could be consolidated with District No. 1 under one principal or superintendent, one clerk and one lot of office help?

20.—Cannot the item of \$1,500 for maintenance and repairs be lowered in this year's plan?

21.—What is the additional item of \$500 for maintenance and repairs intended for that was not covered in the \$1,500 item?

22.—What was the cost of the bridge across the canal east of the school building?

23.—What was the cost of the pavement on Alameda street from the above bridge to Mon Claire street?

24.—Could this paving have waited or the ground graveled and made passable for what little travel it carries, thereby eliminating a lot of expense at this time?

25.—What source supplied the money for the two above referred to expenditures?

26.—What is the cost to the district for the clerk's bond?

27.—How much time is required to complete the "audit" of the district's books and who does this work?

156 Temporary Postal Jobs To Be Given Out

One hundred and fifty-six persons will be aided by Christmas temporary employment in the Klamath Falls post office. Postmaster John McCall stated Monday. Notices are being sent to the men who will receive the 10 clerks jobs, 15 carriers positions and one rural delivery assistant.

Each man employed has an average of five dependents, with one man having eight dependents upon him, the postmaster said. There will be \$114.61 paid to the temporary employees. About \$40 will be received by each man who is employed.

ROAD POLICY CHANGE ASKED BY STOCKMEN

A resolution requesting the Klamath county court to have all former county roads traversing the Klamath Indian reservation, re-designated as county roads, thus eliminating a tax levied by the Indian bureau against stockmen whose cattle and sheep pass through the reservation, was passed at the annual meeting of the Southern Oregon Livestock association Saturday.

C. A. Henderson, county agent and secretary of the livestock association, explained that a charge of one cent per head per day was collected by the Indian bureau from stockmen, for permitting them to let their stock travel on the reservation roads.

Tax Sum Large The stockmen maintain that the roads are county roads and their stock is not legally subject to the charge, which amounts to large sums each year. The resolution will be taken up before the county court.

The directors of the association passed a resolution requesting the Indian service to favor local stockmen by giving them preference for Indian range land adjacent to their holdings.

In the past leases have been given to itinerant sheep men, and the local stockmen feel that the practice is unfair. They instructed C. A. Henderson, secretary, to send copies of the resolution to Senator Steiwer and Congressman Butler.

Organization of grazing districts to take over control of public domain lands was passed upon favorably. The department of the interior has signified its willingness to turn the control over to various grazing organizations and the local stockmen will assist any group of cattle and sheep men who wish to form such an organization for this purpose.

A discussion of marketing cattle through the West Coast Marketing association was held, but no action taken since most of the local stockmen have withdrawn from the marketing association.

Officers Re-elected All officers of the Southern Oregon Livestock association were re-elected at Saturday's meeting. They are D. E. Alexander, president; C. E. Drew, vice president; C. V. Loosley, W. R. Campbell and Fred Stokell, directors, and C. A. Henderson, secretary.

The officers voted to send \$150 to the National Livestock association as their contribution to the work on national livestock problems.

About 20 stockmen attended the meeting.

Today, Manchuria is sanitary, peaceful and prosperous, an economic center where natives as well as foreigners are able to engage in business without molestation or strife; while about 25 years ago the territory was full of bandits, thieves, pestilence

and famine, just as other parts of China are now."

HE continues: "Japan's administration and huge investments reaching many billions of yen made Manchuria what she is today. Viewing from these points, Japan has been far away from selfishness; she has welcomed the people of the whole world to come and join in making Manchuria a center of international trade."

"Then China, noticing that Manchuria has been turned into a splendid region, suddenly recalled that it was once a part of its own country and now tries to oust Japan."

It's the old, old story of the superior people taking over the affairs of the inferior, and explaining, logically enough, that it was done for the inferior people's own best good.

England did it in the case of India, and justified it by the same argument. Poor old Mahatma Gandhi, going about in the cold fogs of London in his loin cloth and his shawl, can't see the force of the argument and demands freedom.

Down in our hearts, most of us think he is wrong, even while admiring the obviously sincere old boy, and tell ourselves that India is better off as she is.
