

MARKS WILL NOT EXTEND CLEMENCY

HALEM, Dec. 18 (AP)—Governor Willard L. Marks announced today he would not extend any executive clemency during his term in office while Governor Meier is out of the state. The conditional pardons and commutations of sentences announced last night were those issued by Governor Meier before he left for California, not as Christmas pardons, but, it was explained, because of the work of the state.

During the past few days, Marks said, "I have received many requests from friends or relatives of persons who have been sentenced to the penitentiary or county jails throughout the state for executive clemency. This is partly due, I assume, to the fact that any acting governor is besieged with such requests on the theory that he may grant clemency which has been denied by the regular governor."

"Because of this situation, I deem it proper to make public announcement of my policy with reference to this matter during the brief time I will serve as governor. It will be my purpose not to extend any clemency except to grant paroles upon the recommendation of the state parole board in cases where inmates of the penitentiary have served their minimum sentences and their conduct in prison has been such as to lead the parole board to recommend their release."

Morgan & Co., was telling the senate finance committee that probably 90 per cent of American banks had participated in extending short term credits to European countries.

He said, however, that the participation had not endangered the American bank situation and that the loans were designed to restore normal conditions upon which American trade was dependent.

Lamont told the committee of other loans the Morgan company handled for the American situation and that the company has handled \$1,000,000 in long term foreign bonds, of which \$438,280,000 has been retired, leaving a balance outstanding as of December 15, \$1,562,720,000.

Commerce Benefits
Senator Reed asked if American commerce had been benefited from its foreign loans.

"Very greatly," Lamont replied. "But it can be argued that the foreign loaning was overdone."

He added that the loans not only "contributed materially to the maintenance of trade, but to the capacity of governments to discharge their obligations to the United States government."

Asked whether payment of the private loans would interfere with payment of the public debts, he said the "question of priorities" which had been much discussed in the press, would not "amount to a row of pins."

Lamont was asked if the foreign governments would be able to resume their debt payments at the end of the Hoover moratorium.

Appeals for Railroads
Lamont concluded with an appeal for railroads.

officers he drove down Kansas avenue to the designated place. They failed to find the victims, but after cruising around a woman stepped out and asked:

"Is this the car that came for me?"

The woman was Mrs. Donnelly. Blair was with her.

The kidnapping occurred at her home late Wednesday as she was returning from her downtown office.

As Blair drove into the driveway another machine pulled in. Three men got out.

Blair was forced to move over from the wheel and two of the men got into the rear seat with Mrs. Donnelly. As the car moved away the men blindfolded her.

Blair also was blindfolded and, after a 15-minute drive, they were transferred to another car.

Into Dark House
"It was 6 o'clock when they captured me," she said. "We drove for a long time and then were taken into a dark house. I was seated without delay and they immediately told me they wanted money."

"We took you because we want money," they told me. "We are not going to hurt you if you will do as we tell you. We will treat you all right but we want \$15,000."

"I said, 'Oh, my land! I have not that much money.'"

After some discussion as to whom the ransom demand should be delivered, she decided to write to her attorney, James E. Taylor. She said one of the men stood near her with a flashlight and dictated the demand.

She said she and Blair were tied hand and foot. The abductors had provided a bed for her and a cot for the chauffeur.

She said they were fed milk and crackers, and that only one of the men was discourteous. She described the house as "filthy."

"Then the thing got out (referring to the news of the abduction) and they came to me and told me they realized they never should have taken a woman and that they were going to release us. They told me to get up and they put the sack over my head again. They put another over Blair's head and took us out to the car."

Less than an hour later the two were released.

In the area of the South Manchurian railway, particularly the region west of the Liao river. This is the territory just north of Chinchow in which the Japanese drive against that place was halted last month.

At the time the announcement was made the reports of fighting were received and also reports that bandits are unusually active around Changchun, Hailin and other points.

Chief Named.
Field Marshal Prince Kotohito Kanin was selected today as chief of the army general staff to succeed General Kanno Kan-ya. It is the first time since the Russo-Japanese war that a prince of the royal blood has received the post.

Kotohito is a kinsman of Emperor Hirohito. Local newspapers said he agreed to accept.

The appointment was made with the intention of unifying and consolidating military affairs throughout Manchuria. Prince Kotohito is 66 years old.

Reports were current here that the government wished to establish a central Manchurian organization, linking together the civil and military phases of Manchurian relations. The reports were officially unverified, but it was said the plans called for four departments, under the civil governor of Kwantung, the president of the South Manchurian railway, the commander of the Kwangtung army and the Japanese consul-general at Mukden.
