FINANCIAL MARKET HAS UPWARD TURN

NEW YORK, Dec. 22. (AP)—The financial markets generally crept higher in quiet trading today, with stocks regaining the ground lost in yesterday's setback. Advances of 1 to 2 points were numerous and the closing tone was firm. The turnover, however, was less than 1,500,000 shares.

While there was some irregularity in the bond market, irregularities were generally higher, along with stocks. The Hungarian moratorium appeared to have been discounted in advance, and was not regarded as of particular importance so far as the United States was concerned.

CABINET RESIGNS

NANKING, China, Dec. 22 (AP)—China's fast-shifting political stage underwent an additional shakeup late today when the entire national government cabinet, ministers and vice-ministers, tendered their resignations as a unit.

The capital was astounded by the news of the resignations. Former President Chiang Kai-Shek left suddenly by airplane for his native town of Fengshui, in northern Chekiang. His departure was carried out quietly. Even his associates here did not know of it. Only this morning he had indicated to party leaders who are convened here to form a new government that he intended to attend the sessions and assist in setting up the new regime.

The reason for his leaving remained a mystery tonight. The belief was expressed in some quarters, however, that a number of the leaders who are slated to come here to assist in forming the new government declined to do so unless General Chiang departed.

International Banks want us to take the first step toward dictatorship.

"This is the first false step, the entering idea by which an executive may legislate as he sees fit in defiance of the constitution."

Treaty Revision Urged

Johnson called for revision of the Versailles treaty to "give back all the spoils of war" if "you want peace over there."

Senator Gore, democrat, Oklahoma, suggested the benefit of the cost of the moratorium would be to make the world safe for democracy.

"I think what the senator means," replied Johnson, "is that when the republican party does this it means this country is safe for democracy."

"I accept the amendment," said Gore. Laughter and applause broke out in the gallery.

Johnson quit after speaking for more than two hours.

Senator Bill, democrat, Washington, offered an amendment to bar any further postponement of the war debts after the year's holiday as well as to prohibit revision of the debts.

Johnson said three New York bank representatives had testified more than \$4,000,000,000 was invested by Americans in Europe.

"We were in a drunken orgy of speculation, there is no doubt of it," Johnson added.

"But," he implored, "let your eyes center on America and Americans for a brief period. Don't be European-minded when distress is upon yours and your own."
