DR. PITKIN and his fellow critics might profitably ponder for a moment this truth, which no one any longer denies:

IT WASN'T Lincoln, the leader, in whom confidence had been lost by these little faith, who were wrong. Those who were in the wrong were his narrow critics.

If Lincoln had lived, many of the costly mistakes of the post-war period would have been avoided.

SO don't become too greatly disturbed by these protestations of loss of faith in the country's leadership. They have been made before. And fully as often as not they have been utterly mistaken.

WHAT is it that these critics really want? Here is a fair answer: They want somebody who will have a magic wand and make everything IMMEDIATELY all right, without the necessity of any further hard work or sacrifice on their part.

They are going to be disappointed. Magic wands are scarce. Such improvement as we see in the future, and there is going to be improvement to be seen—don't doubt that—will be the result of hard work, careful management and a measurable degree of sacrifice on the part of EVERYBODY.

There will be no magic wand leadership such as those critics crave.
