SENATOR BORAH proposes sal-
ary reductions for members
of congress, the cabinet and the
farm board, which is probably
reasonable enough, in spite of
the fact that salaries paid to
members of congress, the cabinet
and the farm board are not as
high as can be earned in private
life by men who are as big as
such important public officials
OUGHT to be.
