We have more land already than we know what to do with and a population that in proportion to our area is still small.

We need more colonies just about as badly as a land-poor big farmer needs more farms.

MORE lamb meat was eaten in 1931 than ever before, William Whitefield Woods, president of the Institute of American meat packers, tells us.

That is good news to Western sheep men, who are wise enough to know that the only way in which markets can be permanently improved is by increasing consumption.

THERE is plenty of room for increase in consumption of lamb, because New England and the Pacific Coast states now eat considerably more than three-fourths of all the lamb meat consumed in the United States.

JAPAN TAKES SEAPORT CITY NEAR CHINCHOW

Campaign Toward China Proper Reported; Troops Advance.

MUKDEN, Manchuria, Jan. 6. (AP)—Japanese troops captured the town of Hulatan, a port only a short distance south of Chinchow, on the Gulf of Liatong, today. There was no resistance.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6. (AP)—It was indicated in highly authoritative circles today an important statement of American policy toward the Far East may be made shortly by Secretary Stimson. The discussion between the secretary and the French and British ambassadors regarding further joint action in the Far Eastern situation were linked by officials in predicting a statement on the general situation.

Secretary Stimson declined to comment on the visit of the ambassadors. The state department has received official dispatches indicating a Japanese campaign beyond Chinchow toward Chongking, and such action is looked upon with concern.

Secretary Stimson said he considered the Japanese expression of regrets to be tantamount to an apology by Japan for the attack by three Japanese on American Consul Culver R. Chamberlin.

NANKING, Jan. 6. (AP)—Official reports from Peiping today said Japanese troops were marching westward from Chinchow on the ancient Chinese capital, Jehol, on the Luan river. Their strength was estimated at 4,000 men.

Another Japanese detachment was reported to have advanced another 50 miles down the Peiping-Mukden railway from Chinchow toward Shanhaiwan, over which Japanese planes are flying every day.

Civil Service Group To Install System As Charter Provides.

Rumors of councilman interference in the city police department, regarding the employment or dismissal of certain officers or in the making of arrests, have come to the knowledge of the civil service commission. Chairman J. H. Napier stated Monday. As a result, civil service has not so far been in full force and effect in Klamath Falls as the charter provides, although the commission, composed of Chairman Napier, J. E. Hosking and Richard Weatherly, adopted rules and regulations on March 2, and held examinations on July 19, after which an eligible list was given to the secretary of the commission, he said. DALE JACKSON'S BODY IS FOUND

Amphibian Falls In Stunt; Charred Remains of Army Pilot Found.

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 6. (AP)—Dale (Red) Jackson, co-holder of the world's endurance airplane record, was killed late today when an Amphibian plane he was stunting above the Municipal Airport fell approximately 2,000 feet to the ground.

ELKINS, W. Va., Jan. 6. (AP)—State police were informed late today the body of Lieut. E. H. Bobbitt, missing army pilot, had been found in the mountains near Elk.

Sergeant Arnold Moore said he was notified by A. G. Arbogast, a garage owner, that the pilot's charred body and his wrecked plane had been found by M. S. Simons and Carl Reaver, near Fools Knob.

Bobbitt disappeared Christmas day while flying from Selfridge Field, Mich., to his home in Hot Springs, Va.

