THE state board of control votes to employ an inspector to ride herd on state-owned automobiles and ascertain what abuses, if any, have crept into the use of these cars by state employees. His salary is to be \$200 a month.

Since there are some 400 state-owned cars, the inspector will earn his salary if he succeeds in effecting a saving of 50 cents per car per month.

At present prices, such a saving would involve around two and a half gallons of gasoline, not to mention tires and upkeep.

EVERY employer who has had experience with company-owned cars will be more or less sympathetic with this enterprise. There is a peculiar fascination about riding in a car for which somebody else furnishes the gas, and people who wouldn't think of taking a pleasure trip on the railroad and turning in an expense item for it will go out riding without a thought in a company car.

It stands to reason that this is true in the case of state-owned cars.

THE idea will be quite all right if it isn't later found necessary to employ an inspector of inspectors to find out what the inspector does with his state-owned car. The custom of using business cars for private purposes is so insidious that just that might happen.
