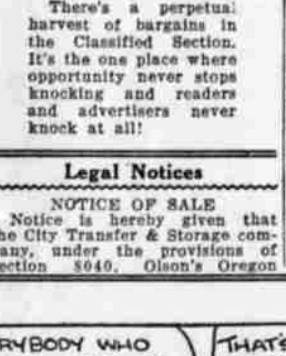

1932 PROMISES BIG POLITICAL OREGON SHOW

SALEM, Ore., (UP)—Unless all signs fail, 1932 will be a big political year in Oregon.

Selection of state republican and democratic committees, primaries in May and the general election in November will provide the thrills of a three-ring circus.

As an after-show, the state legislature will convene the following January with a program that should sizzle. Such controversial issues as taxation, power development and crime problems will be a few of the major items on the calendar.

Governor Relieved
Ill the past few months, Governor Meier has relaxed in the saddle, laid aside his whip, satisfied to let his mount breeze across the finish line without any other applause from the crowd.

What with the House-Holder lead at a standstill, these interested in public affairs of the five-months away primaries for excitement.

C. C. Hulet and Lane county's Emmet Howard will try to unseat W. C. Hawley, who for nearly a quarter of a century has represented Oregon's first congressional district at the national capitol. Hulet is head of the state grange, a former minister and Sunday school teacher.

Nearly as many others are mentioned as seekers of the job as there are voters in Seapooose. W. A. Delzell of Salem is gunning for the democratic nomination.

Scraps Scheduled
Charles H. Martin, R. H. Butler and Frederick Steiner of Oregon's congressional delegation also are expected to be subjects of an energetic campaign assault. Martin is a democrat.

The list of prospective candidates for the three posts includes most anyone from a young Portland attorney to a former governor.

Other major scraps scheduled for the state primaries are for offices of treasurer and secretary.

It is expected that State Secretary Hal C. Hone will have opposition from some person more in harmony with the Meier administration.

Incumbent Rufus Holman decides to be a candidate for treasurer, he will have plenty of opposition. Mark McCallister and Sam Keiser, state office holders until the Meier regime, are said to be considering the treasurer's post. So are about a dozen others.

Both Chief Justice Bean and Justice Brown are expected to again become candidates for the state supreme court post. Another office of importance to be striven for at the primaries is that of attorney general. Incumbent L. H. Van Winkle will be a candidate.

Many Candidates
Already there is talk of organizing the 1932 state legislature. For the senate Fred Kiddle, B. L. Eddy, W. E. Burke and Sam Brown are among those mentioned for the presidency. Candidates Eddy, Burke and Brown are not being taken seriously by observers at the state house.

Energetic Homer D. Angel of the Multnomah delegation and Earl Snell have been mentioned for the house leadership. The line will please form on the right.

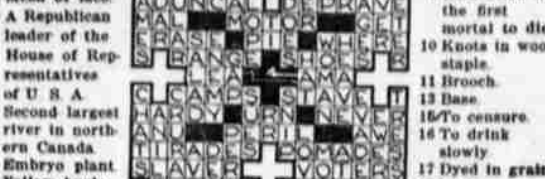