Two Injured In Tunnel Cave In

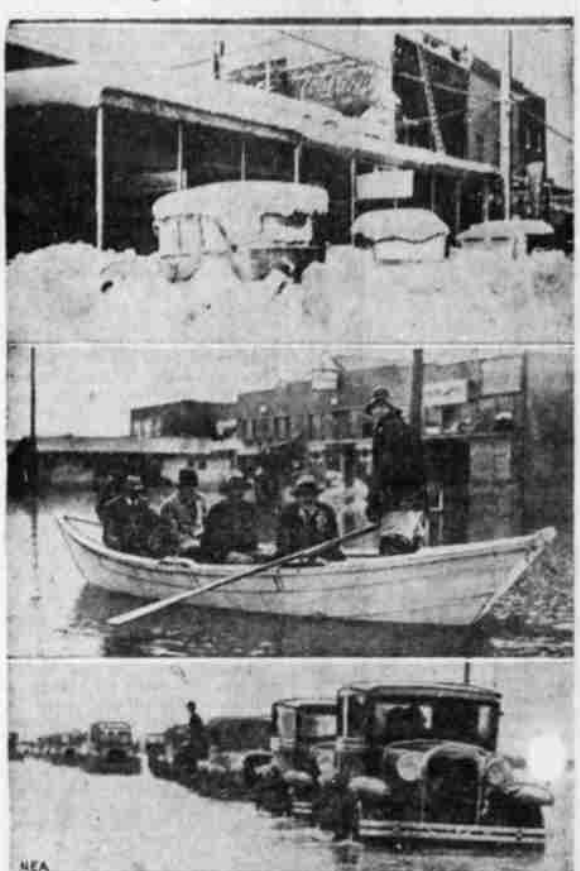

TWO BURNED WHEN STOVE EXPLODES

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 6. (AP)—Critically burned, Mrs. Lonnie Denn, 20, and her brother, Arthur White, 13, were brought to a hospital here today from their Camas Valley home, following the boy's attempt to start a fire with kerosene.

Mrs. Denn's entire body was burned so badly in the resulting explosion it was feared she might die. The boy was expected to recover.

Young White attempted to speed up a slow burning fire in the kitchen range by pouring in the low-grade gasoline. An explosion occurred. Mrs. Denn's entire body was burned by the flames which rolled on the wet ground. Her brother was burned on the body and legs.

Mistrial Called In Beckley Case

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 6. (AP)—For the second time the murder trial of Cecil Beckley has ended without a verdict.

Late Tuesday, after the jury had deliberated about 24 hours, R. O. Lehman, Oakland farmer-juror, collapsed and was taken to a hospital. His collapse was attributed by physicians to the strain of the past week. The court declared a mistrial. The district attorney announced he will try the case a third time.

Cabinet Member Is Assailed by Texas Democrat

Charges Are Based On Statute Prohibiting Commerce Activity.

Senate Adopts Measure To Ban Lame Duck Sessions.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6. (AP)—A resolution seeking the impeachment of Secretary Mellon was introduced in the house by Representative Patman, democrat, Tex. "On my own responsibility," Patman told the house, "I impeach Andrew W. Mellon of high crimes and misdemeanors."

The house sat tense and still as Patman spoke, facing the chamber crowded with representatives who had just answered a roll call.

Based on Statute. Patman based his charges on a statute of 1789 forbidding a treasury head from engaging in commerce. He said Mellon owns voting stock in 300 corporations with combined assets of \$3,000,000,000.

"Since becoming secretary, Mellon has been the owner in whole or in part of many sea vessels competing with other vessels in commerce," the Texan said.

WET DEMOCRAT IS ELECTION WINNER

Nominally Republican New Hampshire Area Makes Change.

MANCHESTER, N. H., Jan. 6. (AP)—William N. Rogers of Wakefield, a wet democrat, today stood as the choice of the first New Hampshire congressional district, nominally republican and represented by a dry since 1925.

He is the first democrat to represent the state in congress in 10 years and was the last of his party to serve in the national house.

Former Governor John H. Bartlett, Rogers' republican opponent for the seat made vacant by the death of Fletcher Hale of Laconia, received 24,505 votes to Rogers' 27,453 at yesterday's special election.

Sentiment Grows. Democratic sentiment had been rapidly growing for several weeks. A number of municipalities in the district either swung into the democratic column or reported close contests in recent local elections. Yesterday, even (Continued on Page Three)

Inheritance Tax Costs Held Down

SALEM, Jan. 6. (AP)—Cost of operating the state inheritance tax department, to make collections during 1931 amounting to \$720,507.31, was \$12,958, or less than two per cent of amount collected. It was reported last night by Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer. The treasurer's office handles all inheritance taxes.

Of the nearly three-quarters million dollars collected \$451,575 was received into the general fund of the state. The remainder of the fund is being carried until the actual amount of tax in each estate can be definitely determined.

(AP)—The Leavitt bill to extend until January 1, 1935, the time in which the states of Washington, Idaho, Oregon and Montana may enter into a compact or agreement respecting the disposition and apportionment of the Columbia river and its tributaries was reported favorably today by the House irrigation committee.
