

GAME COMMISSION WILL VISIT CITY

HALEM, Jan. 6, (P)—The State Game Commission will meet in Halem tonight with local sportsmen and citizens of Yamhill, Polk and Marion counties to promote a specific program for this section. The meeting here is one of a series being held by the commission over the state in an effort to develop better fishing and hunting in every part of Oregon. It was announced.

The commission will hold a similar meeting in Eugene tomorrow night. Meetings have already been held in Pendleton, McMinnville, Albany and The Dalles. Other hearings have been arranged at Medford January 20, Coquille January 21 and Roseburg January 22. Meetings for which definite dates have not yet been set include Klamath Falls, probably January 19, Baker, Bend, Newport, Astoria and Portland.

The 1932 program will be announced by the commission as soon as the hearings are complete.

To Fort Klamath via the west side of Upper Klamath Lake, which is now in the secondary highway system, as soon as possible.

Project No. 6—Willamette Highway. Complete the eastern end of this highway as early as possible.

The committee further recommended that the county court be petitioned to continue the Hry-Patsley road from the Walter Campbell ranch to the forest boundary.

Confidence in Chief

The civil service commission in making its decisions took the stand that the charter should be enforced as well as the rules of the commission.

Chairman Napier said "I have, and from expressions of the other two members of the commission I believe that they have, confidence in the ability and work of Police Chief Guy Merrill. He must, however, be left alone in his management of the department under the commission if he is to be allowed to build a good police department."

"As it is the policemen don't know whether they have a job tomorrow or not. This is largely due to councilman interference in the police department and its work. Chief Merrill has expressed his desire to cooperate with the commission," Chairman Napier said.

Councilmen were not named and no definite charges made by the chairman of the commission in his statement, although he gave specific instances.

The secretary of the commission stated that he understood that Captain Leigh Ackerman was temporarily off the force although the commission has received no word from Chief Merrill that Ackerman has been fired and that his name still remains on the eligible list.

The statement "Raskob insists he wants to keep down dry-wet discussion in the party but constantly brings it to the front" came from Senator Shoppard, co-author of the 18th amendment. He said the chairman's letter "deals exclusively with prohibition when the real and fundamental issue is the economic condition of the American people."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6, (P)—The democratic party faced today the freshly stated desire of Chairman Raskob to keep the prohibition issue to the fore in this year of presidential election.

Under a warning that its virtual destruction would be the alternative, the chairman laid down a pressing demand that the party declare at the convention this summer for submitting the entire question to the people for a new decision.

He was equally emphatic that the party keep itself on the fence, going neither wet nor dry, until the voters have had their say. Raskob made public his views last night in a lengthy letter to the national committee he heads, supplementing this with remarks evoked by questioning reporters who surrounded him as he arrived for the committee meeting Saturday.

Complete Repeal Avoided

The proposition Raskob wishes laid before the voters does not involve complete repeal of prohibition, but rather a choice between retention of the eighteenth amendment unmodified, and his "home rule" plan, under which the people of each state could exempt themselves from national prohibition by voting for state liquor control.

At his press conference, seated on the arm of a broadened chair in the National Press club lounge, the democratic leader smilingly offered to bet two to one that the country would reverse its prohibition stand within "our lifetime."
