READING IN CITY GAINS DURING YEAR

Nearly 100,000 books were circulated among the people of Klamath Falls by the city library during the year 1931, according to the annual report of Miss Enola Hawkins, librarian. The daily average circulation was totaled 314.

Circulation for 1931 showed an increase of 17,900 books over the number circulated in 1930.

During the month of December, 1931, an average of 354 books were checked out daily with a monthly total of 9,311.

Approximately 300 new and rebound books were placed upon the shelves of the city library during the month of December, and 125 rebound volumes were returned to the shelves.

The city librarian has expressed a wish that more people use the library. Cost of maintenance is no more for 500 daily visitors than for 300.

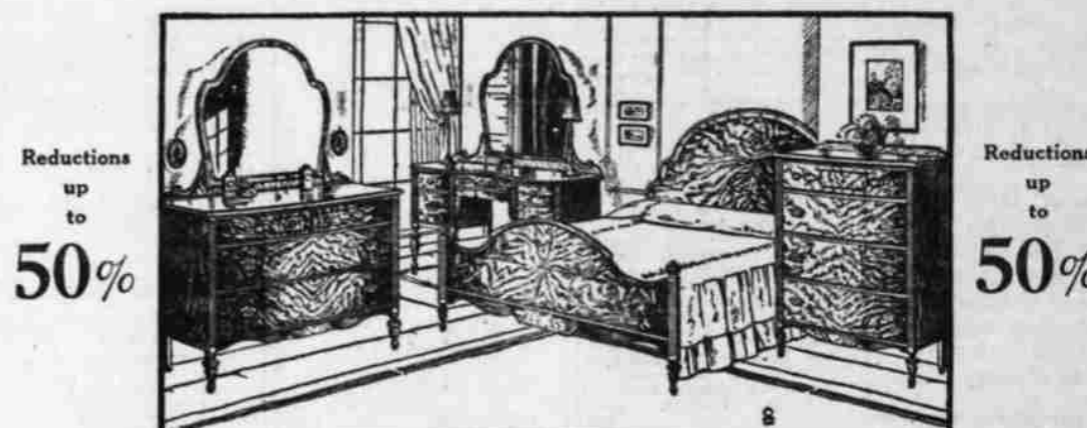
