

# LENZ BRIDGE SIDE GAINS ON CULBERTSONS

NEW YORK, Jan. 5, (AP).—Ely Culbertson's side was 16,435 points ahead in the great contract bridge match today, with only 11 rubbers remaining of the 150-rubber series.

Edw. S. Lenz, Culbertson's chief opponent in a test of bidding systems, which began December 7, and which will end next Friday night, said he still has a chance to win. Neutral experts regarded it as virtually impossible.

**Lenz's Side Gains**  
Lenz and Commander Wingfield Liggett Jr. gained 3,355 points in the seventeenth session ending early today. They won six of nine rubbers, making the series stand 71 for Culbertson and 58 for Lenz. The points became 112,030 and 95,715.

Mrs. Culbertson completed her stipulated quota of the match—75 rubbers—last night, but intends to resume her place opposite her husband at the final session Friday night. Tonight Michael Gottlieb will be Culbertson's partner and Howard Schnken Thursday night. There will be no session tomorrow night.

**Doubles Increase Score**  
Lenz and Liggett held the tickets at the seventeenth session, and their gain was increased by Culbertson's doubling. In one rubber there was a double on every one of the six hands. Lenz and Liggett each made one double contract and each was set one. Each of the Culbertsons was set when doubled.

In another rubber Lenz, when vulnerable, was doubled at five diamonds and fulfilled his contract. Mrs. Culbertson failed to make a little slam. Lenz once took all the tricks on his system's opening bid of three no trump, which was unopposed. A grand slam needed two finesse, but Culbertson said that under his system, bidding a suit first instead of no trump, successful little slam at no trump would have been contracted.

**Defensive Play**  
On hand 747 there was one of the many doubles of the session by Culbertson. Liggett was set one vulnerable when trying to make two spades. Culbertson said that his was a weak penalty double, but it was retrieved by brilliant defensive play. Mrs. Culbertson, on the ninth trick, led the queen of clubs, which took the trick. Culbertson discarded his ace of diamonds which prevented him being put in to lead up to Liggett.

## Navigation Bill To Be Brought Up

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 5, (AP).—Senator Steiwer of Oregon will introduce a bill Tuesday to provide open river navigation on the Columbia, according to a wire received here today.

The bill will direct the secretary of war to provide a channel 100 feet wide and seven feet deep from Celilo Falls to the mouth of the Snake river, except at Homly Rapids, where the depth shall be six feet.

The measure will also provide improvement of the Snake by a channel one hundred feet wide and four feet deep from the mouth to Pittsburg landing.

## United States Society Formed, Plan Group Here

Announcement of a nation-wide movement, with representatives in this and other cities throughout the country, for the purpose of increasing interest of students in high schools and colleges in the study of government, was received today from Washington.

The organization, which will be known as The United States Society, will be non-partisan and non-political and will confine its activities to the free distribution of current materials on governmental affairs. The national board of advisers of the Society consists of former President Calvin Coolidge, Ellhu Root, Newton D. Baker, John Grier Hibben and Owen D. Young. Local chairmen will be announced shortly.

David Lawrence, who has accepted the national chairmanship, announced its purposes in an address before the recent meeting of the Political Science Association of America.

## Fair Argument To Be Settled

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 5, (AP).—The controversy over conduct of the state fair, centering around Mrs. Ella Wilson, secretary of the fair, and Max Gehlar, state director of agriculture, faces Governor Meier this week.

Mrs. Wilson, charged with lack of cooperation and extravagance in fair matters, has been secretary since 1924. Her contract expires January 15. Gehlar has authority to dismiss her, but it is believed he will not do so unless the Governor sanctions such a move.

## 1100 Men Back In Rail Shops

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 5, (AP).—Eleven hundred men who have been employed intermittently for the past few months went back to work in Southern Pacific shops here Monday on a four-day week basis.

Approximately 6,000 men returned to work on that basis in the Pacific division of the company, extending from Portland on the north to Tucuman on the south and Ogden on the east, according to announcement of the company.

## Buckshot Taken From Man's Body

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 5, (AP).—Doctors at the police emergency hospital were busy picking 13 buckshot from various parts of H. V. Wolf's body today.

It is alleged that there is a buckshot wound for each of the 13 bunnies stolen from the pen of B. Morris of Rainier. Morris fired the shots. The rabbits were found at Wolf's place, police said.

# INSTRUMENT TO REGISTER WIND INSTALLED HERE

The California-Oregon Power company has completed the installation of an anemometer register at the Klamath Lumber and Box company plant in Shipplington at a cost of \$399, Manager H. P. Bosworth announced.

The register measures the velocity of wind on the upper Klamath lake, registers the direction and keeps track of the total number of miles of wind each day. The anemometer is one of the few in the state, Medford and Portland having such instruments.

The machine is of the latest type and replaces an anemometer which the company had borrowed from the United States forest service. Anemometers are used by all weather bureaus of the first class and at the leading airports.

# GOVERNOR MEIER Returns To Desk
