

TRAFFIC MISHAPS LISTED WEDNESDAY

Three traffic accidents were reported at the county sheriff's office Wednesday.

Y. G. Klock of Beatty, Indian officer, reported that his car collided with one driven by Inez Hunter of Beatty. The accident occurred January 5 on the Lakeview highway and both cars were badly damaged although no one was injured. Cars driven by Charles Joseph Hess of the Lakeview route and D. A. Strland of Klamath Falls, collided on the Lakeview route Tuesday. Hess claims that Strland was driving on the wrong side of the road and the accident was unavoidable. The damage was slight.

Fred R. Starr, game warden of northern California, had an unusual accident Tuesday. He was driving between 25 and 30 miles an hour a short distance south of Keno and slowed down to avoid hitting a colt in the road. His car skidded, the colt slipped on the ice and was hit by the car. The impact did not injure the colt, but broke both headlights and damaged the radiator of Starr's car.

FRENCH MINISTER DIES OF TYPHOID

PARIS, Thursday, Jan. 7. (U.P.)—M. Andre Maginot, French minister of war, died early today. The war minister, who was 54 years old, had been ill with typhoid for several weeks. His condition had not been considered particularly critical and hospital authorities believed he was progressing favorably until last night.

His condition suddenly became worse. He sank rapidly, dying at 2 a. m. in the Paris clinic.

Paris, Jan. 6. (U.P.)—Premier Pierre Laval is expected to make important changes in his cabinet early next week in preparation for the forthcoming world disarmament conference.

The changes, possibly involving a complete reorganization, are made necessary by the illness of Foreign Minister Aristide Briand and of Minister of War Andre Maginot.

The premier, it was learned tonight, is facing one of three possible solutions:

1. Resignation of the entire cabinet and reorganization.
2. Appointment of new ministers to replace Briand and Maginot.
3. Designation of new chief delegates to the disarmament conference.

CHINESE BANDITS RELEASE INMATES

LONDON, Thursday, Jan. 7. (U.P.)—A Daily Mail dispatch today said the Japanese advance guard had arrived at Shanhaikwan, where the Great Wall of China meets the sea.

Japanese troops moved southward from Chinchow, Manchuria, towards Shanhaikwan Tuesday, asserted to make a junction with the garrison there.

MUKDEN, Thursday, Jan. 7. (U.P.)—Hundreds of bandits attacked Telling this morning and were engaged in fighting Japanese troops after disarming the peace preservation corps, releasing prison inmates and setting fire to the prison.
