PIONEER WOMAN DIES IN MACDOEL

DORRIS, Calif.—Mrs. Anna Belle Scott, 70, California pioneer died New Year's Eve in the P. & O. hospital in Oakland after an illness of several months.

For more than sixteen years Mrs. Scott had been a resident of Dorris, where she was well known, and where a large circle of friends mourn her passing. She was born in Sonoma county, April 2, 1861, and spent many years of her life in the bay section.

She was a daughter of the late Captain John Hall, who led many wagon trains across the plains to California, and was a niece of the late C. F. McGlasher, author of a chronicle of the Donner party.

Mrs. Scott is survived by her son, Major Harry F. Huber, former chairman of the Oakland civil service commission, and a daughter, Mrs. Lucile Veitrop of Oakland.

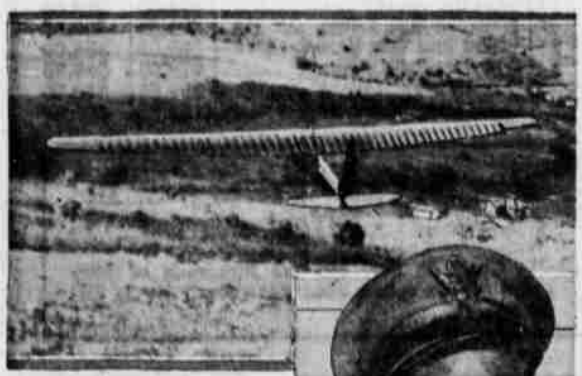

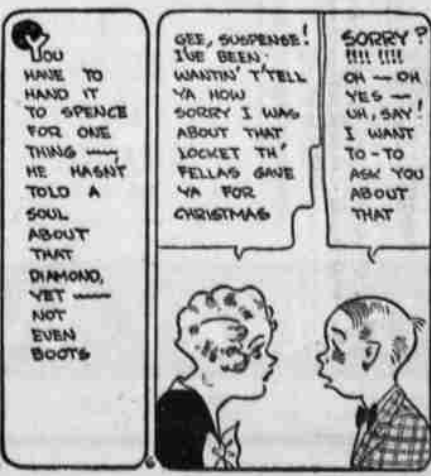
