THREE men die when the engine of their fishing boat falls and they drift, helpless, into the breakers near Coos Bay. Facing peril is a part of the daily lives of those who go down to the sea in ships, both big and little.

OVER in the Idaho desert, just across the Oregon line, two trappers, feeling the need of a purgative, take what they think to be a dose of medicine salt, but which turns out to be a deadly poison. Emetics, taken as soon as the mistake is discovered, fail and the two men die in their little isolated cabin, one of them first scribbling a hasty note telling what has happened.

THUS the stormy sea and the high, lonely mountains take their toll of human life in ways that are dramatic and thrilling. But another man, in a great city, surrounded by all the supposed safeguards of civilization, scratches his hand with a pen, contracts an infection and also dies. When we reach the end of the road, we reach the end of the road. That seems to be about all there is to it.

RADIO ADVERTISING STUDY IS CALLED FOR

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7. (AP)—A resolution calling for the survey by the radio commission of the extent of commercial advertising programs over the radio was introduced today by Senator Couzens, republican, Michigan. Six major points for the commission to report on to the senate were proposed: What information is available on the feasibility of government or operation of radio stations. To what extent broadcasting facilities are used for commercial advertising purposes. How the stations are divided by power. What can be done to control or perhaps eliminate commercial radio advertising. Whether it would be possible to announce only the names of sponsors of programs.

HOOVER HEARS ORDERLY PLEA OF MARCHERS

**Priestly Leader Offers
Petition Asking for
Relief Program.**

**10,000 Men In Army of
Jobless Appearing
At Capitol.**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7. (AP)—The priestly leader of a peaceful army of unemployed today petitioned congress and the president for jobs and food for those unable to find work.

Father James R. Cox of Pittsburgh led his army of more than 10,000 men in an orderly demonstration at the door of the Capitol and then was received at the White House by President Hoover.

He gave his petition to Senator Davis and Representative Kelly of Pennsylvania, while the crowd cheered and vowed its allegiance to the American flag.

The four point petition asked for a five billion dollar public works program to give jobs; direct federal appropriations for unemployed relief; loans to re-establish the farmer, and that the money be raised by increasing the surtaxes on large incomes, inheritance taxes up to 70 per cent and by a large gift tax.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7. (AP)—A peace time army marched in orderly array to the Capitol today to demand work.

The thousands of men followed a priest, who presented to two Pennsylvania members of congress a petition that asked for jobs and federal help to care for those unable to find them.

Their journey was in vivid contrast to that body of demonstrators that concentrated here at the beginning of congress to chant "The Internationale" in the streets of the capital.

WOMEN FLIERS DIE IN PLANE ACCIDENT

HARRISBURG, Pa., Jan. 7. (AP)—Gentry Shelton, St. Louis aviator, today reported that Mrs. Ruth Stewart and Mrs. Debbie Stanford were instantly killed when their plane crashed on Howers mountain late Monday afternoon.

Shelton, who accompanied the women from Pittsburgh in a second plane carrying Mrs. Stewart's parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Woerner, said Mrs. Stewart, the pilot of the lost ship, had been crushed by the engine when the ship dived, nose downward, into the rain-soaked mountainside.

Members of the governor's troop, Pennsylvania cavalry, who recovered the bodies and turned them over to the state police, had to cut part of their roadway to the spot, 200 feet off a narrow mountain road running from Landisburg to Roxbury.

ABOLITION OF CITY OFFICES ADVOCATED

**Fouch Offers Plans for
Change; Election
Is Proposed.**

Abolition of offices of city treasurer and city attorney and creation of the position of city auditor to handle the bookkeeping part of the police judge's office and the city treasurer's work; and the combining of the offices of city attorney and police judge is advocated in the annual report, made to the city council, by Police Judge Roy Fouch.

Fouch also favors revision of the city charter to change the segregation of funds of the city. The changes are made in a special report and recommendations section of his report in which he suggests a special city election soon to place the matters before the people of the city.

He states that there is a continual surplus in the current expenses funds but that separate funds are overdrawn. Three separate funds show a continual deficit while the combined balances of current expenses funds show a surplus. The general fund is overdrawn \$5000, he says.

KLAMATH TRAVELER GETS SHERIFF LOAN

FRESNO, Calif., Jan. 7. (AP)—William Samuel of Klamath Falls, Ore., was discouraged and without money when he arrived here Wednesday, but he was smiling when he left for Los Angeles a short time later with the announced intention of marrying his fiancée shortly after he reaches there.

