

MILK MEN TO HAVE SERIES OF SESSIONS

A series of meetings of dairy men, milk distributors and milk producers is scheduled for Monday and Tuesday in the county agent's office, according to C. A. Henderson.

Directors of the Klamath Cow-Testing association were scheduled to meet with the county agent and Earl Gardner, cow tester at 1:30 Monday. At this meeting the directors were formulating plans for the continuance of the association to insure its operation during the coming year.

All local milk distributors have been asked to meet at the county agent's office tonight, while the Klamath Milk Producers' association will meet Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. All milk producers in the county, whether members of the association or not, are requested to attend this meeting. It is probable, Henderson stated, that the meeting will have to be moved from his office to the county court room to accommodate the large attendance expected.

INCIDENTALLY, the airplane, which is so nearly annihilating distance, is modern in execution but not in conception.
