THREAT MADE BY ARRESTED YOUTH

ALTURAS, Calif.—"I'll blow up the place when I get out of reform school," was the threat made by a 16-year-old youth in Judge F. M. Jamison's court here this week.

The boy, James King, who appears 12, but claims to be 16, had threatened violence towards his employers, proprietors of a local service station. He claimed they owed him back wages, although investigation disclosed the fact that the lad, left here by his father several weeks ago, was engaged to work for his board and lodging after school hours.

He was committed by Judge Jamison to the local reformatory. The lad's father cannot be found, although on leaving here he promised to send for his son.

ALTURAS, Calif.—Peace officers here are wondering why two sets of prisoners enjoying free board and lodging in the local battle want to leave their boarding house for an uncertain livelihood outside.

While two younger prisoners were sawing bars with an improvised hacksaw in one part of the jail, Walter Hagen, alias Charlie Davis, was busy engaged in the same task on another set of bars. Night Policeman Ira Darrat frustrated the break for liberty when he discovered the prisoners engaged in their tasks. About half a dozen jail inmates were involved in the attempted break for freedom.

Irrigation Group Requests Hearing On Bond Election

Irl Davis, William Irwin and John Ross, directors of the Horroby Irrigation district, filed a request in circuit court Monday asking Judge W. M. Duncan to set a date for the hearing of objections to the recent bond election before final approval is given by the court.

The election, held December 26, authorized issuance of bonds amounting to \$112,000 to pay a like amount of outstanding bonds. The request authorizes the court to examine and confirm the legality of the election, carrying out the regular procedure of all irrigation district bond elections.

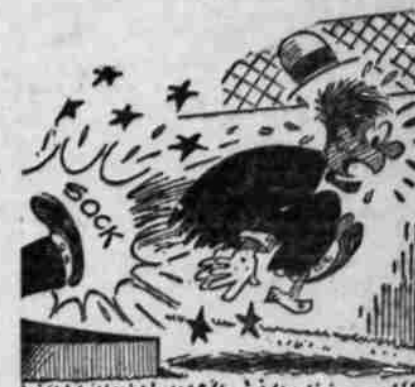

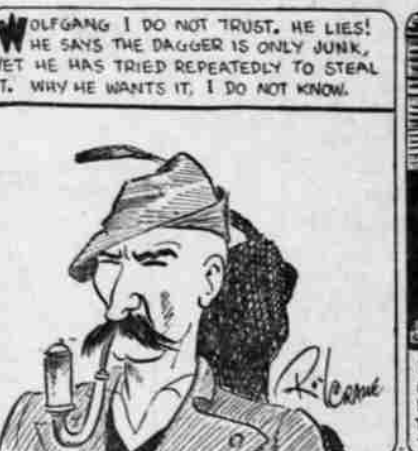