Samuel went to the sheriff's office and reported a robber had taken \$70, all his ready cash, from him on the highway 12 miles north of here. He told Deputy Sheriff Wallace Moore that he had been hurrying to Los Angeles to be married but without money he would be stranded in Fresno. The deputy loaned him enough money to continue the trip.

COMMITTS SUICIDE

SALEM, Jan. 7. (AP)—Joseph Hoefling, 82, who had said he "was tired of living," ended his life here last night by stabbing himself with a pocket knife. He had been in ill health for several months.

FREIGHT TRAIN PLOWS THROUGH WRECK INJURED

**Fifty Reported Killed
in Rail Horror
In Russia.**

**Soviet Censorship Is
Invoked to Keep
Back Details.**

MOSCOW, Jan. 7. (AP)—At least fifty persons were killed and scores injured in a train wreck 14 kilometers northwest of Moscow Saturday, it was learned today.

The number of dead was increased by a freight train which plowed through the injured, who were lying along a parallel track.

A local six-coach passenger train halted at a switch held preparatory to taking a side track on a stretch of double track.

Two following trains crashed into the rear end of the standing train, and scattered bodies and debris along the right of way, splintering almost all the coaches for the entire length of the halted train.

As the mangled bodies were pulled from the cars they were placed along an adjoining track.

A freight train thundered into the stretch without warning. Before the engineer could apply the brakes his locomotive and several box cars had slashed their way through the victims.

BRUENING AND HITLER CONFER

BERLIN, Jan. 7. (AP)—Chancellor Brüning and Adolf Hitler, militant leader of the national socialists, this evening, to discuss this year's presidential elections and other pressing political matters.

General Wilhelm Groener, minister of defense, also was present, and the three men talked for an hour and a half.

They said nothing for publication, but it was understood the chancellor sought Hitler's support for a plan to prolong the term of President von Hindenburg, in return for certain political concessions to the national socialists.

Tariff To Help Lumber Proposed By Manufacturer

ABERDEEN, Wash., Jan. 7. (AP)—The depreciated value of Canadian currency is the straw that broke the camel's back, said R. M. Ingram, manufacturer, today. The camel is the American lumbering industry.

"It is utterly impossible for American wood manufacturing firms to meet this new advantage," said Ingram, in advocating a protective tariff on forest products from Canada.

He said that Canadian can undercut American mills in the American market to the extent of the premium on United States money, and still net as much as their competitors this side of the border.

FARMER GOES MAD, KILLS FIVE, SELF

**Only One Child in Family
Escapes Hammer
of Insane Man.**

CAPE GIRARDEAU, Mo., Jan. 7. (AP)—Oliver Davenport, 50, killed five of his children by striking them over the head with a hammer in their farm home near Patton, Mo., early today, seriously wounded his wife and another child, and then shot himself to death with a shotgun.

Davenport apparently went insane. The tragedy left only one child in the family of eight unharmed.

It was apparent the children and Mrs. Davenport had been attacked in their sleep.

Davenport, it was reported, had been normal yesterday. Several weeks ago Davenport sold the farm and today the family was to have moved.

Neither the mother nor little girl could be interviewed regarding the tragedy, owing to their condition. The boy, too, was hysterical.

The slayings were discovered about daybreak when a 12 year old boy ran screaming from the Davenport home, seeking assistance.

Man Who Ran Amuck In Bus In 1922 Now Dead At Hospital

SALEM, Jan. 7. (AP)—George Rebes, who on August 21, 1922, shot and killed one man and wounded another while traveling on an Astoria-Portland bus, died at the state hospital for the insane last night. He was admitted to the hospital from Columbia county on October 12, after he had been indicted by the Columbia county grand jury and confined in the St. Helens jail.

His trial was not held when insanity became apparent. Prior to coming to Oregon he was confined in the Patton state hospital at California for five years.

Death occurred from tuberculosis. All his surviving relatives live in Italy.

Love Held Cause of Near-Suicide

SEATTLE, Jan. 7. (AP)—A note "I love Beth too much, and she knows it," found in the waste basket in his hotel room, today gave detectives a clue to the suicide attempt here last night of George Leat, 28, University of Oregon student.

Dad Is Household Football, Expert Finds In Studies

EVANSTON, Ill., Jan. 7. (AP)—After observing the operations of a Northwestern university clinic, designed to insure happier and more permanent marriages, Prof. Ernest R. Mowrer has come to the conclusion that father in the present day family is nothing more than a household football.

And the old idea that children should be seen and not heard has passed into discard the professor said yesterday.

"Father," he added, "is lucky nowadays, if the children look upon him as something other than a meddling outsider or an ally to be catered to when support is needed to overcome the wishes of the mother."

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TAXPAYERS HEAR DAILEY PROTEST

**Filing Not Made Late
Thursday; Economy
Program Talked.**

No charges had been filed against City Building Inspector Harry Dailey by E. L. Elliott, attorney for Stieh and Smith, at 2 p. m. Thursday. Dailey, the object of an attack before a meeting of the Klamath Taxpayers' League Wednesday night, stated that he had nothing to say until charges are filed and a hearing held on them. The charges before the league were made by Elliott as attorney for protesters to Dailey's reappointment.

In addition to hearing charges made against Dailey the Taxpayers' league outlined a three-point plan of reducing expenditures in city and county offices and schools during the coming year.

Attorney Elliott read the protest which enumerated three charges against Dailey. It charges Dailey with being the owner and manager of a building material plant and furnishing material from his own plant to applicants for building permits to his own advantage and to the exclusion of others in the same business; with conducting his personal business over the counter of his office in the city hall which is maintained by public expense; of being biased and prejudiced in recommending certain contractors to applicants for permits.

Bailey To Run As Court Candidate

SALEM, Jan. 7. (AP)—State Senator J. O. Bailey of Portland today filed with the secretary of state his preliminary petition for non-partisan nomination for justice of the supreme court. The position for which Bailey has filed is held by Justice George M. Brown of Roseburg.

This is the second filing for the position on the supreme bench, the other filed by Loyal Graham of Forest Grove.

Bailey is a member of the state senate from Multnomah county, whose term expires January 2, 1933.

Former Willamette Grigger Says He Was Hired to Play

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 7. (AP)—A charge that Willamette university hired him to play football was filed in circuit court today by Harold McKenzie, former guard on the Willamette team, in answer to a suit against him in which Sigma Tau, fraternity in the Willamette campus, sought to collect for furnishing him with board and lodging.

McKenzie was a star performer on the Monmouth Normal school squad last season.

The charge filed today states that McKenzie and Willamette University made a contract in August, 1927, whereby the university was to secure McKenzie a playing grade in hygiene, pay him tuition and pay him \$75 in cash and \$10 a month during the school year, as well as furnish him room and board. In return for which he became a member of the university football team.

DRASTIC MOVE ANNOUNCED IN SINO-JAP ROW

**Note Informs Tokyo This
Country Will Adhere
to Pact Rights.**

**Sweeping Action Looms
After Conference
Between Powers.**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7. (AP)—In a new expression of concern over Japan's occupation of Manchuria, the American government notified Tokyo that the United States will adhere to its rights under the various applicable international agreements, including the nine-power pact and the Kellogg anti-war treaty.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7. (AP)—The United States today invoked the nine power treaty in the Manchurian dispute.

The treaty deals with preservation of China's territorial and administrative integrity.

The action was taken by Secretary Stimson after consulting with the other powers party to the treaty.

Details Not Disclosed. Further action of a more sweeping character of which the nine power treaty was the axis has been taken, but details were not disclosed today at the time that the revelation of invocation of the treaty came.

Just when and how the notification went to the far east was not immediately disclosed.

In Conference. Secretary Stimson had been in consultation over the question with the representatives here of Great Britain and France.

MOISTURE IS STILL FAR BELOW NORMAL

Klamath Falls lacks 1.05 inches of having received the normal amount of precipitation so far this year, according to statistics compiled by the official weather bureau at the U. S. reclamation office.

Even so, conditions are considerably better than last year to date when rainfall registered 2.49 inches under normal.

Much more snow has fallen in the mountains this year than last, the weather man states, and prospects for the coming season look more promising. Much of the snow which has fallen in the mountains will melt and soak in to the ground, lessening forest fire hazards, insuring better grazing range and aiding the springs and streams which have completely or partially dried up in the past dry seasons.

According to information received by the U. S. weatherman Thursday, 34 inches of snow is reported at Sand Creek. This is 54 inches more than the total fall of last year when only 30 inches were registered for the whole season. This report is typical of conditions at all mountain stations, according to official reports.

Stage Depot At Portland Robbed

PORTLAND, Jan. 7. (AP)—A lone bandit entered the Central stage depot shortly after 6 a. m. today, poked a long revolver at Pete Buono, ticket clerk, and escaped with \$226. The same robber took \$210 from Buono about two weeks ago under exactly the same circumstances, forcing him to leave the cashier's cage and go to a washroom.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7. (AP)—The House rivers and harbors committee today approved a proposal that local interests be relieved from giving \$50,000 toward the cost of improving the Willamette river between Oregon City and Portland, Oregon.
